
BBC RADIO CORNWALL

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

David Bolton, Chairman of the Parish Council, said much criticism was received but there was no election now as many people just could not be bothered to stand. He regretted the untidy village - we only have one road sweeper so we should do more to help ourselves. Dogs can't be stopped from roaming around the village. There is no money to increase parking for the few months when it is needed. It would be a shame to close the old quay path at Port Gaverne because of rock falls. It is no good shouting at the Parish Council about the Hillsons Close house allocation. Thanks to both Port Isaac Playing Field Action Group and Trelights Coronation Park Committee. Speed restrictions were necessary where the B3267 entered the village.

Finally he welcomed Carey the milk, Provis the meat, and Philp the veg. to the new Parish Council.

District Councillor Henry Symons spoke about unexpected difficulties at the new St. Endellion burial ground site; litter in the streets, and a proposed letter to every member of the parish about domestic refuse collection. No help would be available with the financing of Port Gaverne toilets.

County Councillor Harvey Lander rued a repeat of the 1973 upheaval if the government again altered council status. Cornwall is still a low-spending authority. The County Council administer the education, fire, library, planning, police, county farms, record office, social services, trading standards, and local transport services.

Police Sergeant Terry Johns introduced Mrs. Debbie Hunt who was taking Sergeant Le Bailly's place. Crime detection for the area was slightly improved with 294 detections out of 925 incidents. Thefts from and damage to motor vehicles still main problem - not enough care taken by car owners.

Mrs. Dingle asked about drugs and was told that there is a problem here although not so much as on the south coast.

Mr. Penna said that notification of the refuse collection arrangements should be given to all visitors. Mr. Stokes reported on the lack of

car parking on the day of the gig launching. This made it clear that the facilities were insufficient and that business was being lost.

Mrs. Pethick asked about a pay and ride scheme, but this had already been found financially non-viable. Mr. A'Court hoped that the newly repaired lane at Trelights would not be used by regular traffic. He also queried grit bins at Long Cross but not on the two hills.

Mrs. Pethick said you take your life in your hands at St. Endellion church - the junction at the end of the lane is much worse. Mr. Lander replied he would get it looked into. Mr. Shute suggested a speed recorder could be used in Trelights.

Dr. Barron, proposed thanks to the chairman and guests, and said that dogs were on the agenda in 1966.

Mr. Bolton summed up the meeting and said thank you to Mrs. Willmott who was resigning as Clerk's to the Council after eight years.

Trelights Village Green Representative: Harry Barriball, Rohan Carey. Under a 'four-year rule' Bill Norris continues on the Board of School Governors until November 1993 but it was proposed that the matter be discussed next month.

Glebe Land, St. Endellion

The planning application for the new burial ground has been approved, but Henry Symons advised about problems with electricity cables and water supplies running across the land. There could now be second thoughts about buying the land. This will be discussed next month.

Finance

The first half of the precept, £3,857.16, has been received and £1,500 is to be put in the deposit account. A £25 donation was made to the Fire Brigade Benevolent Fund for hosing down the dangerous cliff at Port Gaverne, and the £350 promised to the Village Hall was paid.

Annual Parish Meeting

The lane had been cleared as requested but Mr. Barriball feared the road-like surface could encourage use by vehicles which might be dangerous. County Councillor Lander has promised that the gritting bins will be re-sited.

Minepit Corner

A 'dangerous' rock above the pump had been inspected and declared safe, but the seat committee will have a look before deciding where the donated seat should go.

Steps at Doctor's Meadow

The nearby householder will be asked if arrangements can be made to stop rain water from his down pipe cascading down the steps.

St. Endellion Festival - Parking

The chairman of the Festival is to be asked if alternative parking can be found to prevent annoyance to residents of The Barton.

Caravan on Slipway

It was felt that the caravan for the car park attendant spoiled the look of the quay but Mark Provis felt the matter was no business of the Parish Council and should be referred to the Planning Office or the Harbour Commissioners.

Notice Board at Fish Cellars

The board was in a terrible condition and tenders for a new one, half-size, are to be sought.

