

LIFEBOAT

27th. May - The Lifeboat was called out to stand by the Cliff Team when a dog had gone over the cliff near the Headlands. The crew managed to get the dog into the Lifeboat and land ashore to his grateful owner. Crew were John Brown, Rob Parkyn and Paul Worden.

30th. May - The sailing ship Maria Asumpta went onto the rocks at the Rumps with 14 people on board. Six of the crew managed to get onto the rocks. Five were picked up by the Port Isaac fishing vessel 'Helen Claire' (Julian and John Brown). One person died from multiple injuries and two people were missing. The Lifeboat together with Padstow and Rock Lifeboats, other fishing vessels and helicopters searched but without success. The Lifeboat was at sea for five hours. Crew were Mike Daly, Richard Hambly, Andy Walton, and Paul Worden.

31st. May - A further four-hour search was made for the two missing persons from the Maria Asumpta but nothing was found. Crew were Trevor Beare, Mike Daly, Mike Edkins, and Andy Walton.

June 1st. - A search was made for the two missing persons but nothing was found. Crew were Trevor Beare, Mike Daly, Richard Hambly, and Andy Walton.

5th. June - The Lifeboat was launched following a report of a fishing vessel in trouble off Boscastle. After one-and-a-half hours nothing was found. A false alarm with good intent. Crew were Kevin Dingle, Steve Hudspith, and Andy Walton.

16th. June - Report of a capsized dinghy north of Boscastle. This was a false alarm with good intent. Crew were Mike Edkins, Mark Provis, and Andy Walton.

23rd. June - A skin diver was trapped on the cliff at Cartway. The Cliff Team brought the lady up by cliff lines and the Lifeboat crew recovered the diving equipment. Crew were Trevor Beare, Mike Edkins, and Mark Provis.

24th. June - The Lifeboat was launched following the sighting of a body off Carnweather Point. The body was one of the missing persons from the Maria Asumpta. A further body was sighted amongst the rocks in the same area. Rock Lifeboat was tasked to recover the body but required help from Port Isaac crew after they had landed the first body. The Lifeboat returned to the scene and brought the body back to Port Isaac. Dr. Lunny, Station Honorary Medical Officer, certified the deaths. Crew were Kevin Dingle, Mike Edkins, and Andy Walton.

AMBULANCE RESPONSE

Three weeks ago, just before five o'clock on a Sunday afternoon, two young teenagers from Helston rode down Rose Hill two-up on a bicycle. They lost control and crashed into the iron barrier at the bottom. One of the boys was somersaulted over the barrier and landed on his head in the street.

Two or three local men did all they could to staunch the profuse bleeding, and try to comfort the lad who was lying in the street screaming and shouting with pain. Somebody rang the ambulance and a member of the lifeboat crew, who happened to pass, also tried to summon the air ambulance but it was 'not available'.

An agonising *half-an-hour* was spent, waiting, while trying to keep the lad conscious who was tending to drift away. The ambulance finally did arrive, however, and the crew stretched the lad and took him to casualty, where he was stitched up, and eventually sent home.

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. June. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, District Councillor Bill Dawe, Richard Hambly, Treasurer Malcolm Lee, Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, Vice Chairman David Phelps, David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Chairman Henry Symons.

Minutes and Notices of Meetings

The Minutes of the last meeting were approved but David Philp raised a query about the correctness of deciding on action about Trelights Lane at a planning site meeting concerning The House on the Hill. Malcolm Lee said he also felt that all councillors should receive notice about any item to be discussed at any meeting.

Public Discussion

Robin Penna expressed dismay about a pink planning notice (proposed change of use of a barn at Roscarrock) wired to the 1400 years-old, lichen-covered stone at Longcross.

Finance

With £3952 in the High Interest account and about £540 in the current account, Treasurer Malcolm Lee proposed a transfer of £500 to cover the month's expenses:

This would leave a balance of £211.98 in the current account. Proposal carried.

