CHATTERBUS

The Chatterbus is a mobile 'Project and Resource Centre' for young people of the 14+ age group, and offers a range of facilities for youth work. It operates within a 30-mile radius, and is at Port Isaac playing fields, Wednesday evenings from 7.30pm. At the moment about 15 young people meet regularly. Members of the community are invited to become involved with the young people using the bus and the work taking place.

The Chatterbus Project

Social education, lunch-time drop-ins, evening groups, and outreach community work with young people from school is done on the campus of Wadebridge, and Camelford Schools. Projects include residential work, and outdoor education at the coast and on Bodmin Moor. A weekend residential at a farm on the moor, with all the planning done by the young people, is proposed for the 19th. July.

KEEP VILLAGE TIDY



PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. July.

Finance

Mr. Welton, Treasurer, announced that the sum on deposit had been placed in a higher interest 'Business Premium' account. £1,000 would be transferred from this account to meet current expenses and leave a balance of £2,077.71.

Footpaths

Now that there is a growing interest in paths, it was agreed that some of them are not as good as they might be. Their use should be encouraged and problems taken more seriously, but both sides of the question must be considered.

In future, trimming of Dr. George's Field and the path beside the Co-op to be included in the annual tender.

Glebe Land

Confirmation of the arrangement with S.W.E.B. has not yet been received.

Light in Lundy Road

A decision is dependent on whether N.C.D.C. will pay for electricity.

Gate in St. Endellion Lane

A letter from Mr. Hawken stated that the gate was not his property but he would leave it open in future. This is not Parish Council responsibility but as there is danger of it falling on somebody, the matter is to be referred to County Highways.

Port Gaverne Toilets

The National Trust were not in a position to help with finance but said the facility is a 'shining example'. Information from Euro MP Beazley said the toilets are not eligible for E.C. assistance. The only other way to raise the money would be to increase the precept - from the Community Charge.

School Governors Report

The quarterly meetings mostly discussed the building and its maintenance said Mr. Norris. Staff are chosen by the Education Office - the governors can only make recommendations.

Equipment for Clerk's Use

The old filing cabinet has finally collapsed and a new one costing only £85 is to be obtained to replace it.

Tenders for Painting & Oiling Seats

The schedule is to be drawn up by the seats committee.

Chatterbus at Playing Field Car Park

As the bus can't use the public car park in the summer, it was decided to allow it into the Playing Field car park, for intermittent periods only. The public liability insurance position is to be checked.

Light Behind Council Houses

N.C.D.C. is to be asked again if they will provide lighting behind the council houses at Hartland Road - Trewetha Lane.

Parish Boundaries and Planning

Mr. Philp asked if the Planning Authority would supply information about applications for development in other parishes adjacent to the parish boundary.

Car Park Notice Board

The fee for the four remaining years of a five year N.C.D.C. licence will be increased from £5 to £10 and Port Isaac and District Tourism Association are to be asked if they will pay half of this.

Health Service Report

Mr. Symons expressed the fear that new financing arrangements could be at the expense of patient care. It was suggested a letter be sent to the Association of Parish Councils.

Litter Platform over the Leat

Wheely bins are no longer provided so a cage for litter collection, placed over the stream beside the fish cellars, is to be considered.

Donkey Derby at the Playing Fields

Permission was given for this use on 23rd. and 27th. August.

Resiting of Swings & Elephant

The swings are to be left where they are. Mr. Dawe has offered to provide the foundation for the elephant.

R.N.L.I. Boat House

Concern was expressed that the building to be erected would be in a form unacceptable to the Parish Council and that it would radically alter the appearance of the Platt, the centre of the village and in the heart of the Conservation Area. It was understood the design conformed to N.C.D.C. recommendations. A representative from R.N.L.I. was to meet the Parish Council on 18th. July, but if the outcome of this was unsatisfactory the Parish Council would demand that a public meeting should be held to allow the residents of Port Isaac to express their very strong views. Under the 'Access to Information' regulations, the public can inspect the plans at Barn Lane, Bodmin.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. The National Rivers Authority are to take regular samples of the sea water at Port Isaac and South West Water are to closely monitor the lunar clock which controls the times of the sludge outfall.

b. When the landscaping at Hillson Close has had time to take effect, the washing lines will be adequately screened from sight.

c. 30mph. signs are placed at street lighting boundaries. Elsewhere an Act of Parliament is required.

d. Mr. Phelps thought that overgrown verges between Port Isaac and Trewetha could cause an accident.

e. A pedestrian crossing near the school will not be provided.

f. New buildings for suitable House Design Awards will be sought.

g. No gypsy caravans are recorded in the parish.

h. Gully clearing and road resurfacing are to improve the drainage at Coronation Park, Trelights.

i. Port Isaac Old School has now been de-registered as a school.

j. The matter of direction signs in the village will be delayed two months while the department concerned changes its premises.

k. A licence application by the new owners of Stanley House grocers.

l. The N.C.D.C. Direct Services organisation advised that they should be asked to tender for many kinds of work.

m. A public transport map will be put on the car park notice board.

n. The flush gate for the leat is nearly ready.

