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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 10th. July. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, District Councillor Bill Dawe, Richard Hambly, Treasurer Malcolm Lee, Bryan Nicholls, Vice Chairman David Phelps, David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Chairman Henry Symons.

Apologies were received from: Jill O'Connor, and Mark Provis.

Much of the meeting took place in semi-darkness due to a regional power failure caused by thunder storms.

Parish Paths Partnership

Amanda Martin from The County Council explained the scheme where 75% of footpath work would be paid by the Countryside Commission and 25% by the County Council. Ideas would come from the Parish Council, backed up by the County Council. Half of the money would be paid in advance and half afterwards. There is a budget of £750 available. The sort of things eligible are paths leading to the coast path, circular walks, and kissing-gates to replace stiles. Waymarking would be encouraged to prevent people getting lost. Community involvement - e.g. school nature walks, and involvement with local Young Farmers and youth groups. The Scheme runs over three years with most of the promotion, via a parish map or by the sale of walk cards, taking place in the third year when the work is nearly complete. The landowners have to be contacted and the Council's insurance extended to cover the scheme. A small committee would be formed to consider priorities but a minimum of paper work is involved. Training evenings would be held. It is necessary to get the community involved and the sooner the better as the cut-off time for the budget is March. The problem with Port Isaac being that most people are now heavily involved with the visitors until the autumn.

Robin Penna said if it would be any help he could help with the scheme sooner than the autumn. The Council decided to arrange a committee meeting as soon as possible.

Public Discussion

Eric Stokes had noticed the St. Breward Band have to struggle up the hill with their instruments after band evenings and asked if the Parish Council would consider paying a fee - either to the beach car park when the tide is out or for a mini-bus when it is in.

Jim Watson asked for clarification on a path he was supposed to have diverted. David Phelps said he had been approached by two or three

people who said the valley path up to Bill Dawe's farm [Pennant] was no longer on the correct course but he now believed this to be untrue and withdrew the allegation. Robin Penna pointed out that there is no path up to Pennant Farm from Port Isaac valley. Jim Watson then spoke about erosion to the path near Brian Orchard's building which needs urgent attention in case somebody slips and injures themselves.

Robin Penna asked when the village directional signs will be installed near the top of Back Hill.

Finance

£500 is to be transferred from the high-interest account to the current account where a balance of £24.35 would be left after covering the monthly expenditure of over £600.

Procedure and Standing Orders

Draft alterations to the 'Model Standing Orders' were circulated for discussion at the August meeting.

Grass Cutting

In spite of new machinery, the County Council has been unable to cut the grass at the bottom of Tintagel Terrace, in front of Mayfield, or at Trewetha. David Phelps suggested the problem could be eased by planting these areas with shrubs that would require little maintenance after the initial stages - as at West Hill, Wadebridge. Henry Symons suggested that the feasibility of this idea be studied and discussed at the August meeting.

Notice at Cartway Cove

The sign warning of the unfenced cliff has disappeared and will be replaced.

Gypsy/Traveller Caravans

There is no caravan problem in this Parish.

Parish Survey

A proposal by Malcolm Lee that the Parish Council agrees, in principle, to undertake, in the autumn, a survey of the parish which would highlight the concerns of the whole parish and enable action to be taken to alleviate them wherever possible. It would provide an objective basis for making informed decisions.

Malcolm pointed out that about 90% of the parish never expresses views on parish matters. A survey would find out what these people's views are. It could be published and made available to the authorities concerned with the affairs of St. Endellion. It could even be sold.

Mr. Barriball said he was not sure that the survey was necessary. Bill Dawe thought it was a good idea. Bryan Nicholls was worried that most of the questionnaires would be put through the letter boxes of empty houses. Bryan Richards thought that Spring would be a better time for the exercise. Richard Hambly asked if the replies would be anonymous. David Philp only wanted local electors to be asked. David Phelps said 'We have been here a long time and know what the parish wants.' He didn't like the idea of holiday cottage owners from other parts of the country telling St. Endellion what to do. Henry Symons pointed out that it would have been a great help if such a survey had been available when Hillson Close was built.

Malcolm Lee summed up by saying it would be proper for the survey to be restricted to electors. How could anyone know that the 30 or so people who attend the Annual Parish Meeting have valid views. It was important to get the views of the people who pay the money the Parish Council spends.

David Phelps made an amendment to the proposal that the questionnaire be drawn up before the Council made any decision. This was carried by a vote of 4 to 3. Malcolm Lee said it would be putting the chicken before the egg and that the questionnaire would now be produced but without any consultation.

Reports

Bill Dawe, District Council: Extra bins are to be provided at the top of Port Gaverne Hill and at the Playing Field. He pointed out that the Pea Pod shop had provided a refuse bin which they emptied at their own expense and wished that more shops would do the same.