Donation to Trio

Bill Dawe proposed the same amount as last year - £100, seconded by David Phelps and carried. Henry Symons said it was a well worth-while newsletter, and thanks were due to the editor for his work on behalf of the Parish.

Fidelity Insurance

The Clerk is to discover whether the Council is covered by the existing insurance in the unlikely event of any misappropriation of funds by the Treasurer.

An up to date copy of the standard Clerk's reference book 'Local Council Administration' is to be purchased, also 12 copies of 'Model Standing Orders for Parish Councils'.

Parish Council Procedure

Malcolm Lee proposed that a small short-lived committee be formed to review procedures and standing orders and to produce a draft document for discussion next month. The committee will be - Henry Symons, David Phelps, Malcolm Lee, Bill Dawe, and Bryan Richards.

Port Gaverne Toilets

David Bolton formerly acted as administrator of supplies, etc. As it was felt somebody local should take over, Malcolm Lee accepted the position. It was queried whether local suppliers should be used instead of a firm at Camelford which doesn't deliver to Port Gaverne.

Representative to the Board of School Governors

David Phelps explained that the holder of this post need not be a parish councillor and recommended that Bill Norris be allowed to continue. Malcolm Lee pointed out that in October 1993, Mr. Norris had been appointed by

the parish council for a term of four years and there was therefore no decision to be made. Mrs. Scown, headmistress, had been very pleased with Mr. Norris' input. The Parish Council would continue to keep in liaison with him and vice versa.

Glebe Land Tenancy

Until such time as the land was actually needed for cemetery use, a 364-day tenant at a peppercorn rent would be allowed to use the land in conjunction with the rest of the field.

Litter Collection

Malcolm Lee had made inspections over four weekends and reported that there had been no litter in the village but that he had picked up two carrier bags full of chip papers and take-away food cartons from the top of Port Gaverne Hill, probably scattered by seagulls from the litter bin in the car park. The Refuse Contract Services are to be asked if a bird-proof bin can be provided. It was decided that the refuse collection day should stay as Friday.

Port Isaac Valley Path

There had been no meeting of the Footpath Committee and the owner of the mill, Jim Watson was away, so no report was made to this meeting. David Phelps asked for confirmation of a rumour circulating that Mr. Watson had diverted the footpath. None was given.

REPORTS

District Councillor: Bill Dawe said there was proposed legislation concerning 'green lanes' but that this was not yet in operation and that the metalling of the section of Trelights Lane being developed would take place according to the plans at Bodmin Planning Office.

Concerning the withdrawal of Webber's bus service from Trelights, routine annual censuses had shown that only 5 - 10 Trelights people used the service and the County Transport Officer thought that Mr. Webber was probably justified in withdrawing the service on grounds of economy. The Council, however, thought that due notice should have been given at the time of re-tendering and that the company had 'jumped the gun'. They were to be asked to re-instate the service and fulfil their obligation to the County Council from whom they received a subsidy. David Philp warned the council of being over harsh - 'It is better than no service at all,' he said.

Playing Field Committee: David Phelps reported that the little children's swings were in a dangerous condition and should be replaced as soon as possible. He also said that the Education Department was only cutting the grass actually used by the school and the rest was being left to grow - as if they were 'working to rule'. It had not been practicable to move the rubbish bin, as suggested, because it could break. A second one should be asked for.

He suggested that a sub-committee, outside the Parish Council, should be formed for the purchase of the new ground for the playing field. This would decide terms of reference, and deal with the planning permission for change of use and re-siting the play equipment. The general public should be able to attend the meetings. The committee will consist of the existing Playing Field Committee plus Malcolm Lee, Bill Dawe, Richard Hambly, and others to be co-opted. Bill Dawe said he was all for the scheme but stressed that every grant available should be obtained. Also opportunities for free dumping should be sought for the levelling up needed. The first meeting was to be held on Monday 19th. June at the Church Rooms.

