PARISH PATHS PARTNERSHIP

If you have walked up Port Isaac valley to the mill pool bridge recently, you will have noticed some improvements to the footpath. Those fallen trees have been removed from across the path, and the muddy slide down to the footbridge has been replaced with steps and a slate pathway. This work has been done at no cost to the parish, as it has been 100% funded by the Parish Paths Partnership with Cornwall County Council. Over the next few years, this partnership will lead to further improvements to our local footpaths.

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PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 15th. April. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), David Philp, Mark Provis, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), and Richard Hambly.

Public Discussion

Tony Masterson voiced the opinion of himself and other neighbours against plans to convert the small lock-up shop in Tintagel Terrace to holiday accommodation. The building has no drains or mains water and stands on ground shared by all the tenants. When the properties were leased, it was a shop and not bound by the same regulations as the adjacent households.

Ted Childs spoke of the emotional and financial stress caused at his cottage in the narrowest part at the bottom of Church Hill, not to mention embarrassment to the motorists involved. The highway authority has installed a curb which keeps most vehicles away from the wall and signs have been erected which are inadequate and give conflicting information – one of them was removed during a filming exercise and has not been replaced. He cited the signs on the narrow bridge at Hellandbridge as a good example of oversize vehicle control.

He asked whether the Parish Council had any interest in the matter and if they were aware of the unsuitable vehicles that used Church Hill – caravans, lorries, motor caravans, and even a Western National bus! He suggested that a sub-committee be formed to hold a site meeting. This will be discussed next month. The highway authority has promised to visit Church Hill but so far there has been no action.

Robin Penna asked when the footpath on Port Gaverne Hill was actually going to be repaired. He also voiced appreciation of work done to improve the footpath at the far end of the mill pool in Port Isaac valley.

Planning applications

a. To carry out works to trees covered by a tree preservation order, namely: topping 2m off four sycamore trees, Trequair, Marshalls Way, Trelights. Mrs. M. J. Lyall. The application had already received county and district council approval and was carried without comment.

b. Change of use of lock up shop to holiday accommodation. 2 The Terrace. Mr. and Mrs. Cleave. The chairman read letters from Joe Saundry and Tony Masterson. The Council made the observation that the building is unsuitable for holiday accommodation and was not in favour of the application.

Financial Statement

Malcolm Lee announced that the transfer of the playing field land awaited only one signature by a director, at present overseas. He presented a statement which showed that the £16,000 loan for the playing field land had been received and that after paying for the land, with the usual expenses, the high interest account would stand at £3,049. He requested a further £500 to be transferred to the treasurer account to cover monthly expenditure of £1,225.63.

He stated that balances would be £111.36 in the treasurer account and £2549.09 in the high interest account after payments were made. The accounts were approved by the Council.

Proposal to Remove Playing Field Gates

David Phelps stated that the gates are rarely kept closed, are unsuitable, would cost a lot to repair, and proposed that they be removed for a trial period to assess whether they are necessary. David Philp reminded the meeting that some years ago, when there were no gates, there were old car engines, a lorry, and sometimes people sleeping in the car space. He felt the gates should be locked. It was sometimes very hard to keep complete control over children who could suddenly dash away, and the gates were at least a barrier from the road. He also asked if the Barrons had been consulted as they could also be affected by strangers driving on to their right of way. Bryan Nicholls pointed out that the car space is not part of the playing field so children should not be playing there. Malcolm Lee said that only one child needs to get injured and the gates would be found to be necessary. It would be horrific if anyone got hurt and many questions would be asked. It was the liability of the Parish Council to ensure safety. Mark Provis said the deeds should be made available to all councillors as they clearly showed a car park or coach park. David Philp said that the public should be asked for their opinion on the matter. Bryan Richards asked why no costing for repairing the gates had been received during the past six months. The item will be discussed further next month.

Inaugural Meeting of Local Committee

Councillors are to attend a meeting on Friday 10th. May at Wadebridge Town Hall for the re-establishment of a local committee of North Cornwall Parish Councils.

Allocation of Footpaths for Inspection

Councillors Malcolm Lee, Jill O'Connor, and Henry Symons will each check specific lengths of footpath when these are reported to have been cut. Under environmental protection laws, cutting is not allowed to take place before Sunday 9th. June. David Phelps pointed out that now the path alongside Trewetha Farm has been fenced, this will have to be added to the list of paths to be cut in future.

