PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. November. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Chairman David Bolton made a vote of thanks to the people who organised the Guy Fawkes bonfire at Port Gaverne and complimented them on a super job of clearing up afterwards.

David Welton asked why the last item on the agenda would be held 'in committee' and it was explained that, although this had not been shown on the agenda, a resolution to exclude the press and the public would be voted on at the appropriate time.

Public Discussion

Olive Strout pointed out that ragwort, and certain other weeds, were still classified as 'illegal' contrary to statements made at last month's meeting. She also complained that the surface of Middle Street was still uneven and could cause somebody to fall.

Peggy Richards spoke about ash trees that had been felled in Mayfield Road because they were undermining a stone wall and concrete drive. She suggested that the Council should perhaps check that the same problem would not arise with new trees recently planted close to stone walls near the school. She went on to say that the hedges in Trewetha Lane between the playing fields and 'Gwelva' were overhanging two feet into the road and making it very dangerous for pedestrians.

Robin Penna noted that footpath no. 32 was on the agenda. He said this had been a pleasant walk until, a few years ago, when the present owner of Burrow Park stopped people from walking through his yard. The path was also used sometimes by people returning to Polzeath after cream teas at Trewint. Whereas the definitive map showed no footpath markings through Burrow Park farmyard, the numbering, and the accompanying statement, indicated that the path started from Scarrabine and Trewint and went through to the B.3314 - there were no 'terminal' figures either side of the farmyard and the path had the same number throughout. He suggested, however, that if a modification of the path was sought, a route could be along the lane through Trecreege and out on to the relatively quiet road into Trelights, making possible a Trelights - Trewint - Trecreege circular walk.

Finance

After presenting this month's accounts, David Welton quoted from a District Council letter which indicated that in the future Parish Councils may become liable for the cost of maintaining and running their public conveniences. The present cost of those at the car park and in the fish cellars is nearly £4,000 altogether, plus £1,000 - £1,500 for Port Gaverne toilets, could total nearly £6,000 per annum and would mean increasing the Parish Council precept to £11,600. The present community

charge to local ratepayers of £15.96 per annum, would have to be increased to somewhere around £23. There ought at the same time, however, to be some reduction in the rates required by the District Council who are still discussing all the possibilities.

Gates at the Playing Fields

David Bolton reported that one gate is almost always open now due to the difficulty of shutting it. Both the middle post and the hanging post need renewing and Eric Stokes was asked to draw up a specification for tenders.

Flooding in Coronation Park

The Clerk reported that no progress had been made on this as she had not yet heard from the National Rivers Authority. Mr. Barriball said neighbouring landowners should be consulted. The Clerk was asked to try and arrange a meeting with N.R.A. and David Phelps suggested that the Clerk ought, if necessary, be given authority to consult a surveyor about the problem, on the understanding that his fee would be paid by any party found to be at fault.

Footpath No. 32

Cornwall County Council had received, from somebody outside the county, a request that the definitive footpath map should show a continuation of the path through Burrow Park farm, and the Parish Council is being asked to try and establish evidence that the path has been in use for at least 20 years. This was thought to be impossible but an item would be placed in Trio asking anyone who has such evidence to contact the Parish Council.

Reports of Committees

Village Hall: David Bolton - no report.

Seats: David Phelps - the committee will arrange for the nice seats to be taken from the Platt and stored at Trewetha Farm for the winter, and be replaced by a black plastic one. Ken Webster has volunteered to transport the seats to Trewetha.

Playing Fields: No request for permission to leave the Chatterbus in the car park had been received since Sally Pavitt left and it was felt that the present organiser of the bus should make an application each year. There is no unwritten right for them to use the space.

Trees: David Phelps said it was a pity the pine tree in Trewetha Lane could not have been saved but it was not subject to a preservation order. People from elsewhere may not realise that any tree in Port Isaac is a valuable asset so if anyone knows a tree they think is worth saving they can contact the Parish Council who may be able to have a preservation order put on it.

Tarmac and Chippings: Mark Provis was not present but comments were made concerning the lack of action in remedying the pool of water in the road near the Co-op where pedestrians are drenched with water whenever a car runs through it. The

Clerk is to enquire what action is being taken by the Highway Authority.

Parish Council Training Day: The Clerk, Henry Symons, and David Phelps reported on the day held recently and spoke of the benefits of attending. Much had been learned about correct procedure at meetings (for instance it was wrong to have 'matters arising' on the agenda, and 'any other business' was considered illegal because the public must be informed in advance of everything to be discussed at a meeting), dealing with problems, and the duties of the clerk and councillors, also names of people to contact. The afternoon session concerning finance was found to be elementary and boring.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. A letter of thanks from St. Breward Band for the £50 donation. Their cassette is selling well all over the country and they take care to advertise Port Isaac.

b. The Christmas lights are being renewed and a request for a donation was received from Eric Stokes. This, with the possibility of a donation for Trelights Christmas lights, will be discussed at the next meeting.

c. A letter from Cornwall County Council about traffic calming measures for Trewetha Lane raised the possibility of the school crossing lights being operated from both sides of the road. The siting of the speed restriction signs is being questioned at the same time.

d. David Welton said British Telecom should be asked why there is still no 'Port Isaac' in the new phone book when everyone else is still there. They had said there would be no exchange names in the new book. This will be raised at next month's meeting.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Alterations to form dormer, Archer Farm, Trewetha, Mr. and Mrs. D. Welton: David Welton declared an interest. The Parish Council was in approval of the application.

