## PROPOSED TV AERIAL

Plans for a UHF Relay Station, consisting of a 17 metre high wooden pole with a slender 2 metre extension and a small cubicle, were discussed by members of the Parish Council. Since this aerial may result in fewer rooftop aerials and as it is needed to serve about 300 people who at present only get poor coverage, the site between Silvershell View and Hayfield Road was accepted. The power supply will be by underground cables and the aerial will transmit BBC 1, BBC 2, ITV, and CH 4.

Walter Mitchell, a native of Port Isaac died suddenly on 21st. April at his home in Scotland, aged 58 years. He will be sadly missed by his mother Mrs. E. Mitchell of 33 New Road, also by his brothers and sisters.

## ST. ENDELLION

The Parochial Church Council of St. Endellion, on instructions from the Chancellor of the Diocese, would like to draw attention to the fact that artificial flowers are not permitted in Churchyards. The Council recognise that people are unaware of this regulation which has been in force for many years, and so have decided that the ban on artificial flowers should not come into force until 31 December 1986. The members also recognise that Christmass Wreaths and Poppy Wreaths contain artificial flowers and these can be allowed on the graves for up to two months from the Christmass Day and Remembrance Sunday respectively.

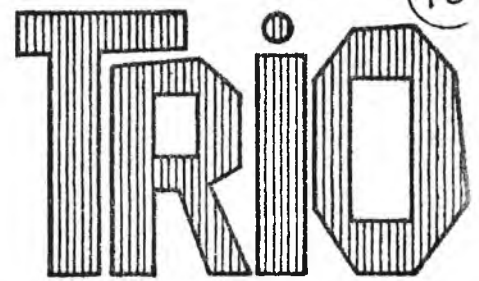

## PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the Annual and monthly meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. May, 1986.

### Election of Officers

Mrs. Barbara Willmott, Clerk to the Council, opened the meeting and called for nominations for the Chairman. Mr. Cunningham was re-elected unopposed. Mrs. Barron was re-elected Vice Chairman, Dr. Barron - Treasurer, Mrs. Cann, Mrs. Richards, and Mr. Bolton - Playing Fields Committee, (Mrs. Cann moved that headmaster Mr. Bruce be invited to join), Mr. Welton - representative for Tourism, Mr. Bolton - Emergency Committee (and to be asked to make a report to the next meeting), Mr. Welton - Village Hall, Messrs. Symons, Norris, and Provis - Assoc. Parish Councils, Mrs. Cann continues in her four year position as School Governor. Cllr. Dawe and Mr. Symons - Trelights Village Green Committee, as representatives of the Parish Council.

### Heart Machine Appeal

£25 to be given to Camelford ambulance towards the cost of a defibrillator.

### Seat behind Overcliff

Although permission granted by Mr. Talbot-Williams to put the seat on his land, some doubt expressed about possible future problems about care of the ground and approaches.

### Finance

There is £106 in the current a/c and £217 on deposit. The 2.9p rate means £3,800 available for coming year. £300 precept to be made at present.

### Annual Parish Meeting

Cllr. Dawe said some members of the public had not been able to hear the speakers. Next year

the seats will be in a horseshoe with the speakers on the floor, said Mr. Cunningham. The tea and sandwiches were much appreciated. Mr. Welton said that no emergency lights when the main lighting failed was pretty bad, especially with the Fire Officer present.

### Yellow Lines at Trelights

Mr. Symons said that this matter had been resolved and that the suggestion was to be dropped.

### Verge at Trewetha

Cars are being driven over the grass. People even picnic on it sometimes. Also visibility is impaired when a bus is parked there. It was proposed to write to Prout's Garage and ask if it is possible to make other arrangements. Cllr. Dawe was against the proposal which was carried 6 to 1.

### Poltreworrey Corner

The verge is being used as a 'general dumping ground', and it was proposed to write to Mr. Hawken and ask for it to be kept clear. Cllr. Dawe was against the proposal.

### Dumping at Cartway Cove

A person had been caught 'red handed' dumping a chest-of-drawers over the cliff. They admitted this was wrong and apologised. It was proposed to insert an article in Trio to say that the next offender will be prosecuted. Mr. Norris suggested that there might be a proper chute somewhere. Mr. Bolton said that rubbish thrown over the cliffs ended up on the beaches.

### Litter in Rose Hill

Mr. Symons said that there is a big problem as visitors leave on Saturdays and the rubbish is not collected until Tuesdays. A roneo'd notice is to be distributed to all the houses involved.