Dog Bins

Bryan Nicholls said that the dog mess around the village was horrendous and that 120 specimens had been counted between Atlantic House and Port Gaverne Hotel via the cliff path. The bins were not used. Wheelchairs had been banned, he said, now the dogs should be banned as well. Mark Provis said that although the bins were not used as much as they should be, they were used by responsible dog owners. Somebody needed to be prosecuted. Malcolm Lee feared that North Cornwall District Council would consider it too expensive to make a prosecution. It was decided to ask the environmental department for advice on suitable notices to warn the public that the Parish Council would take action against offenders.

Pavements, Hartland Road

A site meeting, with County Councillor Harvey Lander in attendance, was held in November but the pavements are still in a disgusting state and nothing has been done, or will be until someone trips over, said Bryan Nicholls. Bill Dawe (in a written District Councillor's Report), said that Connac should complete their work by the end of April and County Highways

were 'looking at' the pavement. The item will be on next month's agenda when, if the work is complete, no further action may be necessary.

District Councillor's Report

In his written statement, Bill Dawe also said that he had voted against the application for Maylands, Port Gaverne but the applicant had been granted planning permission by a vote of 11 to 6, subject to the roof height being reduced.

Footpath Officer's Report

Malcolm Lee said that with the help of Jill O'Connor, eight members of her youth group (some of whom had never been along the path before), and some adult volunteers, steps and stepping stones had been installed and cemented in at the bridge at the end of the mill pool. Dead trees had also been removed and direction signs repaired. The Council offered thanks to the volunteers involved. A section of the path nearer the village where the bank had collapsed had been repaired by John Sweet and the path re-aligned further from the edge.

Playing Field Grass Keeping

David Phelps suggested that notices for tenders should be posted immediately for grass keeping on the new section of the playing field to ensure that the growth does not get out of hand.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. A report from Trelights Village Green Committee said that some of the ropes had been cut on the climbing equipment and requested the Parish Council to organise repairs.

b. A notice from the Housing department that Parish Councils would no longer be consulted on housing allocations.

c. An invitation to Councillors to attend a Village Hall Social Evening at the Old School Hotel on Wednesday 24th. April when 2/3 of the profits from last year's lottery would be distributed to various local organisations.

Journal

Bryan Nicholls expressed disgust at the tone of the recent letter by Mr. Drover concerning the steps on the cliff path. He felt it was an insult to the Parish Council and that a stronger response should have been taken. Henry Symons pointed out that the Council had gone through all the procedures it could follow and that the meeting had made the final decision. He was, however, also surprised at the tone of the letter.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 13th. May at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

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
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


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POLICE

Henry Symons, Chairman, welcomed guests and the public. Bill Dawe said the Council must be doing a good job or the room would be full.

Finance

Malcolm Lee presented a detailed Financial Report - this can be seen at the Clerk's office.

Chairman's Report

It had been a busy year with seats, footpaths, and planning applications causing extra meetings. The service at Truro celebrating the end of the war was moving. Port Gaverne toilets drained resources. The Council is no longer consulted on housing allocation. The Parish Survey will be produced by Malcolm Lee at no cost. There was little success with ambulance arrival times. Direction signs were finally up and 30mph. signs in Trelights. The Parish Paths Partnership had improved the mill path. The playing field land purchase was in hand. A referendum had been suggested by a previous Council, it was now thought better to proceed as quickly as possible before the land became built-up.

County Councillor Harvey Lander

The District Auditor approved County Council spending. The maximum of £296,000,000 was needed and money was diverted from fire services and highways by government demand for old people's homes, and waste land tax. There had been staff cuts by retirements and meetings reduced to four a year from six. The Cornwall University project was supported and the creation of a sixth form at Wadebridge had begun. We have three good primary schools. All road


Questions from the Public

Nearly 250 people filled the church at 11.00am. for the Sung Eucharist in the church, beautifully decorated with colourful Spring flowers. Easter eggs were distributed to the children afterwards by the Rector and servers. There was standing room only in the church at 5.00pm. for Choral Evensong sung by the Easter Music Festival Choir, with orchestra, directed by Richard Hickox. The Rector officiated.

As always, the Music Festival programme is set within the context of worship, and each evening's concert except Saturday's, opened with prayer and ended with the singing of the late evening Office of Compline by candlelight. The church was packed with people each evening and highlight of a week of wonderful music was the performance on Friday and Saturday of Brahms', 'A German Requiem.'