Seats Committee: David Phelps said that tenders had been received for repairing a seat on the Main. Malcolm Lee said that two of the old concrete seats there needed replacing. David Phelps said all the concrete seats were coming

to the end of their life and suitable replacements would have to be considered. The unsuitable black seat outside St. Endellion Church was only a temporary measure and it was hoped that somebody might be interested in donating a seat with a suitable dedication.

CLERK'S REPORT

St. Endellion has been accepted as participant in the 'Parish Paths Partnership' scheme where 100% grants for footpath work are available from The Countryside Commission. Malcolm Lee is co-ordinator and Amanda Martin from County Highways will be invited to give a short talk on the scheme at next month's meeting.

The Clerk read a letter from County Highways which said that the lane between Mayfield Road and Silvershell View was not a 'highway maintainable at public expense' therefore they had no responsibility for the broken fence there. The Council is to reply that this is a totally unsatisfactory situation and that somebody could be seriously hurt if nothing is done. The lane is in constant use by the public and should therefore be a public highway.

Malcolm Lee complained that the previous item had not been on the agenda and therefore he had no idea about what was being discussed and could therefore not be expected to make any decision. The matter should have been on the agenda and not included under the general heading of 'Clerks' Report'.

PLANNING

The Council voiced approval over the only plan presented - Change of use of redundant agricultural building to holiday accommodation, at Roscarrock, for Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Sloman.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. July at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH

Parish Review Day

Exciting plans for the future of the church were aired on this day held in May at the Castle Rock Hotel. There was a most encouraging response from the people of the village to the invitation to discuss church services, care, communications and resources. 43 people attended, and groups entered into lively discussions of these issues, freely expressing their views - including criticisms - and putting forward many helpful and positive suggestions. There was an overwhelming agreement that the church is very welcoming to visitors and newcomers. There needs to be more effective communication and more specific suggestions, including the appointment of a publicity officer, a signpost to the church, producing an attractive card for hotels, guest houses, etc. showing service times and directions, making greater use of Trio and local radio, and the church notice board.

The difficulties of providing services to fulfil the needs of both traditionalists and those who want more modern worship was discussed. All agreed on the importance of encouraging young people and suggestions included more involvement of them in the services, creating a choir which could double as a youth club, providing a Sunday School and inviting youth groups to visit the parish as well as our people visiting other churches. At present the church's young people enjoy taking part in the family services and the Saturday club organised by the Rector. Several group members expressed a wish for more teaching of the Christian faith through the weekly sermon and discussion groups. Younger group members thought an occasional question and answer session in church would be helpful.

An important issue raised was the difficulty of the church's location - with the lack of parking space, steep steps, too dark in the winter, too large a building, and no toilet. Some felt that one purpose-built building would be better and that the church rooms could be made into an Ecumenical Worship Centre for the whole village.

Specific suggestions included providing a transport scheme for the sick and elderly so that they could occasionally attend worship and

using the church council as a working body, to be responsible for sick-visiting, welcoming newcomers, and recording weddings, baptisms and confirmations. It was felt that the church rooms could be made more widely available for community activities and ideas included providing a meeting place for young parents during the day and young people in the evening. Social events for the 30-40 age group also were considered a possibility.

Resources

Group discussion clearly revealed that many people were completely unaware of the actual cost of running the church and how it is funded. Suggestions included more information being made available about this and about the planner scheme. Fund-raising ideas such as setting up a church shop in the village and inviting the St. Endellion Festival to give concerts in the church, including a three day festival in 1996, were put forward.

Reporting Back

At the end of this very successful day, the Rector and Mr. J. Roberts, Diocesan Stewardship Advisor, invited groups to report back on the discussions. A full report of these has now been published and distributed to all those who attended and also those who could not come but asked to be kept informed. Further copies are available from the church or the Rector.

The Way Ahead

Now much more work is being planned for the future to transform the very many valuable ideas and suggestions into action. 'The Way Ahead' is the next major step in the process and this will be held on the 20th. October.


RED CROSS

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


