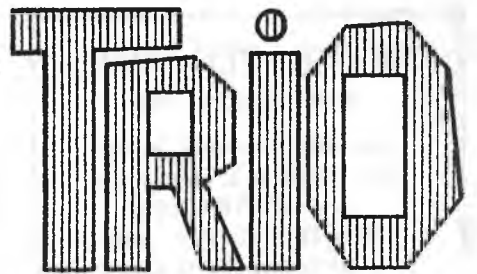
PINEHAVEN - PORT QUIN

But I didn't know it then and can echo the statement 'We were happy'. Of course my parents had anxieties that we children knew naught of, and perhaps nostalgia lends a rosy glow, but one thing is certain... the difference between yesterday's children and today's is expectation. Without television to tell us that we were deprived without this product or that we asked less from life and paradoxically achieved more from the little we had. With very little money, Christmas, Easter, Bonfire Night were magic times full of shared activity and tremendous excitement. We were always making things out of scraps and secreting them with great relish until the big day. Stirring the Christmas pudding was a family ritual which

Here's a new service to report for the area! Fresh farm milk delivered from Glebe Farm, St. Endellion, Rohan and Linda Carey (former natives of Launceston) now hold a Ministry of Agriculture licence having satisfied all the requirements. This allows them to sell unpasteurised milk to schools, hospitals, caterers, and the general public. The difference, for the uninitiated, is that unpasteurised milk has received no heat treatment and, as with all milk supplies, it is constantly subjected to stringent random tests to ensure the highest quality.