Planning Applications

a. As the site is considered too small, the development next to The Moorings, Port Gaverne, has been refused by the Planning Department.


b. Demolition of a wall at Valencia House, Trewetha Lane. Mr. A. Walton: This has already been done so no other observations could be made. The Planning Authority is to be asked to issue a revocation order for an earlier application to demolish another part of the wall.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Richards thanked Mr. Dawe for attending a meeting to 'wind down' Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group now that they had achieved their goal. She also thanked Mr. Phelps for stopping an alsatian running loose in the playing fields. Mrs. Dingle said the Chatterbus was used by the 14+ age group and should be sited nearer to public toilets. She also feared that it might be in the sight line of people living at Hillson Close. Mrs. Strout spoke strongly about the proposed Lifeboat House on the Platt - the oldest part of the village and if altered - the heart of Port Isaac - it would be the thin end of the wedge. There was an old capstan there from the time when it was a hard working harbour. Boats would have to be moved out of the way when launching the lifeboat. Also the run of the water hits that point during heavy ground seas. Why move from present position anyway? If the young people don't take a bit of interest in their village then she was sorry for their kids and what they've got coming to them. Mr. McNichol said people who have raised a lot of money for the R.N.L.I. would be upset to see it being wasted like this.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. August at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

July, crew members John Collins, Steve Hudspith and Andy Walton rescued Alistair Gell, of Penn, Bucks, and Sarah Coleman, of Milton Keynes, both windsurfers who got into difficulties in the Camel estuary. Three German visitors, cut off by the tide, were rescued from Castle Cove, Tintagel, on Wednesday. Crew: Neville Andrews, Richard Hambly, and Andy Walton. All twelve crew members who sat the RNLI's Advanced First Aid Course recently, have passed the exams. This is the first time at any station that all those who took the course have passed.

With deep regret, we learned of the deaths of both Mollie and Peter Tabor, the donors of our current lifeboat. Since making their generous gift they had kept closely in touch with us: we shall miss two very charming people.

NEW ZEALAND LETTER

Firstly, may I say how good it is to receive Trio. In the last issue, James Platt had a letter on his memories of Rose Hill. James and I were boys of about the same age, but unlike James, I was a 'foreigner', and I only lived in Port Isaac for eight happy years from 1944. While living in England, my holidays were always in Port Isaac. Since living in New Zealand I have been back five times. I find my mind going back to my Port Isaac days quite a lot. Rose Hill was a special place to me, the White House in particular, with the Rambler rose climbing over the windows and arum lilies in the corner. Westlake Brown and I kept up a correspondence until his death. The flushing gate is being brought back into use. In our day, Mr. Ned Cowling used to come down each morning and at holiday time there were usually some boys waiting to see how much he would let the water build up; if it came up over the road, it was a good one. When he let go there would be a rush to watch it flood out onto the beach. We moved to Port Isaac just about the time the boats stopped fishing for herrings. I remember watching one of the last catches being shaken out of the nets, onto the beach, and seeing kippers being made in Pawlyn's Cellars. Every morning there would be a wonderful smell of freshly baked bread from Sherratts' shop: large loaf 4 pence ha'penny. An evening treat would be a tuppenny worth of chips and a pennyworth of peas, in a newspaper cone, from Mrs. Keat's, to be eaten on the Platt. Another treat was ninepence for a film show in a shed at the back of Lobb's Garage on a Friday evening; the seats were planks of wood. There were always a few breakdowns at which the boys would let out a big cheer and Mr. Rosevear would get up and wave a stick to quieten things down. Rabbiting around the cliffs to Port Quin, with permission from the Coppins and Mr. Thomas; going out fishing with Sam Thomas in 'The Boy Terry', and many other pursuits made for great memories. So much better than any Video or T.V. can ever offer. Thank you Port Isaac. Gerald Cheshire.



SOUTH AFRICAN BEAN STEW

Soak 1lb. each of Red kidney, pinto (speckled), and haricot beans overnight. Boil them separately until half tender. Brown some chopped onion in oil, add chopped carrots, chopped celery, white turnip or swede, and let simmer for 10 minutes. Add the beans with a little of each one's liquid to cover, add salt, pepper and a vegetable stock cube. Simmer until tender, and serve sprinkled with parsley. If you want to make it into a meat dish fry some cubed beef or lamb with some chopped smoked bacon and add these before the onion.