Safety at Junction, top of Back Hill

County Highways are to be asked also to look at the New Road/Back Hill/Fore Street junction when they come to consider the dangerous B-road between the playing field and the new housing estate.

Footpaths

Notices advertising for tenders for trimming are to go up. Bill Dawe (absent) wanted County and District Councils asked if they would reimburse the Parish Council were they to include the 'Co-op' path between New Road and Tintagel Terrace, Little Lane, and Doctor's Meadow, in the trimming.

Clearing Laybys and Litter

David Phelps suggested that County Highways be asked to clear some old asphalt from Poltreworgey lay-by. Trewetha laybys will be cleared. At present litter bins are not cleared on Saturdays but with the 'season' the situation should improve. Meanwhile Henry Symons proposed that the District Council be asked what arrangements are being made for the summer.

Litter Collection at Fish Cellars

Bill Dawe will be asked to refer the District Council to the possibility of a different site for the refuse which presently piles up in front of the building. Plans for bins inset into the Platt were turned down by the Harbour Commissioners, and now a platform over the stream was envisaged which could cause problems as it is a 'listed' building.

Port Gaverne Toilets - Finance

The District Council Environmental Services Committee Policy, endorsed by the full Council, is not to assist with the cost of the public toilets at Port Gaverne. The Parish Council will have to pay the £1,500 annual costs or close the toilets. Mrs. Willmott, clerk, will contact Christopher Beazley, Euro MP, with a copy of the letter to Sir Gerry Neale MP, to see whether there are any EEC grants available.

Clerk's Correspondence

- The possibility of a donation towards 'Port Isaac Week' will be discussed next month.
- Mrs. Barron is to be asked if she would like to prepare a flower arrangement for the St. Endellion Church Flower Festival. Should she demur, David Philp will be asked.
- Letters from County Highways said that they will consider the approach road into the village and the position of the 30mph. signs.
- Mrs. Strout of Trelights thanked Bill Dawe and the Council for

the improved lane which she could now use with a pram instead of the roads. She was sorry that the similar improvement at Port Isaac had not been carried out.

e. The flushing gate for the stream by Mark Provis' butcher's shop is in hand with Irons of Wadebridge but seems to be delayed.

f. Mrs. Willmott gave notice of the annual audit.

g. The Council is keen for the village to take part in a TSW winter production 'Village Green'.

h. A pan-European event 'Beacon Europe 1992' will be discussed next month. Henry Symons pointed out that the field with the reservoir at Higher Town, St. Endellion, has the name 'Beacon Parc'.

i. A document about Civil Protection was handed to David Phelps.

j. John Sweet, in a letter, felt that as he was having hip problems someone else ought to do the work for the Parish Council in future.

Planning Applications

The Council discussed, and supported, plans for amendments to the extensions at 'Silverspray', Port Gaverne. They made no observations about the revised position of a window in existing plans for a garage at 61 Fore Street.

Plans for Dennis Knight's renewed permission for a garage, with additions, and new vehicular access at 41 Fore Street, were too dark to read and a new set was requested.

Public Discussion

Carol Richards said progress was continuing with the Playing Field equipment and that they had received a Telethon grant of £500 and a donation of about £168 from Pearce builders. Arrangements were in hand to transfer the former Tennis Club money to P.I.P.F.A.G. funds. She was hopeful that the Group would not need to ask for any more money but was open to ideas from Trio readers. She also asked if it was possible to see the rules for School Governors. Melanie Dingle asked if the representative on the board of School Governors ought not to report back to the Council. She was also informed that members of the public may inspect the Parish Council minutes. Mrs. Steel suggested that coin operated locks be fitted at Port

Gaverne toilets. This will be considered next month but cubicles for the disabled would have to be free, so everybody would use them. David Gomm said the light in Lundy Road, re-positioned on Trewetha Lane a few years ago, should be returned to its original position.

Robin Penna asked whether a Parish Council contract (reimbursed by the District Council) could be considered, for someone to clear litter bins at weekends if the District Council cannot provide this service.