Exclusion of the Press and Public

A resolution was made to exclude the press and the public for the following discussion of exempt material, under section 12a of the Local Government Act 1972:

a: Allocation of a one-bedroom sheltered bungalow at Mayfield Road.

b: A draft letter in reply to that received from Cllr. Dawe's solicitors.

Part b of the resolution was defeated on a vote of four to three by a proposal from David Welton, seconded by David Phelps, saying that the Parish Council should not be seen to be discussing the matter behind closed doors - the Council was not acting illegally.

David Bolton read each letter in the correspondence so far - from Cllr. Dawe's Solicitors, the Clerk to the Parish Council's letter to the County Association of Parish

and Town Councils enclosing David Bolton and Henry Symon's draft of a reply to Cllr. Dawe's solicitors, the reply plus a reply from the National Association of Local Councils who they had asked for further advice and to comment on the draft letter.

David Phelps didn't think the Parish Council should be making excuses or providing meat for the legal beagles. He proposed a short answer acknowledging the letter, the contents of which had been supplied by Cllr. Dawe, but which the Council was at a loss to understand. The Council shouldn't be making excuses but should give a short sharp answer and let Cllr. Dawe do what he will. Mark Provis, who had arrived at the beginning of the discussion, asked what Cllr. Dawe wanted the Council to apologise for. Bill Norris thought it was because he hadn't been believed when he said that he had turned the rave party down. The whole thing had got overblown, Cllr. Dawe had just asked for an apology. Henry Symons felt that the Council should take legal advice about how to answer. He pointed out that the minutes had not been amended or distorted as inferred in the solicitor's letter, they had merely been added to. Mark Provis said that if he had stopped thousands of people descending on St. Endellion he didn't think he had done wrong and would do it again if necessary and certainly won't apologise. On a vote, David Phelps proposal, that a short letter be sent, was carried unanimously.

Next Meeting

To avoid conflicting with Christmas, next month's meeting of the Parish Council will be held one week earlier than usual, on Monday 6th. December at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac. This meeting will probably not be reported in Trio.

FOOTPATH NO. 32

According to the Definitive Statement this is a footpath from Trewint to the Parish Boundary with a spur to Scarrabine - average width 3ft. The path leaves the Long Cross - Port Quin road at Trewint, crosses two fields in a south-westerly direction and joins the spur from Scarrabine. It then descends to a stream in the valley between Trelights and Port Quin, crosses the stream and continues up the opposite side of the valley where it joins a lane or track coming, via Trecreege, from the road at Trelights. The path turns west along this lane at the rear of Burrow Park farm, then south-west again to the farmyard. It ends up following the Parish Boundary, down the farm drive, to the gate on the B.3314 road.

A request has been received that the part of the path which runs through the farmyard be included on the definitive footpath map. Before this can happen, however, evidence of use over at least the last twenty years is needed. If anyone feels that they can provide such evidence, will they please contact the Clerk to St. Endellion Parish Council, Mrs. B. M. Willmott, 11 New Road, Port Isaac, Cornwall. PL29 3SD.

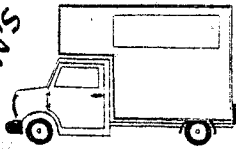

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

On the 29th. of October we were hosts to the Autumn Group Meeting in the Church Hall. The speaker was Tamsin Thomas from BBC Radio Cornwall who gave us a fascinating account of how the various local radio stations came into being, starting with Radio Leicester in the sixties. She explained how, on the air, you have to create pictures with words, which is different from television. Tamsin brought her tape recorder and treated us to some very funny tapes of people who didn't realise that they were 'On Air'. We were also beautifully entertained by Elizabeth Rowe and her Harpeggio Group, our own Eileen Trickett won the first prize in a 'Cornish Fairings' (biscuits) competition, and very tasty refreshments prepared by our members rounded off a pleasant evening.

At the November meeting the speaker Mr. Michael Heyes, County Organiser for the

British Heart Foundation gave us an interesting talk about this very worthwhile charity which started about thirty years ago and which derives 48% of all monies raised, from legacies. There are 500 branches nationwide and 100 of them are in the South West. Last June 27,000 people took part in the sponsored London-to-Brighton cycle race which has raised £8 million in the last 18 years. 77% of all money donated is spent on research.

By the time you read this we will have been on our annual Christmas shopping trip to Plymouth.

We are having our usual Post-Christmas Lunch at the Cornish Cafe on Monday 10th. January at 12.30pm. for 1.00pm, price £6.50. Everyone from the village is cordially invited (husbands too).

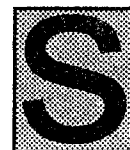

GARDEN SOCIETY

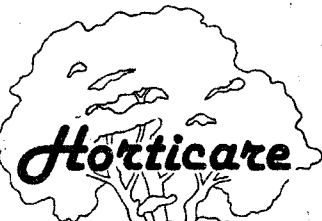

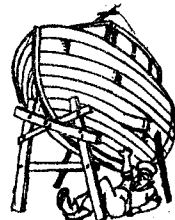
