

LIFEBOAT

Sunday 26th. June marked a further chapter in the history of the Port Isaac Lifeboat Station when, following a Service of Dedication by the station Chaplain Revd. Michael Bartlett, the new Lifeboat House was officially opened by Group Captain Simon Coy, OBE., Commanding Officer of RAF St. Mawgan.

Presentations were made to Group Captain Coy and Mrs. Coy by Amy Rowe and Jessica Walton. As well as R.N.L.I. and HM Coastguard officials, the occasion was attended by Paul Tyler MP, Peter Cocks - Chairman of Cornwall County Council, Kenneth White - Chairman of North Cornwall District Council and David Bolton - Chairman of St. Endellion Parish Council. from 10 Lifeboat stations were also present. At the end of the Service a Sea King helicopter from 771 Squadron RNAS Culdrose flew over the village flying the R.N.L.I. flag. Music was provided by St. Breward Silver Band, conductor Micky Hunt.

On Tuesday 28th. June the lifeboat was launched to the motor cruiser 'Avanti' in trouble off Tintagel Head. The lifeboat found two people on board unable to cope with the choppy sea and escorted them into quieter waters. Padstow Lifeboat was launched and towed the boat to Padstow. Crew were M. Daly, M. Provis and A. Walton.

On Monday 11th. July the lifeboat was launched to a 10ft. mirror dinghy that appeared to be in trouble off Trebarwith. When on scene the crew found that the occupant, David Weston from Mevagissey, was rowing from Port Gaverne to Boscastle. In view of the sea conditions the lifeboat escorted him to Boscastle. Crew were J. Collins, M. Provis and A. Walton.

MARJORIE SLATTER

It was with much regret that we learnt of the death in hospital of Mrs. Marjorie Slatter, aged 80, of Silvershell Road. She had been involved with many activities in the village - a loyal member of the W.I., being the President for some time, also a regular attendant of the Golden Circle, but perhaps her greatest love was for St. Peter's Church, where the funeral service was held on Tuesday July 5th. There was a very large attendance which showed how well known and greatly respected she was. The service was conducted by the Rector, who in his address paid a moving tribute to Marjorie's life. Cremation was at Glynn Valley Crematorium and the ashes have been interred at St. Endellion Churchyard. We express our deepest sympathy to the family.

Steve Slatter and family would like to express their most sincere and grateful thanks to all who attended the funeral service, also for the cards and letters of sympathy received, and to the neighbours and friends who organised the tea at the house after the service. Very special thanks to the Revd. M. Bartlett for his address and his kindness to us in our sad loss, to Charlie Honey for playing the organ and to Ian Honey for making all the excellent arrangements for the funeral. PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. July. For authoritative information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Henry Symons, Vice Chairman, chaired the meeting as David Bolton was away.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards complained that the fishermen and footballers had left the playing field gate open, which could not be fastened anyway. She also said the verges along Trewetha Lane had not been cut properly. She said it would be better not to have any more swings in Mayfield Drive as the site is next to the old people's property and causes annoyance to the residents.

Robin Penna said he had noticed the playing field gate seemed to be open all the time, allowing children to run straight out into the main road, but it was impossible to get the heavy gate to stay shut as the bolt was rusted solid.

Finance

Expenditure this month exceeded the bank balance by over £750 so it was agreed that £1,000 should be transferred from the high-interest account. As there were more than ten accounts to pay which would incur an 'activity' charge by the bank, some items for payment were deferred.

Trio Donation

It was decided to make the same donation as last year, £100, towards the cost of producing the newsletter.

Verges

David Phelps said Peggy Richards was right about the condition of the verges in Trewetha Lane, 'what the County Council has done is laughable', especially around the Mayfield telephone box. The Parish Council should press for better cutting. The hedges, of course, are the responsibility of the landowners. The work done at the council houses by the District Council is much more satisfactory. The County Council will be asked to arrange a site meeting with the Parish Council.

Bill Norris asked about the 30mph. signs which had been vandalised and was told that the County Council had been informed of the damage.

Bill Dawe suggested that the County Council should pay the Parish Council to have the verge cutting work done. He also asked for the matter of the school pedestrian crossing to be raised at the meeting.

Car Park Notice Board

Eric Stokes had examined the board and said it only needed a new hinge, he did not recommend removing the glass front or putting in a wooden backing board. He asked why people were allowed to advertise their activities on the board and was reminded that the board is there for that purpose and was 50% funded by Port Isaac and District Tourism Association. It was not intended for commercial use. P.I.D.T.A. are to be informed of the cost of the repair but will not be charged.

Tonnage Limit for Lorries

Deferred from last month but postponed again because Mark Provis was absent as a crew member on a Lifeboat 'shout'.

Play Equipment in Mayfield Drive

The equipment, originally provided for the children in the Drive was not worth adopting as there were now only two children - other people didn't even know it was there. It is in a dangerous condition and the District Council, who presently deny all knowledge, will be asked to check their records and take responsibility. Bill Dawe said there had been trouble with cheeky kids and it would be better if all the equipment were at the playing field to remove the trouble. It was decided on a vote to try and have the equipment removed. David Phelps thought, however, that the Parish Council should take over maintenance of the seat.

