THE FIRE

In the evening of Saturday 28th. June, the launderette behind The Blackthorn Press was completely destroyed by a fire, caused apparently by a gas fault in one of the clothes dryers. The fire spread into the roof of our premises, with almost total loss of the items stored there, while water and smoke permeated the shop below. This created havoc with an attendant 100% disruption of the business. The entire contents of the shop were put into large cardboard boxes and transferred to a nearby empty cottage, which the owners very kindly let me use, while a professional company spent two days decontaminating the premises from the effects of the toxic smoke, and the electrics were re-wired. All the computer equipment has been removed for inspection - this month's Trio is being produced on hired equipment so please excuse any errors or omissions. For two weeks, telephone calls had to be diverted and what business there was had to be conducted by 'remote control'. The boxes were finally lugged back with the aid of helpful local people and I am back in the shop now and trying to sort things out. Unfortunately my large printing machine has been taken away to Bristol to be professionally assessed and I am without it for the present and I shall not be able to continue my business unless it can be returned or replaced. Meanwhile Wakefields Printers of Camelford, have very kindly offered to print this edition for us at a special rate.

Resignation of Henry Symons

The following statement was read out at the July Parish Council meeting:-

'Mr. Symons stated twice at the June meeting that if the arguing with the Chairman did not stop, he would have no option but to resign. Despite these two warnings, arguments with the chairman continued. Either there was a deliberate attempt by some councillors to ensure Mr. Symons resigned (the disgraceful comment by one councillor as Mr. Symons left of 'That's got rid of one of them', lends support to this view), or councillors just were not listening to what was being said to them.

At the May meeting, Mr. Symons ruled that he would not permit further discussion on Mr. Richard's proposal until advice had been received from the Chief Executive of North Cornwall District Council as to whether Mr. Richards had to declare an interest and take no part in the discussion. It is the Chairman's statutory duty to ensure that interests are properly declared, yet when Mr. Symons made this ruling, the Vice-Chairman said that he thought the Chairman was totally wrong, and should have let Mr. Richards speak. Either the Vice-Chairman was unaware of the Chairman's Statutory duty regarding interests, or the Vice-Chairman thought the law of this land could be ignored when it is inconvenient. The Vice-chairman should have been supporting the Chairman in carrying out his statutory duty, rather than arguing with him.

Mr. Symons was a most hardworking Chairman on this council, and he has been forced to resign because councillors were not prepared to listen to what he had to say about the playing field. Those same councillors think it acceptable to shout down or ignore someone who is putting forward facts they do not wish to hear, rather than debate the serious issues that must be resolved. A parish council cannot achieve anything unless every councillor is prepared to listen to all points of view, and debate the issues in a calm and rational way.

Mr. Symons will be very difficult to replace as Chairman. A Chairman must, like Mr. Symons, be prepared to consider differing opinions, and be prepared to carry out the chairman's statutory duty, even when that duty may be unpalatable. Anyone not so prepared would be unfit to be chairman of this Parish Council.'

ST. ENDELLION CHURCH

Death of Well-Loved Priest

Well-loved priest, the Revd. Canon Noel Godwin, Pendoggett House, Pendoggett, who ministered in retirement in parishes within the United Benefice of St. Endellion, Port Isaac and St. Kew, elsewhere in the Bodmin and Trigg Minor Deanery and at Bude and Marhamchurch, died on Tuesday 20th. May. Vespers were said by the Revd. Alan Wainwright, after his body was received into the church on Monday evening and a Requiem Mass, attended by many clergy and lay people, was held the following day.

Magazine Prize

'Signpost', our church magazine, has been awarded third prize in the Truro Diocese in a national church magazine competition. There were 50 entries in the Truro Diocese, and Joint Editors, mother and son, the Revd. Judith Pollinger and Mr. Jonathan Pollinger, were presented with a certificate and cheque at the Diocesan Synod meeting in Bodmin Community College. The presentation was made by the Rt. Revd. Graham James, Bishop of St. Germans.

Holy Land Speaker

Mrs. Ann Palmer gave a most interesting talk on the Holy Land, accompanied by slides at the May meeting of the United Benefice branch of the Mothers' Union. The meeting was held in St. Kew Parish Hall with Mrs. Julia Mitchell in the chair.

