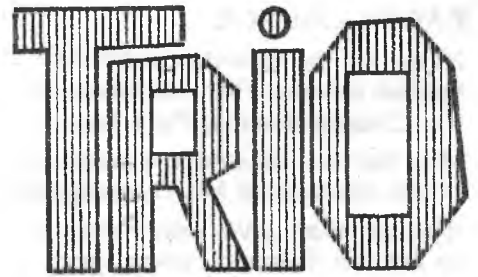

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the monthly meeting held on Monday 14th. October, at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Mrs. Barron chaired the meeting in the absence of Mr. Cunningham.

'People must give exact details to British Telecom when they complain about telephone faults' said Dr. Barron, 'and ask people where they are ringing from when crossed lines occur.'

After paying the Clerk's salary and expenses and for having the grass cut under seats, £102.56 is left in the current account. With £690.39 on deposit, there is no need to precept for any of the £500 still available to the Council.

Publicity Donation

Cllr. Dawe proposed a donation to the Polzeath & Rock Publicity Committee of £50 in line with other parishes. Mr. Welton seconded the motion which was carried. The description of Port Isaac had been sent in. Mr. Bolton said 'We need people here in the spring and autumn, will this do it?'

Rose Hill

After a meeting in the Hill, the District Planning Committee are to make an Article 4 Direction Order on the Conservation Area which will mean no planning 'concessions' will be permitted. All development will need planning consent. Someone suggested that local people might go around looking for specific examples of items that have 'slipped through' or 'need cherishing' and ask the

planning office if they will come and take photographs. Meanwhile, the bollard is to be re-sited lower down the hill.

Conservation Committee

It was felt that the Heritage Coast Officer, Mr. C.V. David at Barn Lane, Bodmin, will keep an eye on things and, as plans come to the Parish Council, there is no need for a separate committee.

Church Hill

Members of the council will look at the deep ditch caused by the new tarmac, and report back to the next meeting.

Cars parked in the 'pull-in' at the telephone box cause an obstruction to the adjacent garage owner and others.

Pump at Trelights

Was to have been enclosed in wood in 1983 but nothing has been done. Mr. Hall to be reminded to do this work.

Heritage Coast

Mr. David to be invited to the December meeting, and possibly to the Annual Public Meeting next year, to outline the project to encourage people to use the new route into North Cornwall via Bude, and to visit places that can accommodate them so as to spread the load over the whole area. The idea is to show people the beauty of North Cornwall and eyesores such as the signs at the bottom of Roscarrock Hill should be removed.

Steps, Trewetha Lane

The whole of the steps have been painted white instead of just the edges resulting in a confusing glare. Mr. Sweet to be asked to remove the paint from the 'treads'.

Community Bus

A letter from Justin Rowe of the Port Isaac Youth Group, asking for support of a scheme, already favoured by the Church, the Darts Team, and Football Club. St. Breward already has one and government money is available if proposals to buy a bus are forthcoming from interested groups. Oliver Baines of Cornwall Rural Community Council to be asked to meet the Council and perhaps also to attend the Annual Meeting.

Allocation of Council Houses

Mr. Stratton's reply to last month's letter from the Parish Council said that the Council's recommendation had received due consideration, but the situation is to be looked into. He thanked the Council for considering allocations privately.

Chairman's Expenses

A call for the reimbursement of 'out of pocket' expenses incurred by the chairman on Council business. Mr. Welton proposed that this should be discussed in private, after Mr. Cunningham gets back.

Planning

A number of revised plans for the bungalows and garages on the new site at Trelights. The only observations made related to the need for more stonew to be more in keeping with the rest of the village.

A letter, from nearby residents, objecting to the application to change the Old Telephone Exchange into a store. Parish Council objections about lack of access were added to this.

No observations were made or an application to erect a single storey dwelling on the land behind St. Peter's Church except

No observations were made regarding the workshop/store at Modannon Bungalow, Trewetha.

The Council endorsed the architects comments on the impossibility of providing a pitched roof for the extension at Drake's Cottage, Rose Hill.

Mr. Smith is to appeal against a decision of the N.C.D.C. not to allow building at the Silverspray site at Port Gaverne. A letter to be sent by the Parish Council, emphasising that the site is in the Heritage Coast area and an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Wherry criticised the coal bunkers that had been installed at the Council Houses in

Trewetha Lane. 'We want decent ones that we can lock, like the ones they took away. I've had 10cwt. of coal stolen from mine and all 8 tenants are having the same problem. The police can offer no solution, neither can the crime-prevention people.' The Parish Council to write to N.C.D.C. asking them to re-consider the bunkers.

Mr. McCrohon complained about a remark made by a councillor at the Rose Hill site meeting to the effect that 'we are not having "emmetts" coming into the village'. Mrs. Barron said that the Council was unaware of this and disassociated themselves from any such remark.

Dear Sir, Whilst applauding the Christian and maternal concern expressed for children using Rose Hill, in view of the increased volume of traffic brought about by one extra car venturing 'below the pole', I cannot endorse the proposal for closing the hill to traffic below the sewage works. As a full time resident of Rose Hill, albeit one of the 'ethnic minority', I very much value the 'reasonable' access to my property, by car, for the purposes of loading and unloading. A very important feature when one needs to travel as much as myself and my family.

There are perhaps a few people, having carved a niche for themselves and their cars, in Rose Hill, who would be delighted to close the hill to others beneath them (literally, I mean) but please let us try and consider all, for a change. If we are all honest, I'm sure, that besides access we car users would all like a personal space handy to our residences. Is it too late and perhaps too hopeful, for a combined residents approach to the 'powers that be' for consideration of allotted spaces along or beside the 'motorway' to the sewage works?

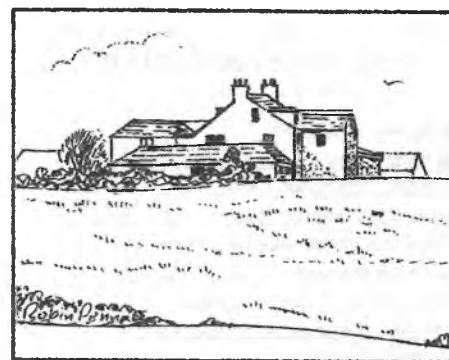
