Dear Sir, I have been following the saga of weed-filled and dog-fouled pathways in Port Isaac for some time and, contrary to many opinions, I hold the view that N.C.D.C. are doing an extremely efficient job. My wife and I (one can immediately tell that this a high class letter) own two properties in Port Isaac, one occupied by an elderly relative and the other used for occasional weekends during the year. We are soon going to swap and I shall have a boundary with a public footpath some fifty metres long. During the Spring holiday I cut our hedge - as I should - then became incensed by the state of the path. I shall call it Dr. George's Field, but it could be any of a dozen. It took almost two hours to clear the weeds, cans, crisp packets and sundry other canine items which I am too polite to mention. On reflection four points came to mind: 1. The Council doesn't pay anyone to clear the paths. 2. I clear the paths outside my property - and I don't come cheap. 3. The Council charges us the equivalent of two Community Charges to use the facilities they provide for about six weeks in the year. 4. The Council now charges me to take away their weeds. It appears to be a war of attrition on the Council's part - which they have won as far as I am concerned. If nothing is done for long enough then aesthetes such as I are forced to do their work. But it is cost effective! Think of the money that could be saved if the whole of North Cornwall was declared a zone for visitors and short-stay property owners only! I cannot give my name, or the Council may trace me and charge me for stealing their weeds. Name and address supplied.

BEEF CHIARELLO For 4 people.
20 oz. chuck steak or rump skirt cut into strips about 2in. x 3/4in, 1 large onion cut in half and sliced, 6 - 8 oz. mushrooms sliced, 1 medium clove garlic chopped fine, 1/2 pint beef stock, 1 wineglass red wine or dry sherry, salt, pepper, thyme, and tarragon.
Fry beef strips in oil (olive or sunflower best) until slightly brown. Add onions and garlic and stir for a few minutes, then add the mushrooms and cook for about 10-15 minutes, stirring all the time. Add the stock, wine and seasonings to your own taste. Place in casserole and cook for about an hour at 180 degrees centigrade. Sprinkle with parsley and serve with new or mashed potatoes and green vegetables. If you do not use wine or sherry, add some diluted mushroom ketchup or soy sauce instead. If you use top rump steak, this meal can be done entirely in a deep pan on a ring in about 15 minutes. Fred.

asked whether any help is available to pay for the cost of the toilets which otherwise may have to be closed. Mr. Dawe said thanks were due to Mr. Symons for trying to get funding from N.C.D.C., and would now continue with the endeavour.

Sewage Outfall Pipe

Mr. Provis reported that the pipe had discharged from 8am. to 4pm. one day and that the S.W. Water Authority, when telephoned, said the sludge is normally discharged for half an hour at night but that something had gone wrong. Mr. Bolton said three 'bugs' had been detected in the sea water but were supposedly harmless. Mr. Provis asked for Port Isaac and Port Gaverne to be tested routinely by the National Rivers Authority. Mr. Dawe said he had a telephone call from a resident who had heard a visitor say, 'I've never noticed a farmyard smell in Port Isaac before'. Mr. Phelps also commented on the new green growth to be seen on Castle Rock. Mr. Symons said the discharge took place as the tide was going out but when the wind blew from the north it was blown back into the harbour. The alternative, removing the sludge from the sewage works by tanker, would be even more smelly. 'At least there is still life on the beach and under the rocks,' said Mr. Provis, 'but I would hate to see everything dead.' The Clerk was asked to write to S.W.W.A. and ask them to arrange a public visit to the treatment works.

Light in Lundy Road

A meeting would be held at the site on Wednesday 12th. June.

Coastal Footpath from Car Park

Mrs. Willmott reported that, due to the terrible surface, people on the seats got splashed when cars went through the puddles. Mr. Wherry of Highways is to do some work on the path, now adopted as a 'category A' footpath, which had not been done before because the contractor had been deterred by 'private' signs.

Clerk's Correspondence

- The notice board for the car park has been delivered.
- A footpaths letter from Mr. Penna will be discussed next month.
- A letter of thanks for donation, from Fire Service Benevolent Fund.
- Local Government Structure Plan to be circulated among councillors.

e. Mr. Symons offered to attend a 'Wildlife Act in North Cornwall' meeting at Wadebridge.

f. A letter from Mr. Cook, for St. Endellion Festival, said that they were looking for answers to the car parking problem in Trelights.

g. Mr. Philp will prepare the parish council Flower Festival display.

h. N.C.D.C. to be advised about the rock falls at Port Gaverne in the interests of public safety.

i. Mr. Philp announced that, at a Village Hall extraordinary meeting, all committee members had offered to resign at the lack of public support for fund raising events. Only four or five people turned up for the 'Horse Racing'. The committee have worked hard and deserve congratulations but are very disappointed.

Mr. Powell, Chairman, invited to speak, said, 'We will carry on and finish the heating and double-glazing; it is awkward to hand grants on to a new committee. But there will be no more fund raising. Much time and personal expense has been involved - we expect to lose £300 - £400 over the 'Horse Race'.'

Planning Applications a. Renewal of permission for alterations and erection of extensions, new garage, and formation of vehicle access at 41 Fore Street, Mr. D. Knight: No observations.

b. Erection of detached garage, Pentreath, Trelights, Mr. P. J. Lobb: Mr. Dawe asked why they were asked to discuss this. There had been a garage on the site for 45 years and this one had been started seven years ago. The Council voted in support of the application but would ask why it was necessary.

