Stanley John (Jack) and William Roslyn Honey were brothers who joined up at the outbreak of war. Jack was in the Royal Engineers, a highly regarded corps of the British Army. He was a Sapper, which is a soldier who carries out engineering works such as bridge building, laying or clearing minefields, defences, and other construction works.

It is not known how Jack died, but as it was in June 1940, only a week after the Dunkirk evacuation, perhaps he was wounded in the evacuations. He is buried in St Endellion Churchyard. Although Roslyn did not die until just after the war, he received a severe war wound in the head which led to his early death at only 34. His wife Frances and son John emigrated to Australia shortly after his death.

Loving husband of Frances and father of John. "Until the Day Dawns"
