

PORT ISAAC ROWING CLUB

The Club has been formed to revive gig racing at Port Isaac. The chairman is Trevor Beare, and the officers are Chris Keys, John Brown, and Chrissie Coshall.

A start has been made to raise the £13,000 needed to buy and equip the gig, and provided there is sufficient support for the club, grants are expected to be available - age groups 'under 16' and '16 and over'. Gig racing was active at Port Isaac until about 1900, there having been three gigs up to that time, named 'Jane', 'Tom Sayers', and 'Corsair'.

Help is sought from Port Isaac people in two ways:

1. A ballot for the name of the new gig is open to all, whether club members or not. Forms at the Post Office, Port Isaac C. P. School, the Golden Lion, and the Port Gaverne Hotel. Please take part.

Once again thank you all very much.

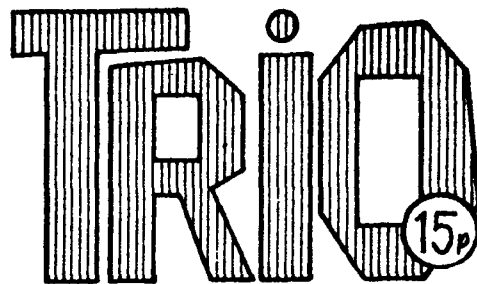

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. October at Trelights.

Last meeting's minutes, amendments .

The Council were asked not to move the seat belonging to Mr. Coulson. Mr. Phelps said that Mr. Penna is not 'Parish Council Adviser on Footpaths' but a 'Member of the Public interested in Footpaths'.

Mrs. Cann requested that in future extra Parish Council meetings be advertised on the boards.

Finance

Total in bank: £4427.01, deposit account: £1505.29

Mr. Penna to get £6.00 for taking the minutes in the clerk's absence.

Accounts to pay, including new playing field equipment: £4665.54 leaving an overdraft of: £238.53

to be covered by donation from Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group.

Mrs. Cann proposed that when the donation is received, a letter is sent to the Group congratulating them on the equipment, the hard work involved in raising the money, thanking them for the donation, and stating that, for technical reasons, the Council have to declare ownership of the equipment for insurance and upkeep purposes.

Dogs Fouling Streets

A holidaymaker had reported disgust at the state of streets in Port Isaac, and the hill at Port Gaverne.

Mr. Stokes said that in Crantock scoops and bags were provided free and that St. Endellion should consider this and perhaps provide special bins. Mr. Phelps said the problem was due to dogs running loose and a letter should be put through every box pointing out that this was illegal. Trio is to be paid to insert a large notice about the problem, once or twice a year.

Footpath Public Meeting

An announcement will be made about this when a date has been decided.

Seats

Mr. Stokes had walked around the Parish and discovered that twenty of the seats only needed painting, ten also needed slight repairs, but a few needed major repairs. The seat at the top of Port Gaverne Hill was completely broken and would be scrapped immediately. The seat at Trewetha Farm could be repaired by shortening the wooden slats and he volunteered to do this himself. Mr. Phelps suggested a type of plastic seat similar to ones supplied by Farm Industries Ltd. be used at predominant sites. They look like timber but need no maintenance. The matter will be discussed at the

next meeting. The twenty seats will be painted and the rest replaced over the next two years. The Clerk was asked to advertise for tenders.

Handrail - Coast Footpath

Mr. Phelps said there should be a slope for invalid chairs, etc., or a notice at the beginning of the path warning about the steps. Mr. Bolton said, a skateboard going down a slope could go over the cliff. The County Council will be asked to review the situation, and for a site meeting with the Parish Council. Mr. Phelps said that perhaps more, shallower steps could be requested.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group asked for the 'No Dogs' sign to be re-sited. Another sign 'Don't abuse the equipment', will be provided by the Parish Council. A request to re-site the swings, which could be expensive, will be considered at the next meeting. The Group will continue to raise money and has plans to buy an 'Elephant Spring Mobile' and a fifteen-piece 'Agility Trail'. The Tennis Club are to be approached about money they raised formerly.

b. Formal notification of the name 'Hillson Close' was received from the Planning Department.

c. The District Council Administrator is not to enforce re-building of the wall demolished at 84 Fore Street but the owner will have to make good the two ends.

Planning Applications

a. Listed Building Consent for New Windows in Front and Side of The Harbour Seafood Restaurant, Mr. and Mrs. W. Aldridge: Further details of the windows requested, to ensure conformation with the requirements.

b. Change of Use of Old Store, Workshop and Garage, to Dwelling, Church Hill, Mrs. Keat: Clarification asked for. Is it change of use, new development, or an extension?

c. Erection of a Garage, Maylands, Port Gaverne, Mr. & Mrs. M. Cox: More information requested about result of previous application.

d. Erection of 4 no Two Bedroom Cottages and 2 no Two Bedroom Flats and Garage Block, Huntsmans Inn, M. Taylor: Felt to be detrimental to the amenities of the area.

e. Erection of Double Garage, 12 The Terrace, Mr. G. Bengier: 'Support'.

f. Demolition of Existing Garage and Erection of Double Garage, Carn Awn, Port Gaverne, Mr. J. May: 'Support'. The Council were notified that a. Change of Use of Part of Reception at Tre-Pol-Pen Hotel for Retail of Handicraft Supplies, and b. Erection of an Extension, 11 Trewetha Lane, had received planning permission.

The Change of Use of Garden to Parking at Halcyon Flats had been refused, but an Appeal was in hand.

Address by Mr. George Down, Cornwall Association of Parish and Town Councils

Mr. Down clarified a few items of procedure. When matters concerned relations, friends, etc., councillors must declare an interest, 'if in doubt, keep out', he said, 'not only for financial interest.'

He suggested that Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group could apply for funds from the Playing Fields Association and the Rural Community Council.

He outlined the Association's efforts to obtain a National Code of Local Government Conduct.

There is often a lack of consultation on street naming, street lighting, tree preservation, land drainage, planning and development, footpath reviews, accident reports (eg. Camelford water disaster), changes in Post Office services (Sunday collections are from boxes attached to Post Offices only), Telecom replacing red kiosks (can be listed as of architectural or historical interest) with glass ones, cable laying, health and social services, education, water and river authorities (even 'down-grading' some rivers). He said there should be transport for all young children to school in view of modern dangers and they are not accompanied by their elders who do get transport.

Public Discussion

a. Mrs. Brown thanked the Council for helping to keep St. Endellion churchyard looking so beautiful. She said the removal of hedges on Mr. Sloman's land causes a problem for walkers, and 'Leave the seat by the chapel where it is, please'.

b. Mrs. Strout hoped that the Council would beware of development in Port Isaac Valley, 'the prettiest place you could find'.

D. The Council were asked to arrange a meeting with N.C.D.C. and the Housing Association to discover how allocations at Hillsons Close were being dealt with.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. November at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

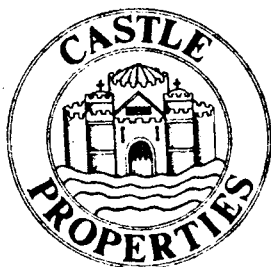