Mothers' Union Festival

Branch Leader Mrs. Pam Richards and other members of the United Benefice branch of the Mothers' Union joined with members throughout the diocese in the annual Festival Service held in Truro Cathedral. They were welcomed by the Dean, the very Reverend David Shearlock and by Mrs. Mary Carveth, Diocesan Mothers' Union President. The Revd. Preb. Michael Bartlett, Deanery and Diocesan Chaplain and Rector of the United Benefice took part in the service. The United Benefice banner was carried by Mrs. Mollie Girvan assisted by Mrs. Margaret Cann.

Healing Eucharist

A very well attended United Benefice eucharist for healing was held in the church. The Rector presided and the service was led by the Curate. They shared in the laying on of hands for healing with Mrs. Pat Hardman. The gospel was read by Mrs. Margaret Cann, churchwarden, Port Isaac.

Mothers' Union Outing

A most enjoyable outing to St. Mawgan in Pydar was well-attended by members of the United Benefice branch of the Mothers' Union. The group was welcomed at the lych gate of the church by the Revd. John Slee, Rector and given a guided tour of Lanherne Convent Chapel and an explanation of the convent's history by Mrs. Glanville. Prayers in church were led by the Rector.

Cream Teas

Although rain forced a change of venue from the Rectory lawn, St. Endellion to the Church Hall, over £104 was raised from a cream tea afternoon.

Sudden Death

Mrs. Mary Ide Warlow-Harry, a regular member of the congregation and a former member of the parochial church council, died suddenly on 21st. May. The church was full for the funeral service conducted by the Rector. He was vested in the St. Endelienta cope given to the church by Mrs. Warlow-Harry and preceded by the St. Endelienta banner she had made.

Lent Boxes

£142.30 was raised for the work of the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel from the Lent boxes used by members of the congregation during Lent.

Pilgrimage

Mr. Marcus Bartlett, The Rectory, St. Endellion, set out from Cornwall to Londonderry on Monday 26th. May. With many others he took part in a pilgrimage organised to celebrate the arrival in Canterbury 1400 years ago, of St. Augustine. Mr. Bartlett was also interviewed on Radio 4 with the Rt. Revd. Graham James, Bishop of St. Germans.

Jumble Sale

A very successful jumble sale in the church Hall on Tuesday raised £102 for Church funds.

Deanery Service

Many people from churches within the united benefice of St. Endellion, Port Isaac and St. Kew attended a Deanery Service of Praise held at Lanivet Parish Church. The Revd. Stephen Drakeley, officiated and an address was given by Mrs. Sue Bottley, Director of the Good News Trust. The blessing was pronounced in Cornish by the Revd. Brian Coombes and in English by the Revd. Stephen Drakeley.

Requiem Mass for Prebendary

A Requiem Mass for the late Reverend Prebendary Edwin Stark, a Prebendary Emeritus of St. Endellion, took place in the church. Prebendary Stark, who died on 9th. June had been in failing health for some time. He was made a Prebendary of St. Endellion in 1981 and was Rector of Blisland with St. Breward from 1984 to 1988. The Revd. Alan Wainwright led the saying of Vespers after Prebendary Stark's body was received into church on Thursday evening and was celebrant at the Requiem Mass. The Rector prayed intercessions and gave the Commendation.

Evening Worship with Taizé Music

In the beauty and tranquillity of our church, evening worship with music from Taizé was held on Sunday 15th. June. The service was led by the Curate who welcomed everyone and gave a brief introduction. Singing was accompanied by Julia Buckley, violin, and lessons were read by Mrs. Ceinwen Greenwood and the Rector, who also was cantor for the psalm.

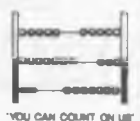

PARISH COUNCIL

Four councillors were in attendance at the meeting on Monday 14th. July, joined by one more later.

Resignations

Letters of resignation were read out from Henry Symons and David Philp. The Council will now declare the vacancies and, unless ten or more electors call for an election, the places will be filled by co-option.

Election of Chairman

It was decided to defer the election of a new Chairman until a full meeting was held. It was agreed that David Phelps should chair the present meeting.

