STOP PRESS

At the monthly meeting (see report overleaf), the Parish Council decided to hold an extraordinary meeting to explore the possibility of having the lean-to store adjacent to the market house - the site for the proposed new lifeboat station - 'listed' as a Building of Special Architectural or Historical Importance, under Section 54 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971. At the meeting, however, it was discovered that the words 'lean-to store on ground floor' had been overlooked in the schedule relating to the Market House. On checking with the Planning Department at Bodmin, it seemed that the building probably was 'listed' all the time (Continued on page 4, column 3)

PARISH COUNCIL

Please note: this report is not taken from the official minutes but from notes written independently by a member of the public, during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. August.

Finance

£550 to be transferred from deposit to cover £475.35 monthly expenditure and leave a balance of £108.20 in the current account.

Signs to New Surgery

County Highways to be asked to expedite signs already commissioned by the doctors.

R.N.L.I. Boathouse

Concerning the disapproval of the Council of the design for the proposed new boathouse, a letter from a secretary said the Prince of Wales was interested in the matter and thanked the Parish Council for drawing it to his attention. The Department of the Environment will be asked for an immediate reply as this is a matter of urgency. Mr. Symons said his duty as a District Councillor had been to present the view of the whole District, not just St. Endellion from whom he had received no representation other than from the Parish Council. Other building adjacent had been approved eg. the balcony which deterred from the visual character more. Mr. Welton felt that Cllr. Symons should have taken the view of the Parish Council. Mr. Provis said the new house in Middle Street had been built properly - it can be done. Mr. Dawe said the roof of the old shed is still watertight in spite of the wet summer and the R.N.L.I. architect was trying to pull the wool over our eyes.

Litter Platform over the Leat

The N.C.D.C. plan to have this done by next spring. Mr. Provis said that the flushing gate had been installed and was working properly.

Notice Board at Trelights

Mr. Barriball reported that the board is in a bad condition with the back coming out. Tenders will be sought for a new board.

Doctor's Meadow and Co-op Path

(Mr. Dawe pointed out that the first path should properly be called 'Doctor George's Field'). The two

paths will now be maintained by the County Council Direct Labour Force, as rights of way in a built up area, and charged to the Parish Council who will seek reimbursement from the District Council.

TSW Village Green Competition

Mr. Stokes reported that Port Isaac was in the last ten of the total of 80 villages but not among the final eight selected, although the village may be involved in the next series.

Traffic Signs

A new sign 'Port Isaac - please drive slowly through the village' will be sited on the opposite side of the B.3267 road and the 'To the harbour' sign is to be removed from the junction at New Road. A complaint is to be sent to County Highways regarding 'trenches' across the road.

Funding for Port Gaverne Toilets

A reply from English Tourist Board said such funding ended in 1989 but suggested the West Country Tourist Board might be able to help.

Old Telephone Kiosks

As they are in Heritage Locations, the Department of the Environment will include the St. Endellion box and that in Church Hill on the Statutory Grade II Listing of Buildings of Historic or Architectural Interest. Mr. Phelps said we are pleased to have the two but asked for reconsideration of the kiosk near the church hall and that at Trelights.

Mr. Provis said that it didn't make sense that a telephone kiosk was listed but the old linney where the new lifeboat house would be was not. Mr. Symons suggested the Council apply to have it listed and an extraordinary meeting for this was convened for Monday 19th. August.

Light in Lundy Road

The Parish Council would have to pay about £200 for a new light. SWEB are to be asked to adjust the angle of the light at the main road so that it shines down Lundy Road as well.

Clerk's Report and Correspondence

a. A seat on the Main has been badly burned by being used for a barbecue. It may be replaced by one of the green ones after the purchase of a new black one. To be considered by the Seats Committee who will report to the next meeting.

c. A letter from Mr. Penna said the railing on the steps next to Vine Cottage in Rose Hill, scheduled for repair in November 1989, has finally fallen down because nothing was done. A letter is to be sent to County Highways.

c. Thanks from the Chatterbus for the use of the Playing Field. It will not be on the site for long periods and only one or two nights a week. It is fully insured by the Cornwall Youth Service.

d. St. Endellion Lane is an unclassified road and may be used by cars, say County Highways, the gate at the road is the responsibility of the landowner and only there to prevent animals straying onto the road. Mr. Welton said the original reference had been to the middle gate. Mr. Symons said there are one or two up there who will probably move the other gate out of the way.

e. The Planning Officer, in a letter, said there are 65 parishes in North Cornwall District but he would inform neighbours in limited instances of major development. f. Trewetha Lane provides only 1% of the criteria needed for a pedestrian crossing. A proposal to ask for more detail failed by a vote of 3/5.

a. Ian Honey, Change of Use of Workshop to Dwelling, Roscarrock Hill: 'Support'.
b. Mr. Radcliffe, amendments to plans, Silverspray, Port Gaverne: 'In the opinion of the Parish Council the development would be detrimental to an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and Heritage Coast Area.'

Public Discussion

Mrs. G. Hambly urged for something to be done about traffic speeding at Trewetha corner - on two occasions cars had driven off the road into her front garden and one had 'written off' a relative's car.


GOLDEN CIRCLE

but as part of no. 3 Fore Street instead of as no. 1. The Planning Department are to notify the RNLI that they may need to obtain Listed Building Planning Consent before building starts.

The Parish Council, meanwhile, have decided that should it transpire that the building is not 'listed' after all, then the chairman, David Bolton and the Clerk will be automatically empowered to make the application at once.

AN EXHORTATION

I am going express an opinion on what I think is a very important matter - the design of the proposed new lifeboat house.

As I see it, the existing store forms part of a group with the old Market House and the other buildings - there for hundreds of years. At the beginning of the month, a petition was circulated and signed by 456 people. 387 (85%) agreed that 'the design of the proposed new Lifeboat Station will damage the character of the village', 33 people (7%) disagreed, and 36 people (8%) had no opinion.

If a new planning application for Listed Building Consent is advertised, I fervently hope that all these people will immediately write to the Planning Department at Barn Lane, Bodmin, PL31 1LZ, to say the way they feel, and send copies to Councillor Bill Dawe to supply him with evidence of the strength of public feeling.

It is by no means a foregone conclusion that the planning committee will vote in favour of preserving the character of the old building. Those in control of development seem to have little sympathy with the special character of Port Isaac having allowed other unsuitable development to take place nearby. Some would even have the village 'pulled down and rebuilt to today's standards', and I quote.

Port Isaac has a great advantage over many other places - it is still relatively unspoiled. If it gets mucked around too much, it will be impossible to put it right again. Visit many of England's once lovely old towns to see what progress can do. The appearance of our old fishing village is why many people come here and allows them to forget modernity for a while.

LETTER

Dear Editor, Re Mr. Chapman's
remarks in the July Trio. Trelights
is not dirty as he states. This
