## PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 14th. November.

### Footpath, Port Isaac Valley

The County Council Footpath Officer is monitoring the poor condition of sections of the path but at present there is nothing to report.

### Finance

All precepts have been drawn and the balance in the bank after this month's payments will be £447.83. With so little available to meet any coming expenditure, it was decided this year to make no donation to the Cornwall Youth Association.

### Refuse Collection

Mr. Stokes said that if the refuse collection is privatised the public will suffer and that our dustmen give a good service. Mrs. Cann said that she felt that all Parish Councils should have been consulted. It was decided to write to N.C.D.C. saying that St. Endellion Parish Council are not in favour of privatisation and that they feel concerned that they were not consulted about an important issue such as this.

### Cliff Footpath

A complaint was received about the speed of lorries and cars driving along the path to the building site for the new houses on the cliff. Pedestrians are being frightened and the seats are being covered in mud. The contractors are to be sent a letter of complaint, with a copy to County Highways.

### School Governors

Mr. James, Mrs. Sproull, Mrs. Williams, Mr. Larkin, Mr. Willmott, Mr. Gladwin, and Mrs. Cann will work with Mr. Bruce and Mrs. Prescott as school governors this year.

### St. Endellion Churchyard

It was suggested that Mr. Barriball might like to get in touch with Fr. Fryer and perhaps organise a working party for a twice yearly 'Churchyard Day' to trim the hedges.

No action is to be taken at present to remind N.C.D.C. that they often take over the upkeep of the old parts of churchyards. It was feared that they might lift the tombstones and put them round the edge of the churchyard to ease maintenance.

'Drive Carefully' Signs, Trelights  
County Highways are to be asked for the signs. Mrs. Richards said that she didn't think anybody would take any notice of them.

### Road Improvement, B.3314

Although the dangerous corner has been removed, the visibility at the exit from Trelights has not been helped. At the last meeting Mr. Dawe had said that he was giving part of his field to improve the corner and the Council are now to ask County Highways when this will happen.

### Road Cleaner, October - March

N.C.D.C. are to be asked to provide street sweeping facilities in Port Isaac, Port Gaverne, and Trelights, in future at least until after the half-term holiday. The mechanised sweeper is unable to operate in the narrow streets of the old village.

### Winter Storage of Boats and Crab Pots

Mr. Welton had been asked by Port Isaac Fishermen to seek the Council's support for their request to use the middle tier of the car park during the winter. Mr. Norris felt that the permission should be extended to everybody, not just the fishermen. Mr. Bolton proposed that a letter be sent saying that the Parish Council have no objection to the idea and that the request, which should be made to N.C.D.C. would receive the Council's support. This was carried by a vote of four to three.

### 'Keep Britain Tidy'

Two 'Project Officers' have been appointed by N.C.D.C. to identify any local problem areas. They are to be invited to come and speak to the Council before the next meeting.

### Planning Site Meetings

Notice was received of meetings at Trelights and New Road, Port Isaac. The Council complained that they had not received the new plans for the Port Isaac development.

### Police Liaison

Notice was given of the meeting by Mid Cornwall Police Liaison Consultative Committee at Bodmin School on 24th. November, at which

members of the public had been invited to attend.

### Diversion of Coastal Footpath

The notice of the proposed diversion at St. Illickswell Gog was received.

### Port Gaverne Toilets

The 'begging letter' for financial help from N.C.D.C. is to be passed to the Environmental Services Committee. In response to an enquiry about the metered cost of water used, the Council has been advised to check on the flushing in the male toilets. Following a request from the public, Mr. Bolton offered to take down the sign during the winter.

### Hartland Road, Light

N.C.D.C. say that the individuals concerned are responsible for any lighting at the rear of the houses and that, if they so wish, they may install their own lights.

### Port Gaverne Valley Footpath

After a meeting at the site with members of the Parish Council and the County Footpath Officer, Mrs. Doney, Mr. Roger Richards, the landowner, has agreed to dedicate a strip of land to allow the path to be routed along a drier course. At the same time proper stream crossings, signposts, etc. will be provided plus steps up the steep hill to Trewetha.

### Parking in Fore Street

A complaint about a parked car preventing the use of his garage was received from Mr. Dawson. The Council will write that they have already requested an all-year ban on parking.

### Planning Applications

No observations to be sent to the Planning Committee concerning: an extension to 'Springside', the home of Dr. Sainsbury at Trewetha; a proposed bow window for the front of Stanley House Mace Shop; or the renewal of permission for a detached bungalow and garage at Port Gaverne, for Mr. N. Cleeve.

### Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. December at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

## PORT ISAAC CP SCHOOL

## VICTIM SUPPORT SCHEME

The National Association of Victim Support Schemes was established as a Charity in August 1979 with the first Scheme starting in Bristol in January 1974 as an experimental project to investigate the needs of victims of crime and how these might best be met.

The Bodmin, Wadebridge and Padstow Area Victim Support Scheme was set up in 1984 by members of the local community who understand the effect a crime can have on people, and who care about the victim.

Victim Support Schemes give help and support to members of the public in a time of crisis following burglary, theft, mugging, cot deaths, accidents, fear, etc., and in some cases murder and rape, but the latter needs very specialized training.

Usually these cases are referred by the police, as they have been called in the first instance, but referrals may come from other sources.

Volunteers are trained to assist and offer support, help and advice following a crime against a person or property if that help is needed. Their visits are free and totally confidential and have the full support of the police.

A V.S.S. team member is directed to visit the person(s) concerned as soon as possible, to give comfort and practical advice in a crisis situation until members of the family

arrive. This may consist of just listening and a cup of tea or arranging to have new locks put on doors and windows. This may be followed, if no family are to hand by helping to fill insurance forms etc and if a Court case follows, perhaps to accompany and give support at such a time.

The Scheme also has the support of a network of experienced people to whom our volunteers are able to turn, including the statutory bodies of the Police and Probation Service as well as Doctors, Solicitors, the Clergy, established voluntary agencies, etc. There are several Victim Support Schemes in Cornwall, all affiliated to the National Association.

In Cornwall, we are fortunate that the crime rate is not, as yet, as high as in other parts of the country and we hope that it will continue to remain so, but the fact that we have teams of people trained to go out in an emergency, to give whatever support is needed in a time of crisis, is not something of which the public is necessarily aware.

Until our Support Scheme is well known, many people will be left uncomfortable, alone, and worried.

Servers from St. Endellion have recently attended services and meetings of the Chapter of St. Petroc and St. James at St. Breock, Wadebridge and Ladock.

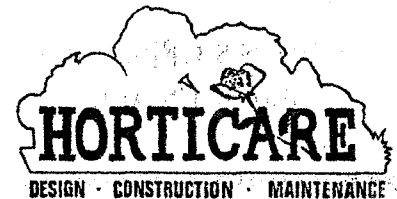

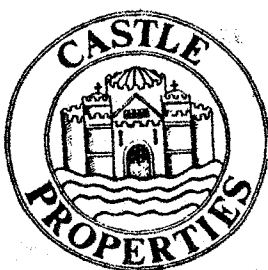

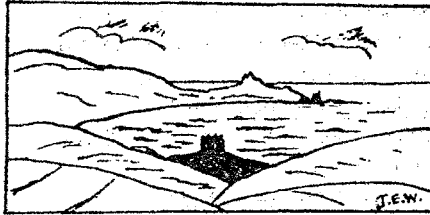
