ST. ENDELLION CHURCHYARD

At a recent meeting of the St. Endellion Parochial Church Council it was decided that, owing to escalating costs of maintenance, they will not proceed with the scheme to extend the existing churchyard by acquiring part of the Glebe Land. The Glebe Committee have been informed and have endorsed this decision.

The Church Council also decided with effect from 1st August to restrict consideration of applications for reservations of grave space in the existing Churchyard to residents of the Civil Parish of St. Endellion and those who are on the Electoral Role of St. Endellion Parish Church. Consideration of any application will in any case be deferred until the next meeting of the Church Council in October, and may take into account the cost of maintaining the existing Churchyard.

It was also decided that in future double fees may be charged for all burials in the Churchyard of those not resident in the Civil Parish of St. Endellion nor on the Electoral Roll of the Parish Church, where this necessitates opening a new grave.

UNTIDY STREETS

Copies of the following letter have been sent to: Gerry Neal, M.P. for North Cornwall, The Highways Department of Cornwall County Council, The Environmental Department of North Cornwall District Council, The District Councillor for this Parish, and St. Endellion Parish Council: Port Isaac is looking shabbier and dirtier than I can remember it. Even in the nineteen-fifties there were men who kept the weeds down and the streets and alleys tidy all the time. Now we seem only to have a picker-up of litter part of the time, apart from a mechanical sweeper which sweeps the main road and tries to do the same in the narrow and irregular Fore Street. The machine cannot even enter the many side lanes and pathways which will become filthy unless they are regularly and properly swept.

At a recent Parish Council meeting a question was raised about the weeds growing at the sides of the streets and alleys in the village and we heard that the County Highways Department are no longer able to do this work because of new 'government accountability' which restricts the use of manpower for this and involves the officers and their staff in much more control work. Can you explain what this means - and why we do not pay any lower rates as a result of the reduced service? Robin Penna.

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 12th. June.

Signs - 'Historic Fishing Village'

The Council is not pressing to have the wording on the nameplates.

Finance

As expenditure this month will mean the bank account will be overdrawn a precept of £1,000 is to be raised.

Footpaths

Councillors were allotted specific footpaths to inspect after trimming has taken place.

Pump - Back Hill

The estimate of £285 was approved last October but work was deferred until the new financial year. As nothing has been done at 'Minepit Corner' it is now looking very untidy and the contractor, Mike Scott, is to be asked to go ahead. Mr. Stokes has offered to do the timber work for nothing.

Footpath 35

Both locally and at County Council level, a number of people are making objections to the proposed diversion involving a climb up a hill and down again. The problem is at present with the legal department. Mr. Welton said it will take two years to process the diversion - longer if there are objections. The Parish Council 'acquiesced' the diversion in March and cannot make any other decision for six months. Meanwhile the public must still use the old footpath.

Women's Employment in Rural Areas

The Rural Development Commission - an organisation replacing CoSIRA apparently - is to conduct a 'research project' in the parishes of Padstow, St. Minver, St. Endellion, St. Teath, and N. Petherwin.

Parking Along The Terrace

Cars which should be in the car park are using The Terrace to avoid payment and causing problems of obstruction. Recently a large van partially blocked the entrance to the road and the dust cart was unable to get through. The police were not able to get the vehicle moved for some time because it has a broken gear box. Vehicles parking at the turn into the road frequently cause problems, so does the brewery delivery lorry. The Highways Dept. is to be notified of the complaint. It was suggested that if the car park were free perhaps people would not need to park on the roads. Mr. Phelps pointed out that it would then be full all the time. He added that there are no free car parks 'up country' and he couldn't see why people were always 'wingeing' about having to pay here. The Parish Council will investigate taking over the car park under future privatisation moves.

Playing Fields Equipment

The roundabout is now very dangerous and is to be inspected immediately to see if it should be dismantled.

The padlock of the gates to the 'coach park' has been replaced by the fishermen, who are allowed to load the articulated lorry there, but no key was given to other users of the gates so the clerk had to obtain cutters to open the gates for the grass cutter to get in. A new lock is to be bought and keys issued to all interested parties with instructions concerning the correct procedure in future. It is important that the key is always available amongst other reasons because the playing fields are the landing area if the Air Ambulance is needed.