Bryan Nicholls, Footpaths: Clearer notice should be given of the time, date, and venue of committee meetings as he had wasted an hour waiting for other committee members to turn up at the beginning of Port Isaac Valley path at Church Hill. He agreed that the bad place in the path mentioned by Jim Watson should be repaired immediately.

Malcolm Lee, Footpaths: He had also not been clear about the meeting and had waited at the millpool. Referring to the damaged path he pointed out that the Highway Authority is responsible for maintaining the surface of the path and said grant money should not be used to save County Council money.

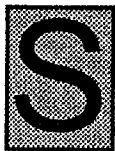
David Phelps, Seats: The seat painting and decorating is in hand. A seat on The Main is to be repaired. Another black plastic seat had been delivered but was of an unsuitable design and sent back. A replacement will be ordered after the designs have been looked at in Truro. When he was asked if 'Dick Pooley's' seat on Church Hill was to be repaired he said he thought it was included in the schedule but would look at it.

David Phelps, Playing Field: The Education Authority had explained that rest of the field had not been cut because the machine had broken down. The lower part is now to be cut twice a year. Next year the Parish may be asked to pay towards the cost although the Joint-User Agreement will have to be looked at first. The gates were damaged by the fish lorry, but some damage could have been caused by children swinging on them.

Henry Symons said the time has come to think about whether to start afresh with new posts or if repairs would be a waste of ratepayers' money.

David Phelps asked whether gates were needed at all. Why not try leaving them open during the summer and judge the effect - Hillson Close and Mayfield Road don't have gates. It would be better to halve the height of the hedges and create better visibility. There is still a need for traffic-calming measures.

David Philp said that parents would like self-closing gates. Gates stop small children running out into the road



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It was proposed and carried that the cost of new posts and a self-closing mechanism should be investigated.

Purchase of Playing Field

David Phelps said that an impromptu meeting, held because surveyor Martin Bell was available at the time, had learned that the best move at present would be to buy the land but leave levelling, etc. till later. Bryan Richards felt that such decisions should be made by the full committee.

Malcolm Lee had spoken to the Playing Fields Association and the National Lottery Fund and learned that Parish Councils come low in the pecking-order for grants - they were supposed to ask their electorate for any money they needed - therefore a totally independent (community) committee should be formed which would have a much better chance. The Parish Council could make a donation to this.

David Phelps to chair a small meeting on Friday 14th. July to arrange a Public Meeting as soon as possible.

Ramp for Wheelchairs - Coast Path

Bryan Nicholls asked for this matter to be discussed at the August meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE

a: A copy of a letter from Mrs. Kennedy of Coastguard Hill to Mr. Pyeman, Environmental Services Officer N.C.D.C. suggesting that there may be some confusion about refuse collection times resulting in a lot of unnecessary litter blowing about from plastic bags put out the previous night and torn open by gulls, etc.

Malcolm Lee said some public-spirited people were picking up litter but this type of action should not be relied on as it was essential to get the appropriate authorities to do this. He had been advised by Compass Services that

all the litter bins are cleared every day so he was surprised to find those at the car park, for example, full up by 10.00am.

Bill Dawe said two people had cleared Port Isaac beach one day, collecting 15 bags of litter, but this should be the responsibility of the Harbour Commissioners who received money from the beach car park.

The Clerk was asked to discover the collection times and confirm that the litter bins are cleared daily.

b: Webbers Buses - Trelights A letter from the company stated that there was full public consultation before deciding to reduce the service through Trelights to one bus a day each way. The service had not been used, so, after referring to the Transportation Department, and letters to Parish Councils, the new timetable was drawn up. The service would be increased if there was sufficient demand. St. Endellion Parish Council had not received a copy of Webbers' letter.

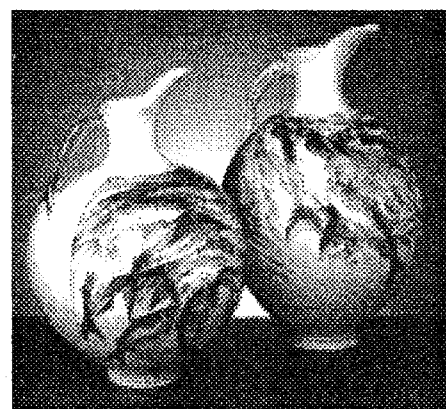
c: Longcross Stone - to protect the Brocagnus Stone, the Heritage Coast Service have arranged for granite stones to be buried around the island which will be slightly altered in shape. At the same time a wooden finger post will replace the present traffic direction sign.

PLANS

Bill Dawe left the room while plans for his development at Trelights were discussed. Henry Symons thought, however, it would be better to make the application the subject of a special meeting when the public could be given notice, as they had been concerning another similar development at Trelights.

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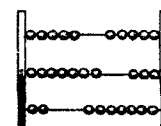
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ST. ENDELLION CHURCH
