PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 9th. October. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, and Bryan Richards.

Apologies were received from: Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Mark Provis, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Vice Chairman David Phelps took the chair in the absence of Henry Symons.

Public Discussion

Eric Stokes said that he was aware of mounting disquiet about the large sums of money being bandied about for the purchase of the extension to the playing fields. With our population of 1,000, he said, £16,000 is equal to £16 per person he said. Do the electors of St. Endellion need to subsidise a football pitch?

Peter Lobb agreed with Eric and said that when they needed to raise money for local activities in Trelights, they had to find it themselves.

Mrs. Brown said that, since her remarks about a speed limit for Trelights at the last meeting, a boy had been knocked off his bicycle at the corner near to the telephone kiosk. She also complained about a lady newcomer to the village who had been seen driving around with her daughter on the bonnet of her car.

Joy Haygreen spoke of an experience of having to dodge into a gateway in order to avoid being struck by a car that was being driven at speed.

Robin Penna asked whether something could be done about the forty plastic sacks of building rubble that had been in Temple Bar for the past six weeks. [The bags were removed on Tuesday 17th. October.]

Bryan Nicholls, as a member of the public, said that if people had things to say about Parish Council affairs then instead of writing letters to Trio they should attend the meetings and speak during the public discussion.

Finance

Monthly expenditure totalled £1,751.90. With £109.36 in the current account plus the second half of the Precept £4,250.00 and interest of £3.88, it was decided to transfer £26,000 to the high interest account where the balance would be £3,771.89. This would leave £11.34 in the current account.

Proposals by David Philp

a. That meetings should finish at 9.30pm. The Council did not agree with this, feeling that it

was better to finish all the business at one meeting rather than restrict the time and have to call extra meetings.

b. That the planning applications should be discussed at the beginning of the meeting instead of at the end. This was generally agreed as it was thought better to make relatively important decisions while councillors were still fresh. David Philp added that he could not understand how Cllr. Dawe had voted in favour of an application for a garage in the Port Isaac conservation area while voting against a similar application at Trelights.

c. That items under 'Clerk's Correspondence' should be for information only. This was agreed with the proviso that any item which arrived too late for inclusion in the agenda, and which needed to be settled before the next meeting, should be acted on straight away.

d. That only matters included in the agenda should be discussed. This is actually a legal requirement and was therefore agreed without comment.

First and Last - Listed Building?

Cllr. Bill Dawe had instructed the chairman to put to the meeting that this building should be put forward for listing as of architectural or historic interest. The proposal found no second order because the item had not been detailed correctly on the agenda, giving councillors no opportunity to gather necessary information. The matter will be discussed next month.

Committee Reports

There was neither a District Councillors report nor Chairman's report due to the absence of the two councillors.

Playing Field Purchasing Committee: Malcolm Lee said that a meeting had been held with the vendor's agent who had been informed that the Parish Council were prepared to purchase the land as soon as the funds were in place. It was thought that a draft contract would be available in a month or two.

Camelford School: Jill O'Connor said that it was intended to hold exhibitions of students' work at various venues next summer and the school would be interested to know if St. Endellion could provide a suitable venue. It had been suggested that the Doctors' Surgery could be used. The idea will be discussed next month.

Seat Committee: David Phelps said that a further black plastic seat had been delivered before there was time to cancel the order but that a wooden seat would still be installed at St. Endellion, the plastic one could be used in a lay-by at Trelights.

Speed of Traffic through Trelights

The council agreed with Mrs. Brown that Trelights needs a speed limit. This had been tried before with no success but Mr. Barriball proposed that the process be started again and that the Clerk should write to the Highway Authority and the Police. Bryan Nicholls said a speed limit would be useless without a police presence. Malcolm Lee said that it ought to be a matter of common sense not to drive at speed through the village but, unfortunately, some drivers had no common sense.

Semi-Acute Hospital in Bodmin

The Parish Council is to support a resolution from Bodmin Town Council to be presented to Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Health Authority that a semi-acute hospital be set up, preferably on the St. Lawrence's site.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Renewal of permission, and listed building permission, for the conversion to two dwellings of a barn and cart shed at Trefreock. This was recommended for approval by the District Council Planning Committee.

CLERK'S CORRESPONDENCE

A: A letter from the Countryside Commission said that wheelchairs were able to negotiate the granite steps on the coast path and that a ramp to replace them would create a serious safety problem. Also, the area had already attracted much expenditure in the last few years and it was felt that a site meeting would not provide any useful purpose.

The Council was appalled by the letter. It had only asked for the reinstatement of the path to its condition before the steps were built. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting.

B: It was agreed that a further five-years' North Cornwall District Council licence fee for the notice board at the car park should be paid.

C: A letter from Sproulls, solicitors, gave notice of an appeal by Eric Donnithorne with regard to his development behind Silvershell View. It was understood, however, that the appeal had already been turned down.

At a Parish Council planning meeting on 23rd. October strong feelings were voiced about new plans for the controversial development 'Maylands' at Port Gaverne. The building ought to have been demolished, it is too near the road, and revised plans for what seems to be a larger building were not recommended for approval.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held at 7.30pm, Monday 13th. November, in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Dear Trio, Mr. Bill Dawe's latest planning application was approved on its merits just as previous applications were rejected as unsuitable. From an aerial view of Trelights the site in question is obviously infill. It is absurd of Mr. Stokes to suggest a councillor should not undertake certain business because a number of his electors disagree with it. Thankfully our representatives are not puppets. To surround an application such as this with the emotive issue of morality is itself immoral. *Peter Blake.*



BUS SERVICES


Webbers have informed Trio that they no longer operate a bus service between Port Isaac and Wadebridge although they will continue to carry fare-paying passengers on the 7.45am, and 3.35pm. return bus, during school terms only. Otherwise the service is now operated by Western National - and Trelights is now also served on the route. For bus times please ask the drivers for a timetable.

In a telephone conversation, Brian James, Western National Divisional Director for Cornwall, commented, 'Every four or five years, Cornwall County Council have to invite tenders for the bus services that require supporting financially. The service between Port Isaac and Wadebridge required such support in the afternoons and Western National won the tender to provide this. There were therefore two companies running on the same route but after discussion with Keith Webber, Western National will, from Monday 30th. October, be running the bus service in conjunction with Webbers Coaches, who will provide the bus at school times during school terms. The new timetable also gives the facility for students to travel to Truro College by changing at Wadebridge.'