Reports of Committees

District Councillor: Bill Dawe said that the owner of 'Maylands', Port Gaverne, had sent in revised plans showing a lower roof which had received planning officer approval, ignoring the plan for the building itself. He had pointed this out to the planning committee and the plans were turned down by a 11 to 2 vote. He said we must now wait and see if the bulldozers come in. He suggested that, when the chairman was away, a deputy should be appointed to carry out business and to make it easier to contact the Parish Council.

Playing Field: David Phelps reported a request to use the playing field for a barbecue and said that the field should be available for such activities, providing it was left O.K. There could be a problem with insurance, however, and the Clerk will check the public liability situation.

He said that the gates are not badly designed, they only need adjusting. Eric Stokes said he could close the gates quite easily. Bill Norris said they should not have been put on the old hanging posts. David Phelps said they were far too heavy for the posts and invited councillors to meet after the meeting at the playing fields then get the committee to draw up tenders to replace the posts and report next month.

Seats: David Phelps reported that the plinth at Coronation Park is completed and the seat is at Trewetha Farm ready to be installed at the park.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

a. Correspondence from Sproulls, solicitors, raised questions about access between the old and new graveyards at St. Endellion. The track from Trelights, however, was neither a footpath nor a bridleway but was a road maintainable at public expense and would therefore give no problem with vehicular access.

b. The direction signs for the top of Back Hill are ready but no precise date can be given for their erection.

c. A letter from Paul Tyler MP. enclosed a disappointing reply from British Telecom giving reasons why the old telephone boxes cannot be retained. Bill Dawe asked for reassurance that 'listed building' status had

been sought for the other three. David Phelps thought the Parish Council had been a bit hasty in turning down BT's offer of an old box to be placed somewhere in Trelights. David Welton raised the question of Port Isaac's 'loss of identity' by being listed as 'Bodmin' in the phone book and asked that BT be told that all Port Isaac wants is to be included in the listing in the same way as St. Ives, St. Mabyn, and Trebetherick exchanges.

d. The County Council agree that the tarmac in the old village is slightly higher than it should be in some places. Extra work has been done to improve the drainage in Middle Street. Eric Stokes complained about snide remarks in Trio about Parish Councillors walking round the village. David Phelps said that perhaps an apology would be made in the letter of thanks for the £100.

e. 'Double bend' signs are to be erected at Coldstanton Corner, and the word 'slow' painted on the road.

f. No gypsies are recorded as staying in the Parish. Bill Dawe stressed that gypsies are not the same as travellers.

g. A letter from the Planning Department said that whereas the doors of the new lifeboat station are not in keeping with the requirements of Port Isaac Conservation Area, where woodwork is usually painted black or white, it is not felt it would be possible or appropriate to make an objection in this case.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

a. Revised siting of dwelling thereby not complying with Condition No. 2 on Decision Notice No. 90/0708 (The Development shall not be carried out otherwise than in complete accordance with the plans). Lifting of the condition at Trewetha Lane, Mr. and Mrs. J. Saundry: Apparently, the original site plan was incorrectly drawn so the position of building was skewed slightly to allow for proper clearances between adjacent buildings, etc. The Parish Council, however, isn't in a position to make decisions on such matters, and felt that the planning department should not have allowed the situation to arise in the first place.

b. Change of Use of 'Flotsams', 36a Fore Street, from shop to dwelling, for Mr. M. Blick: Eric Stokes said the Council must impede the change of use of businesses in Port Isaac, there soon will be no shops at all. Bill Norris said market forces created the problem and it is better to have a full

house than an empty shop. The application was recommended for approval.

c. Application by A. Yorke to demolish 3 metres of garden wall at 27 Rose Hill: It was pointed out that the previous application had been made for Trewetha Lane and that the wall in question was actually in Trewetha Lane, not Rose Hill. David Phelps asked why this application, in the Conservation Area, was stamped 'delegation possible'. Bill Dawe said the Council should oppose the demolition of more walls, and asked whether the Cornwall Association for Town and Parish Councils could offer any help with obtaining an Article IV Order. He added that 'First and Last' has been left an eyesore and probably will be till it falls down. The application was unanimously opposed.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 8th. August at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

TELEPHONE KIOSK

From a letter to Paul Tyler MP:

'... we have decided to install one of our modern payphone housings in place of the damaged red kiosk ... we do appreciate that people are fond of the appearance of the old red kiosk ... many are considered worthy of 'listing' by English Heritage and the Department of National Heritage ... some 2,300 have 'listed building' status and there are about 16,000 more we have undertaken to keep ... our modern housings have ... lighter doors, better lighting and a gap around the base to prevent the build up of litter and unpleasant odours ... are less prone to vandalism ... easier and less expensive to clean and maintain ... We had no immediate plans to modernise the kiosk at Trelights ... it would have been one of the 16,000 I mentioned earlier ... where one of those becomes badly damaged we almost always replace it with a modern kiosk. I do sympathise with the people of Trelights but hope they will be able to accept this situation.






