## PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. March. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Mark Provis, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, and Bryan Nicholls.

### Public Discussion

Peggy Richards asked why there had been no public referendum before the purchase of the extra land adjacent to the playing fields was agreed. She called for a statement of the Parish Council's intentions for the use of the field and whether the fencing mentioned last month was to enable the use of the field for grazing of stock, if this was the case then drinking water would have to be supplied.

Mr. Leadville Cleave asked why the Parish Council didn't study the needs of people living around areas where development was taking place. For example in Trewetha Lane there was already one large house and now another was to be built. Everyone should be allowed a view of the village and privileges should not be taken from one to give to another. He also deplored the possible removal of a length of Cornish stone wall boundary hedge. Concerning another matter, the idea of a one-way system for Trewetha Lane, he pointed out that oil lorries, dustcarts, etc. all proceed down the lane and therefore a one-way system would be ridiculous.

Mr. Rob Carter said that his proposed new house would be smaller than the existing one and that care was being taken to keep the height as low as possible. It would be the same height as a bungalow when seen from the road. It was also to be positioned further away from the road.

Mr. Leadville Cleave said he hoped the existing access would be used instead of destroying the wall to make a new entrance.

Robin Penna repeated his request for something to be done to make information about refuse collection arrangements available to visitors. He also pointed out that the notice board at the main car park was badly damaged and unusable.

### Plans

a. The Parish Council recommended for approval, to the District Council planning committee, revisions to a renewal of permission for the erection of two dwellings at Gaverne Cottages, Port Gaverne, for Dennis Knight.

b. Detailed plans for the erection of a house and garage, with access, in Trewetha Lane for Mr. and Mrs. R. Carter were accepted providing the levels were kept low, there was a minimum of stone hedge destruction, and that sympathetic materials were used.

c. Conservation area consent for the demolition of the boundary wall/bank in connection with the above plans was accepted providing that the least amount possible was demolished and that none of the hedge was replaced with modern imitation stone walling. It was pointed out, however, that all previous applications to remove stone hedges had been refused by District Council planning committees – the old walls should be retained at all costs anywhere in the conservation area.

### Finance

a. Malcolm Lee was granted permission to transfer £600 from the high interest account to cover monthly expenditure.

b. Estimates for different types of posts for the playing fields gates were still not available and the matter was deferred until next month. Mark Provis said he had been looking at the deeds of the playing fields and as a result didn't think there should be gates at all.

c. Although there was already a 3% overspend of funds, the Council decided to pay a one-off donation of £36 to sponsor a one-yard section of the British Legion's proposed 75th. anniversary 75-mile-long poppy chain.

### Parish Council Representative to the Harbour Commissioners

In a village where so many people are involved with fishing it is thought that the Parish Council ought to be able to represent their views. Although letters had been written to the Harbour Commissioners, no reply had been received. It was suggested that eventually a meeting should be pressed for but that the matter should be deferred meanwhile.

### One Way Traffic, Trewetha Lane

It was decided to take no further action on this item as letters from both the authorities concerned only underlined the impossibility of getting any scheme considered. The lists of applications were too long and the funds were too short.

### Signatories to Woolwich Account

It was decided to make Malcolm Lee, David Philp, and Mark Provis signatories to the building society account containing funds of £500 donated to the Parish Council, for sole use on repairs and maintenance of the playing fields equipment, when the previous Port Isaac Playing Fields Action Group closed.

### Purchase of Playing Field land

The field would be purchased subject to any encumbrances e.g. way-leaves for drains, cables, etc. with no alterations in levels where any existing drains, etc. are situated. The existing fences on two sides of the field are to be maintained. The field is to be used for recreational and 'parish purposes' only – which phrase was felt to be meaningless.

Malcolm Lee's proposal, that the contract was entered into, was carried unanimously. He pointed out that the fixed-rate loan was going to be especially beneficial due to the record low current interest rate at which it would be set.

### Parish Survey

The Parish Council agreed, in principle, to undertake a survey of the views of the people of the Parish in the autumn, subject to obtaining all the costs through local sponsorship. The form of the questionnaire to be used in the Survey will be decided at a future meeting of

the Council, after consultation with other interested parties.

David Phelps said that he admired the work that Malcolm Lee had done so far for the Parish Council. He felt, however, that the Parish Council had been listening to the people for many years, that work on a Survey would be a waste of time, and he would, therefore, abstain from the vote.

Mark Provis said the Council must still make its own decisions and not be tied down by any results of a survey.

### Reports of Committees

Mark Provis – 'tarmac and chippings' – reported on the amount of rubbish in the village and that the contractors had not been fulfilling their obligation to brush ten of the streets. After he had complained to the environmental department of the District Council, two men had been sent to spend 3½ hours which was nothing like sufficient. He complained again to the District Council who sent out an inspector and a meeting was held with the contractors who were found to have been 'blatantly not doing their job'. It is hoped that the streets will now be brushed properly and that the village will look better. Mark has a copy of the contract if anyone is interested in seeing it.

The press and the public were excluded from the rest of the meeting while tenders for the caretaking of Port Gaverne toilets were to be discussed.

### Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 15th. April at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

### PLANNING MEETING

An interim meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 25th. March.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Malcolm Lee announced that contracts had been exchanged for the purchase of extra land adjacent to the Playing Fields and he hoped for completion by Friday 29th. March.

### Mr. B. Blake, erection of two dwellings at Trelights

Letters were read out expressing concern about the possible loss of the Cornish hedge and the change in the village scene approaching via the chapel. Mr. Barriball said that 49 properties had been built in the village since 1985 and unless care was taken Trelights would eventually become a large village instead of a small one. The Council agreed that the wall should be retained at all costs but felt that the application

should be turned down by the District Council as within the requirement of the Local Plan it could be considered as neither 'rounding off' nor 'infilling'. David Phelps proposed that the application be recommended to the District Council planning committee for approval with the proviso that the existing Cornish hedge is retained as far as possible. This was seconded by Bill Dawe and carried by a vote of six for and two against.

(Bill Dawe left the meeting at this point as the next item concerned his property and so that he could attend a meeting of the Harbour Commissioners.)

### Mr. W. J. Dawe, certificate of lawfulness for the siting of two caravans at Pennant

There are nine caravans on the site at present, six have authorisation, one lapsed in 1977, and two have been unauthorised since 1986. The Council was asked to corroborate that the site had had ten years' continuous use. Nobody on the Council had the requisite knowledge of the site but it was agreed to offer no objections to nine caravans on the site when at least the information would be properly documented.

## P.I.D.T.A.

### Chairman's Report

At the Annual General Meeting of Port Isaac and District Tourism Association at the Old School Hotel on Thursday evening 21st. April, Chairman Chris Harris spoke about the Accommodation Guide. Many enquiries for which come via the North Cornwall Guide as well as from Tourist Information Centres. Distribution is a problem - everybody is very busy in the summer. The 'Discover Port Isaac' leaflet helped compete against glossy brochures for attractions elsewhere. The 'What's On' Guide will not be continued as information is not available soon enough. The full colour 'Away From It All' leaflet will continue to be available for sale while stocks last.

The 'Mail on Sunday' advertisement yielded very disappointing results. There is an advertisement in the North Cornwall Guide (with no Tourist Information Centre Port Isaac would otherwise not be featured), and in this year's North Cornwall Heritage Coast and Countryside Service 'Coastlines' newspaper.

The closure of Prout's Garage was much regretted but fortunately there are still car repair facilities in the village.

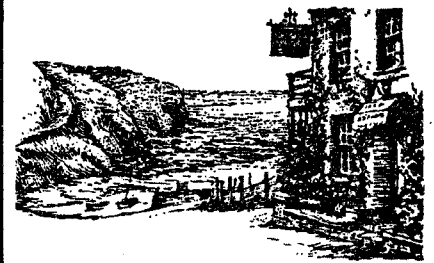

Many P.I.D.T.A. members had both offered prizes and sold tickets for the Village Hall 'Free Holiday' Draw.

There was fear that Port Isaac beach might not be available for parking but the proposal by the Harbour Commissioners seemed to be going no further. P.I.D.T.A. would campaign strongly against losing car parking spaces.

No social events were organised because the committee have no time - it takes the small committee a lot of effort to achieve what is done already.

### Hon. Treasurer's Report

Copies of the Financial Report were distributed at the meeting, prepared by Chris Harris who is acting voluntarily as Hon. Chairman until an officer can be found for this duty. Due to retirements and business closures, membership is down from 45 to 33.

### New Guide

Robin Penna said that P.I.D.T.A. is going to brighten up its image with a colour cover on the Accommodation Guide which will be a more general guide with visitor information and display advertisements for both accommodation and non-accommodation businesses inside.

Chris Harris thought the new guide would offer an invaluable advertising opportunity for all businesses in the village. The new guide will be distributed to present outlets, and, it was hoped, to all accommodation providers which will make it accessible to all our visitors.

### Subscriptions

The committee proposed a 60% interim subscription, until payments are made for advertising in the new guide, but Malcolm Lee proposed this be overruled and subscriptions held the same as last year to ensure sufficient funds. This was carried by the meeting. Chris Harris reminded members that they would still pay in advance for advertisements in the new guide, later this year.

### Election of Committee

Sarah Holmes' proposal was carried, to re-elect the existing committee, less Bob Douglas who had resigned, and plus Phil Slack (St. Andrews Hotel) and Philip Hudson (Wheelhouse).

### Public Discussion

Philip Hudson's offer to take aerial photographs for the cover of the new Guide was gratefully accepted.

Fred Thompson suggested more involvement with the St. Endellion Music Festival, local golf courses, bicycle hire businesses, etc.

Sarah Holmes expressed anxiety about derelict property at Port Gaverne. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

The Jumble Sale was a success, raising over £150 for choir funds. Many thanks to everyone for their support.

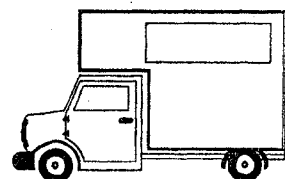

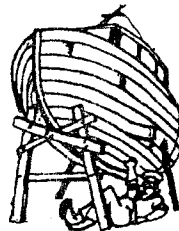
