VILLAGE HALL

With the committee and representatives of the Playgroup and the Cub Scouts, there were eight people present at the Annual General Meeting last month. Apologies for absence were received from Bill Dawe and Bryan Richards.

Chairman's Statement

David Philp spoke of the problems inherited on taking over management of the hall after a period of hiatus and thanked Bess Coates and Malcolm Lee for their help in sorting things out. He praised the newly formed Cub Scouts who were making good use of the hall and thanked them for the decorative fruit tree that they had planted in front of the hall as a mark of their inauguration. He said the Playgroup were happy with the hall, and that a new Aerobics class has started.

The Hall now has a theatre licence so it is possible to use it for all kinds of public entertainment. The health inspector, who travels all over the county, when he came to give his blessing said the Hall is 'brilliant' - we don't realise how lucky we are!

The Wadebridge Male Voice Choir has booked the Hall for Wednesday 20th. August.

David gave special thanks to those members of the committee who work hard for the Hall even though they don't use it themselves.

Vice Chairman

Malcolm Lee said he was relieved that the plans for a new hall had not come to fruition as he had feared that the village would not have been able to support the cost of running it and that this burden would have fallen on the ratepayers.

He spoke of hopes of obtaining grant aid for the refurbishment of the Hall, to add desperately needed storage space on the south side, and to provide easier access from the road.

Treasurer

Bess Coates presented the annual figures and pointed out that for this initial period the expenditure had exceeded the income especially as, with no committee to organise it, there had been no fund-raising Raft Race.

Election of Committee

The committee (Bess Coates, Bill Dawe, Chrissie Everett, Malcolm Lee, Robin Penna, David Philp, and Bryan Richards) was re-elected en bloc. Malcolm Lee offered to take over the job of Treasurer from Bess Coates who had asked to be relieved of the work.

Next year more will be printed. Plans are already afoot for the next one and forms will be sent out at the end of June inviting all businesses to take advertising space.

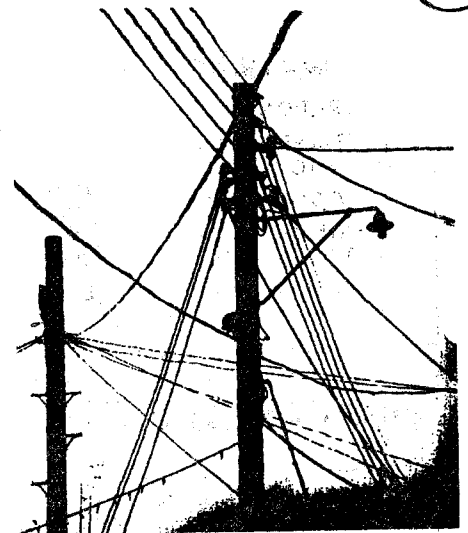
SCOPE

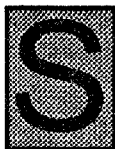

PARISH COUNCIL

The Council have re-elected Henry Symons as Chairman, David Phelps as Vice-Chairman, and Malcolm Lee as Treasurer this year and all other officers except for the Village Hall, and Roads representatives who were absent.

Temple Bar

A member of the public asked when action would be taken to prevent a 'padding pool' forming in the narrow alley every time it rained.

The Old Telephone Exchange

The Council recommended approval after the Chairman read out a letter detailing possible modifications to a recently refused planning application, to turn the old telephone exchange into a dwelling. The objections that the building overlooked adjacent properties could be overcome by re-siting some windows and using obscured glass in others. The hipped roof would now be retained.

Speed Limit at Trewetha

A proposal for a 40mph limit from the entrance to Trewetha to the 30mph limit at the entrance to Port Isaac was postponed until Richard Hambly would be able to attend a meeting and put his proposal forward.

The Playing Field

There seem to be insuperable difficulties in the way of providing the facilities required. Some two years after the purchase of the field nobody has presented any kind of plan. Bryan Richards was prevented from making a proposal that a committee be authorised to instruct a company to produce plans, however, as it was thought that as a member of the football team he should have declared an interest. Unfortunately he was not made aware of this at the time he put his proposal on the agenda. It is necessary to get clearance on this matter from the Chief Executive of the District Council. Some councillors showed signs of extreme annoyance at the further delay this entails.

A plea was brought forward for more recreational equipment at the field and it was thought that there was probably about £300 left in the fund inherited from the now defunct Port Isaac Playing Field Action Group (P.I.P.F.A.G.).

Parking in New Road

Cars are being parked all the way from just around Hick's Corner to the brow of the hill and an accident is bound to happen sooner or later. The authorities will be asked to come and look at the situation to see if it will be possible to paint yellow lines on the road.

Overhead Cables

A letter is being sent to the Officer of South West Electricity who deals with undergrounding cables, to support those members of the public who are requesting that overhead cables in the old village be buried underground.

Commemorative Mugs

The idea of presenting local children with mugs to commemorate the Queen's golden wedding was not taken up as it was felt that we have too much of a 'floating' population now.

Seats

After the seats were examined, a schedule for urgent work has been drawn up and tenders are to be sought immediately. It was also decided that the seat at Trelights chapel needs to be re-sited and the whole numbering system needs to be revised and improved.

Grass Cutting

The grass in Port Isaac has, unusually, been cut already so there is no immediate need to ask a local contractor to do any work. Unfortunately it will not be known when it will be cut again and the Clerk was authorised to arrange for this to be done as and when needed as it was not necessary to tender for the relatively small amount involved.

Private Property

The Council occasionally receive letters from locals and/or visitors referring to problems involving private property where no official action is possible and the owners have the sole responsibility (except where there is a definite, serious environmental problem of course).

