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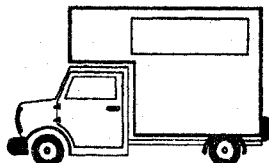
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PARISH COUNCIL

This month, the meeting was held at Trelights but, once again, no one from the village attended - the members of the public present were all from Port Isaac.

Election of Officers

Bill Dawe was elected as Parish Council representative on the Village Hall Committee.

Public Discussion

Peggy Richards questioned the viability of a speed limit through Trelights as motorists would only ignore it. She thought putting the electricity wires underground a good idea but wondered about the telephone wires which were, apparently, to put even higher than at present. Regarding the new playing field being levelled, she asked about the storm drain running beneath the surface, and the need for fences at the top of the resulting slopes. She was in favour of a running track for joggers. It could be used by the school, and would also be somewhere for the 'old souls' to go for a walk, the roads are far too dangerous.

Robin Panna explained that, because there are walls either side of the narrow alley, people were forced to paddle through a pool in Temple Bar every time it rained.

Planning Applications

The Parish Council recommended the following applications for approval by the District Planning Committee: Extensions and alterations to 'Pennti-ros', Lower Trefreock. Re-roofing 'The Lodge', Trelights. A Conservatory at 'Westaway', Trelights. Resiting a proposed House with Artist's Studio nearer to the cliff path at 24 New Road. Dormer windows replacing Velux windows at 16 Trethewa Lane. Garage at 'Maylands', Port Gaverne.

Finance

£7,871.51 was left in the high interest account after £1,200 was transferred to the treasurer's account to cover monthly expenses and leave a balance of £121.68.

Donation to Trio

The newsletter is a commercial enterprise and ought to charge 20p per copy, and it would be preferable to spend the £100 of public money on the cricket club and the gig. No donation.

Temple Bar

There is a problem with rain water collecting, apparently due to a new surface put down after the water mains were relaid. This is to be referred to the Highways Department.

Footpaths

The annual inspection of footpath clearing work will take place and some councillors were each allocated paths to check.

Traffic Calming, St. Endellion

County Highways are to be asked for advice on some means of slowing traffic between 'England's Piece' and the Trevathan Farm Strawberry Fields. (Henry Symons left the room during the discussion as he had an interest at the Strawberry Fields.) Some motorists drive

very fast along this narrow stretch of road making it dangerous for vehicles emerging from side turnings or leaving the church lay-by.

District Councillor's Report

Bill Dawe thanked the Council for £500 towards the village hall. He was also making efforts to get the grass on the roadside verges cut especially at Port Isaac turn.

Chairman's Report

Henry Symons gave a careful and detailed summary of the pitfalls in rushing ahead with plans for the new playing field without taking account of the problems that might arise. If the pitches were sited as recommended in the present contractors' 'plan', cricket balls could smash windows in Hillsons Close, and the adult football pitch would increase the present problem of balls landing in the garden of 'Garrick'. High fences would not be possible because of the high-voltage overhead electricity wires. A committee should be set up, outside the Parish Council, decide exactly what is wanted, how to achieve it, and what it would cost, then submit the plan to the Parish Council which would need to know what was proposed. Meanwhile grants should be applied for. If the grants are sought outside the Council, the purchase of the field would count as the Parish Council's contribution.

David Phelps said that while he agreed with every word of the Chairman's speech, it had all been said before by the playing field committee.

Bryan Richards said he was aggrieved that the chairman had used his position to stop him putting his point of view.

At this point Henry Symons tendered his resignation as Chairman and as Parish Councillor, asking Vice-Chairman David Phelps to take over as he left the meeting.

After he had left, with David Phelps in the chair, the meeting decided to ask him to review his statement before the next meeting.

Playing Fields

It is thought that there might be a need to up-date some of the equipment to cater for present-day safety needs - wood chippings under the play equipment and possibly re-siting slides not to get hot in the sun.

Clerk's Correspondence

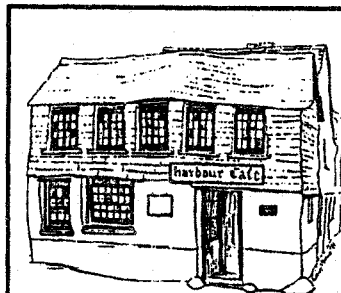
The advice from the District Council regarding declaring interests was to consult the Cornwall Association of Town and Country Parishes who were more involved with the subject.

A copy of a letter to Compass Services was read out which complained about the present inefficient and insanitary method of collecting the waste from the bins on the Platt. The item will be discussed next month.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 14th. July at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.