David Phelps spoke of the hard work put in by Henry Symons and of their co-operation on many undertakings.

Malcolm Lee spoke about the situation and his words are printed below.

Public Discussion

Eric Stokes said he was disgusted with the spirited services of the Council and their underlying interests which had lost us the best Chairman we had ever had, and about the poor attendance as, for example, this meeting. He scolded the refusal to pay 'a few quid' to Trio - while most of the crew of the gig [which had been nominated as a more deserving case] come from St. Teath.

Henry Symons thanked everybody for their kind words and said he was sure that he hadn't been the best Chairman. He had been delighted to serve the Parish. However advice from official sources that a separate committee outside the Parish Council be set up to discuss the Playing Field had been continuously ignored. The purchase of the field was the Council contribution and further action by the Council would increase the burden on the ratepayer. It is ironic that those who shouted loudest while ignoring the advice have actually held up the process.

Robin Penna spoke, on behalf of himself and the many walkers who use our footpaths, to thank the Parish Council and its contractors for the clearance work being done.

Planning Applications

No objections were to be made to the District Council Planning Committee concerning amendments to plans for: 1. work at Trefreock Farm for Mr. and Mrs. Maberly; 2. work at disused workshop at Trelights for Mr. T. St. John O'Grady; and 3. an additional window in Trefreock Barn for Mrs. Reece. The erection of a conservatory at 'Cleardaze', New Road, for Mr. Daly received no observations. A new application for a dwelling at New Road for Mrs. Hicks was again recommended for approval. A bungalow with integral garage off St. Endellion Lane for Timberbuild Ltd. was also recommended for approval.

Finance

The Treasurer's recommendation was accepted that £900 be transferred from the high interest account to the current account to make sufficient funds available to meet this month's expenses. The final balances were: high interest account £6971.51, current account.

It was decided that the donation towards the upkeep of St. Endellion Churchyard should be increased in line with inflation to £510.

Playgroup Fun Day

Permission was granted for the use of the Playing Field for the Annual Fun Day on Sunday 27th. July.

Collection of Rubbish from the Platt

Having received the copy of a letter to Compass Services at last month's meeting the item was put on this month's agenda. The Council learned, however, that the situation had improved and Mr. Penna confirmed that a smaller vehicle was now being used which could drive down to the Platt. [This obviated the need for the wheelie bins to be trundled up and down Fore Street to a larger vehicle parked in the wider part of Fore Street.]

The Quay, Port Gaverne

This is crumbling badly and slate is falling on to the beach; the footpath is reduced to four feet wide at one place. The County Surveyor is to be asked what can be done and how much it would cost.

40mph. Speed Restriction at Trewetha

Mr. Hambly, who apologised for having missed the two previous meetings when this matter should have been discussed, proposed that a 40mph. restriction should start at the entrance to Trewetha and continue until the 30mph. restriction at Port Isaac. He agreed to an amendment that it could be 30mph. all the way. The request will be passed on but it was thought that the village must be preserved from becoming urbanised by signs, lights, kerbs, etc.

Seats

Several new seats carrying memorial plaques will be available from donors and these will be sited as requested. Such seats must be welcomed because some of the existing seats are getting near the end of their life.

Correspondence

The removal of hedgerows will now need planning consent.

The gulleys have been cleared in Temple Bar which should solve the flooding problem.

North Cornwall District Council have supplied details of the car park economics for the benefit of a member of the public who has suggested a public car park at the Playing Field.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting will be on Monday 11th. August at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Dear Trio, I had the misfortune to attend the last Parish Council meeting on Monday 14th. July. What a pathetic show it was! Four members turned up only; they were outnumbered by the public. If councillors cannot attend, for any reason, they should resign. That includes the District Councillor who, while pleading District Council meetings as an excuse, cannot serve two masters. Over half a dozen planning applications were dealt with in as many minutes, without one word of reasoned debate, and another acre of our precious parish vanished under concrete. These people are entrusted with the spending of some £10,000 of our money and they cannot agree among themselves. They should devote more time to working for the Parish than against each other. Two members have resigned (one of them a very good and competent chairman). With a few hard working exceptions they are an insult to local government and I call upon this miserable crew to resign and let us have a complete re-election.