This month, e.g., a complaint came from a visitor that signs outside the presently disused Tre-Pol-Pen hotel create an air of dereliction but this is no business of the Council's.

The owners of Castle Rock View, on the coastal path, will, however, be asked if they can lock their gate which leads on to the land above the cliffs and people might stray on to it.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting will be at Trelights Chapel Room at 7.30pm. on Monday 9th. June.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Chairman of the Parish Council, Henry Symons, said it was wonderful to see so many people at the Annual Public Meeting.

Village Hall: The Council had taken responsibility for the Village Hall while it had not been possible to form a committee but the new committee is now doing very well. The hall belongs to the village and the village must care for the hall - it is not likely to get anything else.

Coastal Path: The Council has inherited a problem with the wall. It was built by the County Council under a community scheme, but sub standard cement was used so erosion and vandalism have taken their toll and it has become dangerously low at places. It is meant to separate the path from the cliff-edge and avoid a repetition of the tragedy of the child that ran over the cliff. The Parish Council has the responsibility for maintenance, and repairs this year have cost £1,000 while another £1,000 will need to be spent next year. Anyone seen removing stones from the wall must be reported. The path should be kept clear of weeds but it is still not established who owns the land and the Council might consider adoption if legal processes to establish ownership are unsuccessful.

Traffic Calming: A 'gateway' has been formed at the entrance to the village on the B3267. It is not at the ideal position but the County Council

is dealing with legislation necessary to place the speed limit signs before the bend.

Trelights Meetings: It may be decided to reduce to two again the number of Parish Council meetings at Trelights as, usually, nobody from the village attends.

Parish Survey: Thanks were due to Malcolm Lee for his work to produce and distribute the survey forms. These will give an insight into what the electorate do or do not want.

Neighbourhood Watch: There is much vandalism, drug dealing, and burglary in the parish and support must be given to the Neighbourhood Watch volunteers who, while they cannot be expected to patrol the streets, are keeping a watchful eye on their locality. It is not their fault that both the toilets were vandalised last year.

The New Playing Field: This subject seems to be the subject of much dispute and the Parish Council has been criticised for not consulting properly with the village before making any decision. Henry Symons pointed out that the Council discusses nothing in private and that the public are at liberty to attend all meetings and may even comment on items to be discussed. He read out the minute concerning a referendum. A lively discussion ensued fired by members of the public.

The field will have to be levelled but the ground slopes very steeply and levelling will produce a very steep bank at the far side unless part of the ground is excavated - requiring much careful planning. But no scheme which might require grant aid can be started until the application is finalised so inevitably it all takes a long time. The Council felt justified, meanwhile, in buying the land while there was a chance because all the surrounding land may be developed in the next fifty years. The field must now be made available for the Parish - football players, cricketers, runners, etc, and an independent committee needs to be formed which could attract grants not available to the Parish Council.

New Village Hall: A public meeting was held (very poorly attended) to investigate the possibility of a new village hall. Two separate feasibility studies were produced which showed that the on-going costs of running a new hall would be very great. The Parish Council will consider any other proposal put forward - provided that full costings are provided.

New Road: Cars parking on the corner near the top of Back Hill are causing a danger and should be reported to the police on each occasion.

Keeping Port Isaac Tidy: The grass has been cut at Mayfield but many road side hedges are being neglected by the owners of the adjoining land. It is a tourist area and Port Isaac is a pretty little village so something must be done.

Overhead Cables: A plea was made for the public, and the Parish Council, pressure South West Electricity to bury the overhead cables which have disfigured the village for sixty years. Trio offered to pass on any letters to the appropriate officer at the electricity board.

RETURN AFTER 34 YEARS

During the bitter March of 1963, honeymoon couple Helen and Ray Fletcher stayed in the village after their marriage at Ealing register office, Middlesex. 'We wanted to stay somewhere as remote and beautiful as possible, far from Greater London motorway traffic and the flight path to Heathrow airport - Port Isaac was the perfect choice - we definitely didn't want to return home', recalled Mrs. Fletcher.

Daughter Karen, now 30, was determined to arrange a re-visit to the beauty spot which had so many happy memories for her parents at the beginning of their life together, so the family have recently been enjoying a few days holiday on the North Coast of Cornwall.

'We visit Cornwall every year', says Karen enthusiastically, 'it is my wish to live here one day and make it my permanent home. Cornwall has always been an escape from suburban life - I gain inspiration from the beautiful lonely land and seascapes and the wonderful light here. We often stay in Mousehole, a favourite spot of ours, and previously we have been based in sunny St. Ives. Last year we toured the Helford river and the beautiful Lizard peninsula - the county has so much to offer, it's impossible to see everything in a single visit!'

'This is my first visit to Port Isaac', added Karen, 'and my parents tell me that it has hardly altered since they were last here all those years ago - the fishing village is still as unspoilt as ever. We are already planning a return visit here next year in order to explore further parts of the cliff path - it keeps Mum and Dad active! Seriously, though, there is so much natural beauty here and everyone should be keen to preserve that - it's a very special place.'

Karen intends to arrange a presentation to her parents of either a bouquet, or a painting of the village, on Sunday 1st. June. She is sending a copy of this piece to the Cornish Guardian and to her local paper at Feltham in Middlesex.

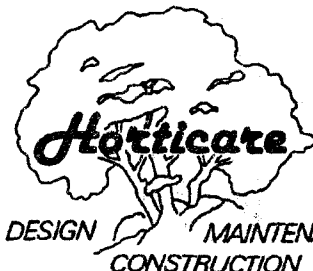

On the Sunday after Ascension Day, the Rector was preacher at a sung eucharist in the Chapel of the University of Exeter. *Judith Pollinger.*

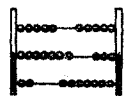