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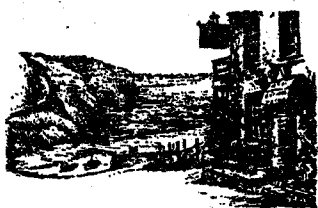
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CRICKET

The Search for the Holy Grail

The advent of the new season has apparently been long anticipated by our subscribers and we entered our lofty new challenge - the Tintagel and District Evening League (hitherto known in this column as the King Arthur Cup) - if not with an injection of youth, then certainly with a sufficiency of experience and maturity, such is our reputation in the area that we've been able to recruit three new cricketers (and I use the term loosely) to strengthen an already formidable squad. THE COLD SHOULDER?

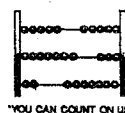

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LIFEBOAT

Since my last report of our 'rescue' of a 'Winnie-the-Pooh' balloon in April, (sorry - no report in May's Trio!) we have made it into the national press with the same story (see Daily Telegraph, Saturday 24th. May).

Since then we have carried out services:

Sunday 20th. April: Two divers in difficulty at Lobber Point. Landed 2. Fisherman cut off at Port Gaverne. Landed 1.

Thursday 8th. May: Man reported cut off north of Tintagel Head. Picked up by helicopter.

Sunday 11th. May: Whilst out on exercise, our boat was diverted to Polzeath where Rock's lifeboat had broken down. Towed to Rock, 4 crew landed.

Monday 12th. May: Called to assist local Coastguards at Port Gaverne - dog cut off on rocks. Landed 1 dog.

Thursday 22nd. May: Assisted local Coastguards and Royal Navy Bomb Disposal Team - explosive object found by our crew at Tregardock Beach.

All of the above services were completed by our old (grey) lifeboat No. D366. We were all pleased when our new (orange) lifeboat No. D517 arrived at the Station on Thursday 29th. May. The changeover was effected very efficiently and quickly by an excellent team of volunteers led by Bob Monk. My thanks to all who helped.

The new boat was quickly brought up to scratch with numerous exercise launches, and had her first service on Thursday 5th. June - 2 divers in difficulty at Port Gaverne. Landed 2.

Crewmembers who have taken part in these services are as follows:

Andy Walton (5), Chris Scott (4), Steve Taylor (3), John Brown, Mike Edkins, and Mark Provis (2 each), Nikki Bradbury (her first), Kevin Dingle, John Collins, Richard Hambly, Rob Parkyn, and Paul Pollington (all 1 each).

Our new Boat House Keeper (Asst.) is Daniel Brewer.

In addition to all this Station activity, we also had our Branch A.G.M. on Friday 16th. May when David Castle was present with Kathleen. It was good to welcome them back.

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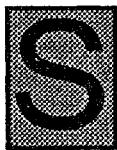
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BOOK REVIEW

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Farming in Cornwall at the end of the 18th. century, viewed through the life and times of George Wilce of St. Kew.

Authors Pat Hanson (descended from George Wilce) and John Hanson (who also provided many splendid maps and drawings taken from contemporary sources).

Published by Landfall Publications, Truro, Cornwall. (01872) 862581. Price £3.99

This enthralling book started as a family history which developed into a study of the church, the parish, and everyday life and farming in North Cornwall two centuries ago. Wilce came originally from Crewkerne in Somerset but farmed for thirty years in St. Kew. The district produced both wheat and barley, and the grain surplus was regularly sold outside the area - the region was thought of as the granary of Cornwall, and some of the corn was shipped out through Port Isaac. This sea route was more economic but also more dangerous. As the old saying went, 'From Padstow to Hartland Light, Is a watery grave by day and night.'

The Hansons describe in great detail the agriculture, families, social life, religion, and law enforcement of the time. It is all genuine local history, no references are made to American and French Revolutions, or wars in Europe, but anecdotes abound, as do accounts of widely-held superstitions. 'The colour yellow was to be avoided because it caused rheumatic fever: a waistcoat made from the skin of a cat killed on 12th. July was proof against lumbago: never pick the blue scabious lest the devil come to your bedside... In neighbouring Egloshayle... one avoided the white rabbit by moonlight'. And much, much more - wrestling, hurling, the 'gentry' (mainly Molesworths at Pencarrow), markets, farmsteads and cottages, furniture, food, crime, and the parish constable (elected and unpaid) trying to enforce the King's Peace. St. Kew Parish should be very grateful to the Hansons for producing this excellent case-study of its own past, stuffed with goodies and elegantly illustrated. Even we distant St. Endellion Parish readers should get great pleasure from it too.

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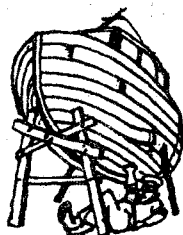
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