Public Discussion

Mr. Lobb, who has lived in Trelights for 31 years asked, "When did the 'evacuees' make it a 'Village of Outstanding Beauty', I don't regard it as such." Mr. Symons replied that the whole area was designated an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty' a long time ago.

Before the meeting closed, Chairman David Bolton thanked Mrs. Willmott for all her work during her term of office as Clerk to the Council.

PARISH COUNCIL

A report of the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. July.

The room was packed, with many members of the public present.

Mr. Bolton introduced Mrs. Powell, the new Clerk.

Poltreworgey Layby

Mr. Phelps said the condition was getting worse, and the verges at Trewetha had still not been cleared.

The Clerk was asked to contact Highways again, also S. W. Water.

Refuse Bins and Litter

Mr. Provis said that a N.C.D.C. representative had warned of stiff penalties for people caught using the litter bins for other types of refuse. A letter from Mr. Pyeman, N.C.D.C. outlined the provisions made for refuse collection and street sweeping in Port Isaac, stated that a letter is being sent to owners of all holiday cottages advising them that suitable containers must be provided for refuse and arrangements made to put them out at the correct times only.

Mr. Provis said it is unfair that businesses should pay for refuse collection when holiday cottage owners get the service free.

Mr. Phelps urged everyone to write to Sir Gerry Neale about the 113% increase in the business rate.

Finance

Monthly payments of £171.39 leave £270.39 in the current a/c, and £2062.32 on deposit. Mr. Welton, Treasurer, was given delegated power to transfer the deposit a/c to a higher interest account if suitable. A donation of £100 was made to Trio newsletter, and £50 towards the 'Port Isaac Week' funds. No donation was made to The National Trust for the upkeep of Port Gaverne Slipway.

Upkeep of Memorial Seats

It was decided that the seats should be maintained, and replaced when necessary, by the Parish Council.

Signs at Commercial Premises

Many people had complained of 'chalk boards' outside commercial premises.

'It looks like Blackpool,' said Mr. Bolton. But N.C.D.C. can do nothing providing the boards don't block the pavements. The Chairman of Port Isaac and District Tourism Association has said they will have a quiet word with the businesses concerned.

Flooding, Coronation Park, Trelights

Mr. Barriball spoke about the water in the road in front of the entrance to the park. Highways are to be asked to try and solve the problem.

Trewetha Lane

Mr. Phelps said it is a dangerous road and the signposting inadequate. In places there are no pavements but many children about. Rumble strips could be used to slow traffic down. The Clerk is to write to Highways again and stress the concern of the Parish Council about safety on the road and request, once again, that a site meeting is held.

Washing Lines, Hillson Close

It was said that the Housing Association should have given more consideration to providing an enclosed area to hang washing in.

R.N.L.I. Boathouse

The Council is to write to the Lifeboat Institution and ask if they are aware of the strong feelings and reduced co-operation that will arise in the village if they build the proposed boathouse. The Council had categorically rejected plans for a building that would change the appearance of the Conservation Area. Mr. Phelps said, with full regard for the work done by the R.N.L.I., nobody else would be able to get away with such a development. Mr. Symons pointed out that when plans are rejected, they usually win on appeal.

The date is to be announced soon. (Wednesday evening: 31st. July, 1st. August, or 7th. August?)

Glebe Land

Mr. Symons said that to move the electricity supply pole, on the land intended for the extension to the St. Endellion burial ground, would normally cost £2-3,000, but on speaking to S.W. Electricity Board, they had agreed to move the pole at

no cost when carrying out routine re-wiring work in 2 - 3 years time.

TSW Village Competition

A committee of Messrs. Phelps, Stokes, and Dawe was formed to act as the parish link with TSW in the forthcoming competition.

Carnival at Playing Fields

Permission was granted for the use of the field on Friday 9th. August. (The 7th. has also been given.)

Seat at Minepit Corner

The Seat Committee reported that the site was unsuitable for a movable wooden seat and a tender for a stone based one, as in Church Hill, is to be sought. The John Cann memorial seat will replace the present 'Co-op' seat in New Road, which will in turn be moved to the Playing Fields.

Representative to School Governors

Mr. Phelps said that it was requested at a previous meeting for this item to be on the agenda. The letter which all councillors had received was therefore incidental. Mr. Bolton said that as it was unsigned it was not a legal document but, as the council wished, would consider the matter, nevertheless. Mr. Phelps complained that the Council had been led to believe, at the Annual General Meeting, there was a vote for a new appointment, and only after he had registered an amendment were they informed that the post runs for four years and an election was unnecessary. Mr. Norris said he had unsuccessfully tried to stop it. Mr. Symons underlined the fact that the representative can only be removed from the post if guilty of a serious allegation. He need not make reports to the Parish Council (but ought perhaps to speak at the Annual Public Meeting), and many matters discussed by the school governors are confidential and could not be disclosed anyway. People have the right to appeal to the Chairman of the Governors, not the Parish Council. A motion, by Mr. Stokes, to close the matter, was carried.

Footpath Allocations

Messrs. Barriball, Bolton, Philp, Stokes, Symons, and Welton were allocated specific footpaths to check, after trimming, to see the work had been done satisfactorily.

PORT ISAAC BROWNIES


