St. Peter's Church was almost full on Saturday 3rd. August for the funeral service for Mr. Bill Pattenden of 'Greenbanks', 67 Fore Street. Bill was aged 88 and had died the previous Monday. Interment was at St. Endellion. We express our sincere sympathy to all the family in their bereavement.

Bill was born in London's East End, in 1907, the youngest of the family. They were traders and he grew up among the market stalls. He met Violet in the 1930's, they married at Shoreditch and set up home in London where Billy and Joseph were born before the war. At the outbreak of hostilities, Bill enlisted in the Green Jackets and went to North Africa, arranging for the family to move down to Cornwall, and when Lil was born in Chicago House, Violet was working as village dressmaker to support the family. After the war the family returned to London and Bill and Violet set up in business together making dolls and puppets. Holidays were always taken in Port Isaac. Barbara was born in London - on Derby Day. Bill and Vi later had a cafe in Earls Court and, then a pub 'The Clarendon'. About 18 years ago they came back to Port Isaac. Bill had a sense of humour and once said of a friend 'I knew him when Hyde Park was a flower pot'. He loved Cornwall and has felt at home in Port Isaac since they first arrived in 1940. It would have pleased him that so many of the people who were so welcoming to the family when we arrived were there with that same friendship to the end.

Violet and her family would like to express sincere thanks for the many cards, letters, flowers, and warm condolences received during this very difficult time. 

PARISH COUNCIL

An unofficial report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. August. For official information, please refer to the Parish Council minutes.

Present were: Harold Barriball, Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Richard Hambly, Malcolm Lee (Treasurer), Bryan Nicholls, David Philp, Bryan Richards, and Henry Symons (Chairman).

Apologies were received from: Jill O'Connor, David Phelps (Vice Chairman), and Mark Provis.

Henry Symons prefaced the meeting by reminding councillors that, as elected members, they had the privilege of calmly discussing and voting on resolutions and should respect each other's views but if they felt strongly about any matter they could have their name and the direction of their vote recorded in the minutes. He also pointed out that any councillor found to be in breach of the regulations regarding confidentiality of matters discussed after the exclusion of the press and public from a meeting could be removed from parish council committees or sub-committees.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards said that in future, as the police had no facilities for dealing with stray dogs, she would ask the dog warden to take them in and the owners would have to pay the expensive fees to get them back. She queried the need to change the refuse collection system in the village. Car parking needed to be provided to avoid cars having to park along New Road and Trewetha Lane as far as the playing fields.

Robin Penna said wheelie bins trundled from the Platt to half way up Fore Street made a lot of noise, waking our visitors up - who had come here for a restful holiday - at 7.00am. The road sweeper does an excellent job as specified by 'Compass' [District Council refuse collection contractors] but that elsewhere weeds and overgrowth made the village look dreadful and actually made some of the narrow lanes impassable much of the time. He suggested that the council could look into the feasibility of appointing a warden to keep these parts of the village clean and tidy and to discover whether funding could be obtained via the parish precept.

Planning Applications

Use of garage as sitting room and erection of a utility room at 3 Silvershell Road. Mr. and Mrs. M. Collings. The council raised no objections to this application.

Finance

With a monthly expenditure of £1081.02 and a balance of only £87.90 in the treasurer account, Malcolm Lee was granted permission to transfer £1100 from the high interest account. This leaves £4091.57 in the high interest account and £116.88 in the treasurer account.

It was decided to donate £100 to Port Isaac Football Club to help with the cost of new kit. Bryan Richards declared an interest.

Vehicles Driving Across verges

Richard Hambly said a deterrent was needed to stop vehicles taking short cuts across the wide verges at Trewetha and suggested curbs or bollards. The council feared that the authorities would claim that no money could be spared for this and would therefore enquire about the

possibility of asking a local contractor to build low post and rail guard fences.

Road at Old Coastguard Station

Bryan Nicholls reported that somebody had fallen on the poor surface where the road leads off Fore Street. It was thought, however, that this is an unadopted road and that the various householders would have to get together and get the work done. The authorities would probably only consider adoption when the road was in good shape.

Agenda Items Refused by Chairman

The two following items on the agenda which did not specify the business to be discussed were not allowed by Henry Symons who pointed out that every item on an agenda should be in the form of a proposal.

Public Discussion After Meetings

The consensus of opinion was that it would be very frustrating for the public not to be allowed to discuss agenda items until after the decisions had been made and it is better to keep the public discussion before the meeting. The clerk pointed out that any member of the public could hand councillors a letter to have something put on the agenda.

Gypsy/Traveller Caravans

None were reported in the parish.

Litter Bin for Playing Field

The North Cornwall District Council would sanction an extra green-bottle bottle bank and a litter bin if the parish council provided them. The clerk is to discover what types are suitable and their costs, also to ask if an extra charge would be made for emptying them.

