

EDITORIAL

We are now in the year of George Orwell's 'Big Brother', but it may be some consolation to know that '1984' was only '1948' with the last two figures reversed, so this may not be, therefore, a specially apocalyptic year. Let's hope this is true at any rate of all the other influences Fate may have in store for us. There was enough exaggerated weather last year, for instance, to last us for quite a long time - wet spring - summer drought - and gales to blow a person's hair off! This year hasn't started particularly auspiciously though, with one of the fishing boats getting wrecked inside the harbour at Port Isaac, and a fatal road accident at a dangerous spot near the Trelights turning on the B.3314 road at St. Endellion. We must hope that these tragic events don't set the pattern for the year. It is said that the fishermen had a good season last year, and the farmers are looking happier than you would expect after the many diversities they had to tackle. There is supposed to be an 'upturn' in the economy during 1984, well perhaps this will mean a better year for the tourist business. At present it seems very unlikely - we are at that time of the year when our villages are quite deserted, most of the cottages dark and empty, so the arrival of the 'season's' first visitors is still a welcome outlook. Whether they will still be welcome when they actually arrive is another thing. We saw a lot of townfolk here last year, no doubt attracted by competitive rates, but thoroughly at a loss what to do with themselves. There is no Bingo Hall or Amusement Arcade in our little resorts, let alone Woolworth's or Boots! This is such a beautiful part of Cornwall that you can't help wondering why we seem to attract so many people who are not able to appreciate it, while others who would be prepared to pay slightly more for a quiet, restorative holiday, are unaware of our locality and the delights it has to offer the weary businessman who only wants to have a couple of weeks complete break 'away from it all' - and what better place is there for this than this region. 'St. Endellion in the Spring' could well be an advertising slogan. It would certainly be backed by long days, many filled with bright sunshine, and banks of wild flowers along every lane. Paradise indeed, and even Big Brother would be glad to leave us in peace and quiet so that he too might have somewhere to escape to!

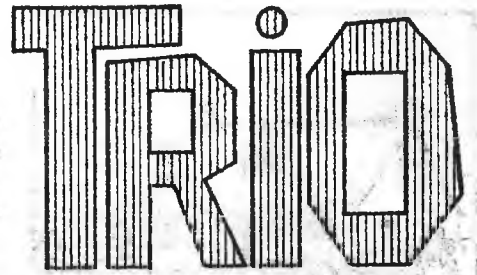
OUR NEW PRIEST

A reminder that the Revd. Hugh Fryer will be licensed as Priest-in-Charge of St. Endellion, Port Isaac, and St. Kew, on Thursday 2nd. February, by the Lord Bishop of Truro. Short ceremonies will be held at St. Kew - 6.00pm., Port Isaac - 6.45pm, and followed by the Eucharist at St. Endellion - 7.30. After the service at Port Isaac, a coach will leave for St. Endellion, those wishing to travel on it please contact Trelawney Garage.

The Revd. Fryer served in the Royal Navy for 15 years from 1943. He was involved in Combined Operations during the War and was commissioned in 1946. Two years after leaving the Navy in 1958 he was ordained at Exeter Cathedral and served his curacy at Tavistock.

In 1964 he was appointed Rector of St. Buryan, St. Levan, and Sennen, where he stayed until 1972. After serving four years in Scotland as rector and officiating chaplain to the Royal Air Force at Lossiemouth, he returned to Cornwall to become Team Rector of North Hill, Altarnun, Lewannick, and Bolventor. He led the creation of what is now the Bolventor Team Ministry which includes Laneast, St. Clether, and Tresmeer. The Revd. and Mrs. Fryer will live at the Rectory, St. Endellion. They are both keen gardeners, and hill climbers.

We hope that all Port Isaac residents will take this opportunity to show the Bishop of Truro that we want to keep our Parish Church when he comes to install Father Fryer. All we have to do is to be in St. Peter's at 6.45pm. on Thursday February 2nd.

Dear Sir, The path across the back of the allotments leading up on to Lobber - Father always called it 'Rowland's Way' - nets used to be dried up there, wheeled up in a wheelbarrow by the fishermen. Sorry I cannot confirm it though!

Dear Sir, The name 'Rowland's Way' refers to a path which led from the beach at Port Isaac, up the cliff and on to the bottom of the allotments. This path was used by a fisherman named 'Rowland' who lived at Lower Trefreock, and was his shortest route home; hence the name 'Rowland's Way'. The name is still used by local people when referring to the cliff below the allotments.

Dear Sir, Re the correct name of the footpath area near the allotments. The correct name is 'Rowland's Way'. I was told many years ago that a fisherman named 'Rowland' (I do not know if it was his Christian name or his surname) kept his boat in Silvershell Gully on the shingle. His 'way' home to Lower Trefreock was up the cliff by way of a chain handrail fastened to the cliff face. This was still there when I was a boy and was frequently used by us. Hence the name 'Rowland's Way'.

PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting of 9th. January, held at Trelights Chapel Hall.

Transport Plan: The Chairman reported that this year's County Transport Committee Plan held nothing of interest to Port Isaac.

Light at Trelights: Mr. Provis proposed that an extra light be placed on the pole outside Mr. Chapman's house. Seconded by Mrs. Barron and carried. Mr. Bolton hoped it would not be a yellow light.

Road at Trewetha and at Cold-Stanton: Highways to be asked what progress with proposed road improvements. Mrs. Cann asked for consideration to be given to the dangerous place near St. Endellion as well.

Club's Report: Mrs. Rayment received full support from the Council in her campaign to keep 'Port Isaac' telephone numbers. Mrs. Cann proposed, seconded by Mrs. Richards,

that a letter be sent from the Council to British Telecom.

Mr. Symons suggested that a N.C.D.C. "Work for the Unemployed" scheme to put up hanging baskets for flowers, was unsuitable for Port Isaac. The Council suggested that if Mrs. Pethick would like to form a small committee for the purpose, Trelights ought to 'have a go'. But it was thought more important to keep the roads and beaches clean first.

There were no Planning applications, and the date and place of the next monthly meeting will be Monday 13th. February, 7.30pm. at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

The first 'Public Question Time' was held after this meeting and questions were asked about the road resurfacing programme for Trelights. There was also a request for another street light at the entrance to Furze Park.
