

Editorial

Summer means a variety of things to a variety of people: holidays; gardening; acquiring a tan; swimming; boating; camping; picnics; cricket; hay fever!...to Port Isaacans it means traffic congestion. Pressed against a wall with a baby in a push chair, unable to move because cars travelling in opposite directions had got themselves locked on the corner by the pub, a woman visitor grumbled "This is terrible. Cars ought not to be allowed down here. This is a beautiful place, but I shan't come again."! Port Isaac is a beautiful village. That Stone...

So far there has been no comment on the alleged 'disappearance' of the cross from the top of the stone at Longcross. In the Penguin 'Buildings of England' book about Cornwall, published 1951, the author Nikolaus Pevsner refers to a 'Cross Shaft' at the cross roads between St. Endellion and Port Quin. A.K. Hamilton Jenkin wrote in 1934 that stones were relics of a pre-Christian era and that crosses were later - 9th. Century. Roger Warrillow of Long Cross Hotel has kindly allowed me to quote from his brochure: The cross stands on its original site, although it was moved earlier this century to Doyden Head where it became worn by exposure to the weather. This Ogham stone considered 7th. Century and has an inscription in lettering transitional between Roman and Saxon - BROCAGNI HIC IACIT NADOTTI FILIUS - here lies Brocagnus, son of Nadottus. It may have been erected as a guide to the monastery at Roscarrock.

TRESUNGERS

We are also told that there is a stone cross in the new section of the burial ground at St. Endellion which twice disappeared from Tresungers to appear at its present site but we have been unable to verify this so far. We would welcome any more information on this topic.

Village Hall

Port Isaac Village Hall is a registered charity and the Parish Council of St. Endellion are the Custodian Trustees.

OBJECT

The object of the Charity is the provision and maintenance of a village hall for the use of the inhabitants of the Parish without distinction of political, religious, or other opinions, including use for meetings, lectures, and classes, and for other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

COMMITTEE

The Committee of Management consists of six members who are elected at Annual General Meetings and who hold their appointed offices for the period of one year. In addition to the elected members, any regular organisation in the Parish is entitled and expected to send a representative to the Annual General Meeting so that the secretary of the Committee will know who is to represent which organisations at the ordinary meetings which are held as is found to be necessary and possible.

ELIGIBILITY

In fact anyone who resides in the Parish may put themselves forward for membership of the Committee and the present members would welcome extra assistance from the population of the Parish. The next Annual General Meeting will be held in April 1983.

How 'Trio' happens

PIECES OF PAPER

People sometimes stop us in the street and tell us things they think should go into 'Trio'. We find this very difficult as we tend to forget them or if we don't we get the details wrong. So we prefer to receive little pieces of paper with things written out. These are all put in a box until 'publication day' when they are taken out and typed up.

ADVERTISEMENTS

Since the advertisements determine the amount of space left on each page, they are put in position first and the rest of the 'copy' is arranged around them.

LAYOUT

The layout is done by cutting out all the typewritten matter in strips then seeing how it will fit in. This is actually quite tricky but we don't very often have to retype anything to make it fit. We do have to be careful to make sure nothing is left out and that all articles are on the appropriate page. The hardest to do is the report of the Parish Council which tends to get too long!

STENCILS

When each page has been laid out and all the typing stuck down in place, a 'scanner' is used to make stencils for duplicating. Using a scanner makes it possible to have drawings and lettering as well as just typing.

DUPLICATING

Each page is first duplicated on one side (350 + copies) and left to dry a while before the other side is duplicated. Then the name 'Trio' is printed in a different colour each month to distinguish each issue from the others.

EXPERIMENT

This month we have tried an experiment and typed out this article on a 'pica' typewriter then had

half-size photostats made. This may allow us to get a lot more words in the same space and hopefully will still be easy enough to read.

DIFFICULTY

If you find this hard to read, however, please complain to us about it and we won't repeat the method with smaller type.

COLLATING

When all the pages have been duplicated they are stapled by hand, in pairs, using a 'Bambi' stapler which has nice small staples suitable for a two-page paper.

THREE PAGES

We tried a three page issue in May but it was too much work for our volunteers to cope with on a regular basis - 100% more work in fact as not only did an extra double-sided page have to be run off but there was an extra sheet to gather up when stapling.

DISTRIBUTION

The papers are delivered to the three newspaper shops who have kindly agreed to make 'Trio' available to locals only, in time for them to be available to the public first thing on the Saturday of issue.

CHARGES

We don't charge for 'Trio' because this makes it more acceptable to customers, neither do we charge for articles or reports in the paper. The cost of the actual paper, stencils, inks, and so on are met by the advertising which costs the advertisers £1.00 per column unit per month.

IN ADVANCE

The advertising charges have to be received by us in advance since we cannot afford to accrue any debts so that unpaid advertisements simply do not appear - as a few people have discovered!