District Councillor's Report

Councillor Bill Dawe spoke about the need for smaller refuse collection lorries in Fore Street and that the decision seemed to be due to the reluctance of an individual driver to make an extra trip but who should not be allowed to decide such matters as he was paid by the taxpayers. He also reported that he had arranged for the coastal path at Tartars Farm and behind Tregudda at Port Gaverne to be cleared. Also, a litter bin will be provided outside the Co-op.

Henry Symons reported that a letter had been received from 'Compass' to the effect that a Sunday collection would be provided for the next four weeks.


Chairman's Report

Henry Symons informed the council that a constitution was being drawn up with the possibility of forming a North Cornwall committee of the Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councils and that he had already been appointed Vice Chairman. At the annual Police Liaison meeting the lack of policemen was deplored but they were told that the Force is hamstrung by the lack of finance. Moves are being made to set up a Village Hall committee and there will be a report about this in September.

Bill Dawe wanted to know why the police were doing so little about mechanisation and modernisation. Henry Symons said that cuts were being made all round. He knew for a fact that the Health Services have been required to make a 3% cut annually which, after salaries were paid, actually represented more like 10% of the rest of the budget.

Parish Council report, continued.

Reports of Committees

Playing Fields: David Philp reported that Bill Norris has repaired the climbing frame but that perhaps a donation should be made to Peter Albury who drove over to the workshop to bring it back but found it was too awkward a shape to fit into his van and another carrier had to be found. The frame is now to be repainted. He had also authorised a carpenter to make an emergency repair to the other climbing frame as a matter of safety. The gate and fence have been done and very well.

Seats: Harold Barriball said that a regular visitor to Port Isaac had offered a wooden seat with a plaque provided it was put on the coast path. A space is to be made in front of Castle Rock Hotel by removing one of the existing seats to another place.

Clerk's Correspondence

a. A letter from Trio, including annual accounts, thanking the council for the donation towards expenditure.

b. A letter from the County Council to say that the path from Port Gaverne to Cartway Cove [behind Tregudda] had been cut and apologising for the delay which had been caused by having to cut much heavy undergrowth this year.

c. A letter from the District Council said there were no funds for providing a picnic place at the car park but sympathetic consideration would be given to any proposals. [A voice from the public said 'It would be better as an extra car park.']

d. Reductions in Highway Budget. A long 'Briefing Note' from the Chairman of the Sites and Transportation Committee explained the necessity for an equally long 'Summary of Policies to help the situation' - attached. [See the item 'Highways' - Ed.]

The press and the public were then asked to leave the meeting while the council discussed estimates and quotations for notice boards.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 9th. September at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

HIGHWAYS

As a result of required budget reductions, County 'Highways and Transportations Services', are changing some working practices. The full information is available from the Clerk to the Parish Council, Barbara Willmott, but here are some, very brief, extracts. Please note that some policies are subject to further review.

Hedge and verge Cutting: Where a roadside hedge is uncut and causes an obstruction, the County Council serves formal notice on the landowner to have it trimmed. Failure to comply can result in a contractor being instructed to do the work with the costs being sought from the person in default.

Road Markings: New markings will only be provided where essential for safety. All existing markings, except carriageway edges, will be maintained.

Road Signs: Information signs will not be replaced, warning and regulatory signs will be replaced within budgetary constraints.

Street Lights: Bulbs will be replaced within 14 days of failure.

Winter Salting: Some less heavily trafficked roads will no longer be salted.

Minor Improvements: No further schemes can be considered until the backlog of existing schemes has been reduced.

Carriageway Maintenance: Remedial work will be decreased and only the worst cases will be treated.

Safety and Minor Works: Remedial work on footways, drainage, and safety fences has been reduced.

Parking Restrictions: Requests for new Traffic Orders are not being considered or accepted.

Speed Limits: New requests are not being considered or accepted.

Traffic Calming: Over 200 requests a year are received and new projects are implemented as part of an on-going programme.

NAME OF THE YACHT?

In 1979, a yacht, with would-be spectators of that year's ill-fated Fastnet Yacht race on board, sailed into Port Isaac harbour to shelter from the storm. It was so rough, however, that the crew could not disembark, in spite of efforts by the fishermen to bring them off, and had to stay aboard the yacht overnight. The yacht was held upright by a rope slung across from one side of the harbour to the other. In the morning everybody went down to the beach to help haul the yacht above the tide line, heaving on the painter, like a tug-of-war, every time the sea floated the yacht sufficiently off the ground. Summer Festival of Music

The 38th. Summer Music Festival was particularly special, marking as it did Richard Hickox's 25th. consecutive appearance as Director. This was celebrated by two concert performances by a talented cast of Strauss's 'Ariadne Auf Naxos' on the Saturday and Sunday evenings.