Clerk's Correspondence

Gypsies It was recorded that there are no resident gypsies in the parish.

Port Gaverne Toilets A letter from a disabled person thanked the Parish Council for providing the toilets at Port Gaverne but complained that the door cannot be closed when there is a wheel chair inside. Mr. Bolton said he would borrow a wheel chair and verify this.

Refuse Collection Charges

Correspondence from M.P. Gerry Neale, Secretary of State for the Environment Mrs. Virginia Bottomley, and N.C.D.C. about refuse collection revealed that N.C.D.C. may be asked to reconsider their charges to proprietors of bed and breakfast places who presently pay at the full trade rate even out of season, also that the Council members should have been advised that they had a choice of whether or not to instigate trade charges against mixed hereditaments. In some areas one free bin is allowed and the rest are charged for. The problem in Port Isaac is that there is no way of telling whose bin is whose as they are all left together at collection points.

Mr. Welton said that at his hotel they had negotiated successfully with the authorities to get better rates. Cllr. Symons will show the letter from Mrs. Bottomley to the local Environmental Services Committee. Mr. Phelps said that if N.C.D.C. had made a mistake they should pay compensation.

Beach Cleaning Mr. Bolton expressed concern that N.C.D.C. will no longer be responsible for keeping our beaches clean.

Conservation Area Following a meeting between the Chairman of the Parish Council Mrs. Cann, and The Chief Planning Officer Mr. Philp, a letter has been received from M.P. Gerry Neale suggesting that perhaps the Parish Council should consider asking the Planning Department to make another application for an

Article IV Order restricting 'permitted development' in the Conservation Area. This will be discussed at the next meeting. Street Cleaning Letters are still coming in but it is to be announced that we do now have a street cleaner - Mr. Bengier from The Terrace. Mr. Phelps reported that the dust cart leaves a strip of broken glass on the roads every time it stops. The weeds growing everywhere are, however, the responsibility of the Highways department who have no resources to deal with them since they now have to show much more 'accountability' to the government so there is less manpower available.

Planning Applications

Mr. D. Lendon: Renewal of permission for change of use of barn to self-catering cottage, Trewetha. No observations.

Mr. M. Warner: Detailed plans of extension to provide Heritage Coast Interpretation Centre, The Old School Hotel. No observations.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Olive Strout pointed out that one of the conditions of sale of the Old School was that no outside alterations were to be made. Cllr. Symons replied that this point was raised at the site meeting where it was explained that the covenant 'did not hold water'.

Mrs. Vi Richards said if that one did not hold water, perhaps the covenant restricting the use of the playing fields 'coach park' as a car park did not hold water either. Mrs. Cann said the possibility would be investigated.

Mr. Sarfas said he contacted a planning officer who promised to notify Mrs. Willmott, Clerk to the Parish Council, so that written permission would not be needed for his 'Turning Space Only, No Parking' sign at Silvershell View. The notification was not received. Meanwhile it was learned that the Planning Department has no authority to grant planning permission as the land belongs to the Highways Department who have advised Mr. Sarfas that under specific regulations he may display the sign on his own land.

Mr. Penna asked whether a skylight in a cottage roof in the village was 'permitted development'. The Clerk was asked to make enquiries.

Margaret Couch gave 'heartfelt thanks' to Cllr. Symons, the Clerk, and the Parish Council, for finally getting the light at Springside. The public were then asked to leave as the Council needed to discuss the footpath clearing tenders.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. July at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

OLD TREWETHA MINE

I had cause recently to do some research on the old mining activities in the Trewetha area and I thought your readers might be interested in some information which I came upon of which I had no previous knowledge, although I had always known that there was an old mine in Trewetha. According to old mining records the old Trewetha mine, also known as Wheel Boys in the 18th century, was the largest producer of antimony in the United Kingdom and was intermittently worked from a very early period up to a little after the mid 19th Century. In 1906 the mine was re-opened for exploratory purposes, but no production resulted. The mine was noted for the discovery of "Bournonite" and a collection of copper, silver, lead and antimony ores were sold to the British Museum in around 1825 for the sum of £1,000. It seems that the Parish has yet another claim to fame! John Sproull.