### Path through Pendoggett Farm

After receiving complaints from a visitor that they had not been allowed to cross the farmyard when trying to use the Port Gaverne to Pendoggett path, the question was raised about some kind of notice at Port Gaverne. The Heritage Coast Officer, Charlie David, has so far been unable to establish an alternative route. Cllr. Dawe is to discuss the possibility of a path into the lane by the chapel with Mr. Scawin, St. Kew Parish Council.

### Trelights 'Heavy Vehicles'

Mr. Wherry of County Highways feels that the problem is due to long vehicles but is reluctant to erect any signs to prohibit them. Cllr. Dawe requested that the improvements to the B.3314 be brought forward in view of the recent accident. The Parish Council is to ask for a meeting with the Highways Dept.

### Sign 'To the Surgery'

The Port Isaac doctors have been told by their Ethical Committee that direction signs could be considered to be advertising and are therefore not allowed. The Parish Council are to write and point out that this is an area with many visitors who need to know where the surgery is.

### Gipsies

It was reported that there are no gipsies in the Parish.

### Trees at The Barton

The North Cornwall District Council will replace four of the trees in the autumn. They will be beech and flowering cherries.

### Village Hall

Mr. Welton announced that they had just heard of the possibility of a £1,000 grant from County Council. Money is urgently needed as the Licence for Public Entertainments will not be renewed unless the toilets are extensively improved. About £2,500 will be needed to cover the requirements. It had not been possible to get this item on the agenda but it was hoped that the Parish Council would be prepared to make a suggestion that they would discuss the possibility of making a £500 grant at the next meeting. Somebody had said that this wouldn't be too

much, the Tennis Club had got £1,000.

**Planning**

Mr. Spry, Port Isaac Liberal Club, 3 roof lights. Mr. Symons reminded the Council of their reservations about such lights on a previous occasion but Cllr. Dawe said that the Old School has got some. The plans will be returned with 'no observations'.

**Public Discussion**

Mr. Welton asked whether the yellow lines in Trewetha Lane hadn't been painted on the wrong side. The visibility for cars coming out of Lundy Road is very bad. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

Mr. Welton also said that now the 'Port Gaverne' sign was up at Port Isaac Turn, people were asking for 'Trewetha' as well.

Mr. Penna had asked Mr. Philp, Chief Planning Officer, how the public were supposed to be informed about plans which were going through. Mr. Cunningham said that Mr. Philp's suggestion that the Parish Council should be asked to display the information was often not possible as it was not always received in sufficient time.

The public were asked to leave at this stage as the Council had to consider applications for a council bungalow.

**PIAT ?**

Hoteliers, guest house owners, and bed & breakfast proprietors in Port Isaac are joining forces to see if a way can be found to try and attract more visitors in the 'dead' period between the Easter bank holiday and the beginning of the 'season'. If a 'Port Isaac Association for Tourism' were formed, this could be known as PIAT for short. In any event, we shall be bringing you more details in the next issue.

My son Robert (aged 11) has recently spent every day after school fishing at Port Gaverne. (No luck as yet!)

On May 1st. he observed E. Fletcher and son in great difficulty as their boat had overturned. Robert immediately took off to get help; and went into the Port Gaverne Hotel where he explained to two men, both residents in the Port Isaac area (not locals) what had occurred and urgently requested their help. They both got up and observed the situation, then returned to their drinks stating there was 'nothing they could do!'. My son was terribly anxious and, concerned with the responsibility firmly implanted on his shoulders he then ran, as if his life depended on it, to the telephone box at the top of the hill in order to contact the Coast Guard.

Fortunately a public spirited person had already done this and our life boat was summoned from an exercise, and Eddie and his son were brought to safety. When my son told Ian and myself of his plight, we were both horrified.

What type of people are these who show no concern for two people (one a child) in great difficulties in the sea, and to allow our son to be burdened with such responsibility?

**TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN**

When a young boy ran into the Port Gaverne Hotel and reported an overturned boat, both I and David Welton immediately assessed the situation and decided that there was nothing that we could do personally, believing that there were two young boys aboard and not knowing their seafaring experience we immediately rang David Castle with regard to calling the lifeboat for assistance. At no time, as has been intimated, did I refuse assistance. This, I feel is the product of the child's misinterpretation, and the parents' failure to speak to me personally, rather than publicise an entirely untrue and slanderous report.

I have taken this opportunity to refute these allegations, as it would be an unacceptable example to set, especially to young children who may overhear such remarks.