As always, worship was an integral part of the Festival and the opening choral evensong sung by the Revd. Preb. Michael Bartlett, Rector and accompanied by the Festival Chorus and Orchestra, attracted a large congregation. Special preacher was the Revd. Canon Noel Godwin. During the service a hand bell, to be used as a rallying call to the festival, was dedicated to the glory of God in memory of the late Paul Sutton, a popular Festival member. Tickets for several evenings were sold out long before the concerts including the first one which presented the world premier of Britten's 'World of the Spirit.' This work, a kind of spiritual meditation, delicately combined words and music and featured Michael Bartlett, the Rector and Elizabeth Bartlett as speakers of Scripture, poetry and prose from ancient to modern times.

The Monteverdi Vespers, a sell-out on Monday evening, were repeated in Truro Cathedral on Tuesday when the Festival sang choral evensong and the lessons were read by the Rector.

Three late evening concerts also drew quite large audiences. The Festival sung Eucharist on Sunday 11th. August was very well attended when the Rt. Revd. Rowan Williams, Bishop of Monmouth and well-known theologian and writer, was celebrant and preacher. He was assisted by the Rector and by the Revd. Judith Pollinger, Curate. The Rector presided and preached at the final Festival Sung Eucharist. Before each concert, the Rector welcomed everyone and said a prayer. The late Evening Office of Compline was sung by candlelight on four occasions after performances.

Harvest Festival



News of services in July and August (up to Monday 11th. August).

They ask us to pass on their deepest thanks to all especially Crew and Committee members, for the many messages of good-will which they received, especially regarding the recent serious illness of their son, also David. Our thanks must go to Jon Cleave who has been acting Hon. Sec. until my arrival as a full-time resident. I am now finding it almost a full-time occupation! Now to service news

Monday 15th. July: ILB [Inshore Lifeboat] launched to assist with a man cut off on cliffs at Tintagel. He was rescued by coastguards. Crew: M. Provis, A. Walton, P. Pollington.

Friday 26th. July: ILB launched on exercise to recover a sheep, seen and reported to the coastguards by Dugald Sproull in his boat 'Boy John'. It turned out to be a lamb which was recovered and returned to the farmer at Port Quin.

Monday 29th. July: ILB launched to investigate a report of 'children' in inflatable boats off Port Gaveme. They turned out to be a father (36) and son (14) fishing, in toy inflatables. They were returned safely to the beach. Crew: A. Walton, C. Scott, R. Parkyn.

The ILB was launched again the same day to assist three people in the water at Trebarwith Strand. Two of them were lifeguards who successfully landed a swimmer through heavy swell and surf. Crew M. Provis, A. Walton, K. Dingle.

Sunday 4th. August: Whilst on exercise at the Rumps, the ILB was diverted following the finding of a bomb on Pine Awn beach by Oliver Childs, who, with three other persons and their large dog, was later brought back by boat to Port Isaac. The bomb was guarded by coastguards until the arrival of the Bomb Disposal Unit from Plymouth. The bomb was exploded and destroyed at 4.20pm. Crew: A. Walton, K. Dingle, J. Coy.

The ILB has been exercised very regularly this year and many visitors come into our boathouse which is open every day from 8.30am. until dusk. Souvenirs are on sale every Thursday evening while the St. Breward band plays on the Platt.

Saturday 10th. August was our Lifeboat Day. Souvenir sales and collecting boxes outside the boathouse raised just over £300. Many thanks to all who helped with sales and collections.

Dear Trio, We are currently staying in 'Ribena Cottage', Dolphin Street. At the beginning of our visit I shopped in Wadebridge for groceries and meat to find higher prices than at home in Liverpool. It was therefore, with some trepidation that I ventured to the local butcher's shop in Port Isaac, expecting to find even higher prices. However to my surprise, the meat I bought was of a superior quality to that purchased in Wadebridge AND it was about 6% cheaper. The local corner shops in Liverpool charge astronomical prices (e.g. 93p. for a large brown loaf) and they are to be avoided at all cost. Therefore I only intended to buy enough meat from Port Isaac's butcher to last until I went shopping in Wadebridge. However, I left the butcher's shop with a week's supply of bacon and sausages and I intend to continue shopping locally for the remainder of my visit. The bread shop too, only charged 52p. for a large brown loaf. I was very impressed and would urge anyone to think again before leaving Port Isaac to buy bread or meat elsewhere. I should also add that the fish bought in the village has been absolutely delicious and reasonably priced. We have also patronised Victoria House for jumpers and are almost looking forward to a cold winter to wear our purchases. So, support your local village shops in Port Isaac and save yourself money whilst buying quality. I am already looking forward immensely to my annual visit of 1997.
