## PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. June. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Apology for absence from Rohan Carey who will attend again when he recovers from his illness. David Philp's absence was noted but he has not missed sufficient meetings to be asked to relinquish his seat.

### Church Hill Landslip

David Bolton, Chairman, first referred to prompt and effective action by Mark Provis to organise the fire brigade to deal with the recent landslip at the top of Church Hill. He thanked Mark who said thanks were also due to Delabole Fire Brigade for a wonderful job.

Robert Sloman, farmer of adjacent land, said a County Council surveyor had visited the site and said the slip was caused by surface water running off the ground instead of sinking in and not by failure of the land drainage. It might be better to culvert water under the road to the drain the other side. Councillor Bill Dawe pointed out that this could cause flooding of the valley footpath.

### Public Discussion

Fred Thompson said Trio was possibly the only local newsletter with an office people could visit, but it was not right for a Parish Councillor to come and be abusive about the placing of an item. Everything possible is included but sometimes there is not enough space to put items where requested. He was angry at being verbally abused in the street by the councillor, and alleged he had made a derogatory and slanderous remark which was being echoed by children. Eric Stokes said he was the man in question and had asked Robin Penna to put a letter about seats on the front page the same as the Heritage Coast letter.

### Finance

The Parish Council has £4812.53 in the high-interest deposit account and there is £132.38 left in the current account after monthly expenditure.

### Clerk to the Council

Mark Provis referred to comments made by a councillor concerning the Clerk's salary at the last meeting. Barbara Willmott was known as one of the best clerks in the area and the comments were unwarranted. The Clerk's salary, the minimum allowable, was determined by the Parish Council anyway.

Eric Stokes said his comment had been intended as a joke and he was sorry the Parish Council had no sense of humour.

### New Landing Stage

It was asked if the landing stage inside the harbour wall was collapsible. Bill Dawe said it would not need planning permission and would be under water most of the time. David Phelps said harbour walls were charted by the Department of Transport and that a yacht tying up at high water might be unaware of the landing stage below the water. Bill Dawe, Harbour Commissioners' representative, had been unable to attend a meeting and didn't know whether the Department had been notified.

### Pedestrian Crossing, Trewetha Lane

A County Council official had visited Jane Scown, Head Teacher, Port Isaac School, but no Parish Councillors were invited. Mrs. Scown pointed out that the crossing was not only needed during school hours. A 'flashing light' crossing under school control was offered. This showed the need for a crossing was recognised, the Parish Council, however, did not think it would meet the original requirements. Further pressure will be put on the County Council for a full-time crossing. Councillor Harvey Lander will be involved, and another meeting requested.

### Roads and Grass Cutting

Meeting Mark Prout, coach operator, at Coldstanton Corner, Council members, by riding round the corner in a bus, saw the danger of the situation and that road widening was called for.

The road surface from the B.3314 into the village is about to be 'tarred and chipped', except at Trewetha. Port Isaac village will not be resurfaced until the autumn.

Amenity grass cutting around the council houses is done frequently by the District Council but grass near roads is cut by County Highways twice yearly at the most. It was suggested that the Parish Council should have the money from the County Council and then tender for the work.

### Playing Fields - Grass in Goal Mouths

The Joint-User Agreement between the Parish Council and the Education Department says the Parish Council is responsible for the football pitch grass. Work to renew the wear will be tendered for. The Education Department may be asked to help when the cost is known.

### Footpath Allocations

Each Councillor is to check the cutting of specified footpaths as usual.

### Committee Reports

Eric Stokes (seats) said Kenny Webster, the beach car park operator, had been a tower of strength in helping to put new seats on the Platt. An ex-gratia payment of £10 for using Kenny's tractor was agreed.

Mark Provis ('chippings and tarmac') said a kerbstone in Mayfield Road needed replacing. The village looks like patchwork after water mains digging and re-digging and resurfacing must be done soon.

David Phelps called for a 'no parking beyond this point' sign where the cliff path

leaves the District Council car park; also a 'road narrows' sign beyond Bodannon.

Mark Provis said, the District Council had done work, costing thousands of pounds, in the bottom tier of the car park. Why didn't they have the decency to tell the Parish Council what was being done.

Bill Dawe reported the rescinding of planning enforcement concerning removal of a wall at Morwenna, also, approval for removal of walls at Higher Barn in spite of Parish Council dissent, he had, however, turned the decision for the time being.

David Phelps (tree warden) said that against instructions to the contrary, trees had been planted on part of the Playing Field belonging to the Barrons. He had apologised to Mrs. Barron who agreed to let the trees stay and see how they turn out.

### CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. A paper recycling bank in the car park will be considered by the District Council but may be unacceptable as it could take up too many car spaces.

b. The County Council agree to an information board in Mayfield Road providing the site is right, the utilities are notified, they are indemnified against claims, and the board can be removed within four weeks if required.

c. Taylor Made have repaired a swing seat, and declared the rest of the playing fields equipment o.k. The Parish Council are not satisfied, however, and each Councillor will inspect the equipment and check corrosion of the supporting bolts for discussion next month.

d. Bill Dawe had not been notified of a public enquiry held at 'Maylands', Port Gaverne, as his invitation was sent to St. Teath Parish by mistake. He would have made strong objections to the owner's total disregard of planning laws.

e. Henry Symons gave a resumé of conditions for twinning with Kolka in Latvia. European Commission grants are available for two-person exchange visits to start with. The twinning ceremony would follow with about ten people from each town and the Charter signed. Grants for further exchanges would be small though half the

travel cost might be available as Kolka and Port Isaac are over 2,000 miles apart. The cheapest air fare, London to Riga, is £350 return per person. With train fares each end the total would be about £400, or £200 after grant aid. Grants are paid retrospectively with no guarantee that a scheme will be considered eligible. The Council have heard that the travelling cost to Port Isaac is too high for Kolka so the idea of twinning is inadvisable. The documents will be passed to Camelford school who might have an interest in furthering a 'pen pals' project or similar exercise.

b. Barn at Lower Trefreock, Mrs. Mably: supported previously by the Parish Council but turned down at District level, 'delegation' possible this time so support again given and Councillor Dawe asked to approve if necessary.

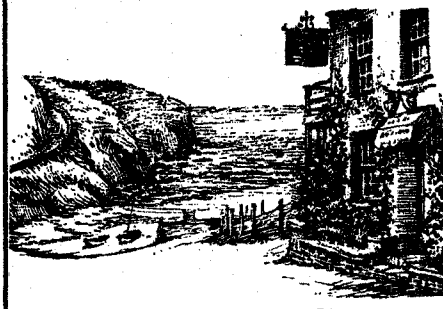

## LIFEBOAT

### 200th. Person Rescued

The lifeboat was launched May 20th. to aid a boat with five divers on board, two miles off Pentire with engine problems and taking in water. It was towed into Port Quin. This makes 204 people rescued by the Port Isaac Lifeboat. Crew members: N. Andrews, S. Hudspith and P. Aldridge.

### Tragedy at Wadebridge

During the heavy storms, Saturday 12th. June, three people in a dinghy capsized off Bradford's Quay, Wadebridge. Sea conditions prevented a launch. Crew members, helped by Dennis Knight loaded the boat on his fish truck, and transported it by road to Wadebridge. One casualty had already scrambled ashore. A body had been re-covered by a Sea King helicopter from Culdrose. The boat was launched into the flooded River Camel and a search was made until dark for the remaining casualty. Despite a 6am. search by coastguards next day, the third casualty was not found. Crew members: A. Walton, R. Hambly and M. Daly.

**STICK INSECTS**

I would like to thank all those who notified me of sightings of these insects. There were 16 reports with over 60 insects last year, and a further 14 reports for previous years. They have been here since 1983, after some dead insects and (unknowingly) 2-300 eggs from the school were tipped out in an upper village garden. They now seem to be in almost every garden between New Road and Tintagel Terrace, but reports were also received from Trewetha Lane, Silvershell Road and Port Gaverne. The UK's longest ever insect (125mm) was found in Tintagel Terrace and an adult insect found in New Road on 23rd March was the first confirmation that they can survive mild winters in the UK. Apart from nibbling a few leaves, these insects are



harmless. I was pleasantly surprised that so many were delighted to share their gardens with these fascinating creatures. If you are one of the few who would rather not, give me a ring on 880106 if you find one, and I will remove it. These insects are native to

**DEAR TRIO,**

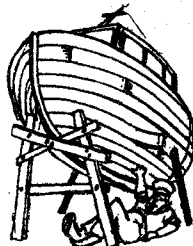

New Zealand, and correspondence with Prof. Salmon, the authority on NZ insects, has shown that in the 50 years they have been in the UK, they are evolving into new colour forms. Many of the colour forms in Port Isaac are unknown in NZ. As one of only a handful of sites for stick insects in Europe, their discovery here has generated considerable interest. A report will appear in the UK magazine 'Phasmid Studies', and the French magazine 'Le Monde de Phasmes'. A copy of my report also appears in a book I have just published 'The Flora and Fauna of Port Gaverne'. This gives a guided tour of the local plants and animals, including flowers, ferns, grasses, birds, rock pool and offshore life, insects, reptiles, amphibians and mammals.
