


Editorial




Letters

Chicken & Ham Pie

Enough for 6 - 8 persons.

41b. chicken, 1 pint white stock, $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. bacon or ham, 1 large onion, mushroom ketchup, 2 tblsp. flour, 2 tblsp. butter, $\frac{1}{4}$ pint milk.

Boil chicken in stock until just tender and cool. Fry chopped bacon or ham and

sauté chopped onion until golden and sprinkle all these over the chicken, cut into large pieces and put in a pie dish. Make a plain white sauce with butter, flour, and milk, add 1 tblsp. ketchup and pour over chicken etc. Mix gently and let cool. Cover with pastry of your choice, make slits, brush with milk, and bake in a hot oven, 400 F till golden.

Annual Public Meeting & Monthly Meeting - Parish Council

The Meeting in the Church Hall, Port Isaac, on Nay 5th. was well attended in spite of the very wet evening.

Cllr. Cunningham, Parish Council Chairman, presided, and guest speakers were: Cllr. Greenaway, Chairman, N.C.D.C.; County Cllr. Harvey Lander; and District Cllr. Bill Dawe.

Annual receipts: £2471.78 Annual expenses: £1963.79 Balance: £ 507.99

Mr. Cunningham thanked the volunteer hospital drivers; mentioned that the sewage works can be visited by arrangement with the Clerk; the problem of dogs running loose; refuse collection difficulties; and the need for sensible parking. £50,000 must be raised for our E.Cornwall Hospital in the next 2 years. Royal Wedding mugs had been given to every child in the Parish.

Cllr. Greenaway spoke about the sale of council houses, and how the rate increase had been kept to only 11% due to 'good housekeeping'.

Cllr. Lander gave a detailed report of County Council finances; expressed anxiety at possible formation of a 'regional' Council; and was not satisfied with answers from C.E.G.B. on nuclear waste disposal at Luxulyan.

Cllr. Dawe said there were too many single persons in 3-bed council houses; toilets needed at Port Gaverne; and police must act to keep streets clear in case of a big fire disaster. In answer to questions it was learned that purchasers of council houses can re-sell in 5 years making a good profit. A small van might visit the Platt on Saturdays to remove rubbish. Yellow lines asked for further up Church Hill. Protest at "virulent' yellow of lines in an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty'.

At the Monthly Meeting of the Council, Monday 10th. May, all officers were re-elected unopposed: Cllr. Cunningham, Chairman; Cllr. Cann, Vice-Chairman; Cllr. Townsend, representative to P.I.School Governors; Cllr. Dr. Barron, Treasurer; and Cllr. Bolton, Publicity. A precept of £500 was raised to cover envisaged costs. Date of the Annual Audit was to be May 17th., 10.45am.

Steps, Port Gaverne.

A tender for £220 received, but contractor not thought specialised enough for this kind of work.

Footpath Trimming.

Details of split tender between contractor and millowner to be decided on site.

Light. Church Hill.

Thought to be a matter for Highways Dept. as this is a classified road.

Cliff Path Wall.

As County Council had not realised wall was to be on seaward side of path, whole process would have to start all over again.

Playing Fields, Power Lines.

A site meeting to discuss diverting the overhead lines, to be held.

E. Cornwall Hospital Appeal.

Designs for poster shown but felt that somebody could be asked to do them free as the Council should not spend ratepayers' money on this.