Anna Harris expressed anxiety that the car park notice board would not be in place in time for the season. She was assured that the matter is in hand and should be resolved in two weeks time.

Exclusion of Public

The public were then asked to leave while the Council discussed tenders for the erection of the notice board and applications for the position of Clerk to the Council.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. June at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.



Wine of the Month

The traditional wine for April is Dandelion and the flowers are supposed to be picked at midday on St. George's Day - nothing to do with Piskies or Witches' Brew - simply that it's best to pick them at this time of the month and when the sun is on them and all the little insects have come out of them! To measure the amount of flowers simply use a pint measure and fill it without pressing the flowers down.

INGREDIENTS

6 pints dandelions, 3lbs sugar, 2 lemons, 1 orange, 1lb. raisins, 1 cup strong tea or 1 teaspoon grape tannin, yeast nutrient - a packet of wine yeast + water to make 1 gallon of wine.

METHOD

Pick the flowers off their stalks, put into a bucket and cover with 6 pints boiling water. Cover tightly and leave for 2 days, stirring twice daily. Now turn into a boiler add grated rind of the orange and lemons, pour in sugar, and boil for an hour. Return all to the bucket and add the juice and pulp of the orange and lemons (get rid of as much of the pith as you can as it can give a bitter taste to your wine), stir well and allow to get very cool. Add the tea, yeast nutrient, and yeast. Let it stay closely covered in a warm place for 3 days, stirring twice daily. Then strain into a demi-john. Put the raisins into a colander and pour boiling water over them. When cool add to the wine in the demi-john, fit it with an air-lock and leave until fermentation ceases. Rack when it clears. Wine made this month should be ready to drink at Christmas.

Recipe MACKEREL WITH HORSERADISH

For 4 people:

4 medium size mackerel,
1/2 pint milk, 1 bayleaf,
6 peppercorns, 1oz. butter,
1 onion peeled and finely chopped, 1oz. plain flour,
2 level teaspoons horseradish cream, salt and pepper. Watercress and tomatoes to garnish.

METHOD

Clean and fillet mackerel. Lay in ovenproof dish, pour on milk, add bayleaf and peppercorns. Cover with foil and cook on centre shelf of oven at 375° F (gas mark 5) for 20 - 30 min. Carefully lift fish onto plate and keep warm while making sauce. Strain and keep the liquor. Melt butter in pan, add onion and fry slowly until soft but not brown. Remove from heat, stir in flour, and gradually blend in liquor. When smooth return to heat and bring to the boil stirring all the time. Stir in horseradish and seasoning to taste. Arrange fish back in dish, coat with sauce, and add garnish if required.

Parish Council - report of April's meeting

Wall and Steps, Port Gaverne.

Since the County Council have said that they are not responsible for the beach wall which is eroding, it is hoped that the National Trust may take care of the problem. The steps from the old quay are becoming dangerous and a warning notice is to be erected until repair work can be carried out. Tenders are to be sought for the work.

Light in Margaret's Lane.

A quotation for £115 to fix the light with a meter and time switch was accepted. The householder whose wall the light will be placed on is willing to co-operate with the scheme. It was asked for the matter of the extra light in Church Hill to be put on the agenda for next month.

Overhead Lines, Playing Field.

Concern expressed at the possible danger to users of the field. SWEB to be asked whether possible to divert these (11kv) lines away from the playing field.

Pinehaven - Port Quin Path.

The Countryside Commission are making representation to the Secretary of State to request the creation of this missing stretch of the South-West Coastal Footpath. Decided by the Parish Council on a vote of 5 to 2 against, not to support the application.

Right of Way Agency.

As from April 1st. this year all footpath matters to be dealt with by Cornwall County Council, Truro. Any enquiries

to be directed there instead of the local Council offices as formerly

Countryside Subject Plan.

A document about as thick as a telephone directory, dealing with Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (eg. Port Isaac) to be circulated among the Parish Councillors whose comments are sought by 30th. April. A poster is also to be displayed.

Lundy Road, Adoption?

On receipt of plans for building development it was asked whether the road was suitable for additional use. Feeling, however, that adoption not desired by occupants.