## VILLAGE HALL

At the AGM on May 13th. with very few villagers present, we heard that the Entertainments Licence will not be renewed by the District Council until new requirements have been met with. This means new toilets have got to be built, with 3 wc's and a washbasin for the ladies, and 2 urinals, 1 wc, and a washbasin for the gents. This will cost nearly £4,000, so massive fund raising efforts will have to take place if the Hall is to be available for any event involving members of the public, by next winter. There is a good possibility of £1,000 grant from County Council and possibly as much from District Council, the Parish Council is to discuss a grant of £500, and Cornwall Rural Community Council will make a 5-year, interest free, £1,000 loan if the Hall can raise 25% of their costs. The money is for the materials only, the work will be done through a Manpower Services Commission scheme, and is to start quite soon. Chairman John Powell and Hon. Secretary David Coy have completed vast amounts of paper work and prepared plans for submission to the District Council. We must take our hats off to them, and to the present Committee, for their dedication. We are lucky to have a Hall like this in our village and, but for these few people, we might easily have lost it. The work will greatly improve the facilities at the Hall and hopefully it will attract a lot more use. The present income from lettings is less than the running costs, nevertheless by careful management there are funds in hand of £243. The present Committee was re-elected 'en bloc' plus three new members.

The 'Annual Meeting' was held immediately after the AGM and the following officers were appointed: Chairman - John Powell, Minutes and Communications Secretary - Bess Coates, Grants Liaison Officer - David Coy, Treasurer - Pat Hingley. Other Committee members are: Bill Coates, Cllr. Dawe, Vick Hingley, Cindy Powell, and Parish Councillor David Welton.

'VILLAGE HALL' CONTD.

### Chairman's Report (abridged)

During the year the committee has secured greater use of the Hall - by the regulars (Football Club, Badminton, W.I., P.I.P.'s), plus travelling theatres, and exhibitions. The Hall is decaying due to age and lack of funds. The Parish Council grant towards replastering, and outside work done free by the Manpower Services Committee, have helped. Efforts by the Committee may win grants up to £3,000, leaving £1,250 (25% of materials cost) to be raised for the renewal of kitchen and toilets again using Manpower Services labour. The District Council refusal to grant a Public Entertainments Licence because of the lack of facilities, means a loss of revenue from Summer Plays and other events - maybe even the Pantomime, and there won't be a Licence until completion so speed is essential. We appeal to all the Village to remember that this is your Village Hall, it belongs to the Community and there is danger of it being lost if work isn't done. We need your support. Finally thanks to Pat Hingley, Linda von Lintzgy, and David Coy for their sterling work as Treasurer and Joint Secretaries.

### Art Show

He said that he had been associated with boating off the North Cornwall coast for many years and how reassuring it was to know that the Lifeboat service was always ready to answer the emergencies of the sea. On behalf of the artists, he handed over a cheque for £600 to the Branch. The final amount raised is £900.

A Coffee Morning was held by Mrs. Enid Andrews in aid of the RNLI and raised £83. Grateful thanks to all the helpers. The next Coffee Morning will be on Wednesday 18th. July at the Slipway Hotel

The Car Boot Sale held at St. Kew Inn raised £26. Once again the event was marred by the rain.

The Lifeboat was called out 4 times at the beginning of the month. The first call was to a capsized sailing dinghy off Port Gaverne. The Lifeboat was out on exercise and was diverted to pick up Edward Fletcher and son Andrew. They were landed at Port Gaverne none the worse for their misfortune. The 3 other calls were to windsurfers that got into trouble off the Camel Estuary. Due to strong off shore winds they were unable to get back into Daymer Bay. 2 persons were rescued by the Lifeboat. One of the rescued, Mr. Robert Ham of London has written to the crew as follows:

'Gentlemen, Please forgive me for not writing to you by name, but the fact that I can write this letter is due in large part to your efforts. I am the drowning windsurfer you rescued from the mouth of the Camel estuary last Sunday. It is impossible to express the depth of my gratitude in words but I found the whole episode, until the arrival of yourselves, an absolutely terrifying experience'. 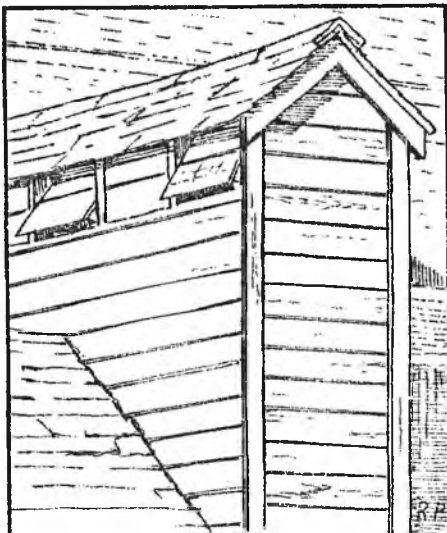
