Editorial

Recently a TV film unit came to Port Isaac for scenes in 'My Cousin Rachel' by Daphne du Maurier. They seemed to put back the hands of time by dressing the village women in poke bonnets and long skirts, and the men in breeches, boots, and frock coats.

In reality this village was a very different one at the turn of the century from the one we know today. Poorer in Lome ways, richer in others, more isolated, but more selfsufficient. Slipway was a chandlers; Port Isaac Stores was a milliners; there was a sailmaker; a cobbler; butcher, baker, and maybe even a candlestick maker.

Then came the internal combustion engine and accessibility to the outside world. Village businesses began to close their doors because they could no longer compete. For a time, while petrol was cheap, it didn't seem to matter. Now we've come almost full circle. Rising prices and diminishing public transport are once again isolating us while we no longer have the resources, the facilities, or the skills we once possessed.

So much has it become a matter for concern that a Campaign 'Support Your Village Shop' has been launched by the Ministry for the Environment. Yet at this time some people avail themselves of free rides into Bodmin and back. Do they ever pause to think that in the long term those free trips might prove very expensive indeed? Not just to them, but to all who live here. How long will it be before the lack of custom decrees the end of village shops? How long can our local bus service survive the drastic reduction in passenger revenue?

When there are no village shops - and no local bus to take us to buy all our daily needs - what then? How many of us are willing, or able, to go back to the way people lived in isolated places for centuries, buying only occasionally and in bulk, and being better managers than most of us are now?

Every time we buy elsewhere goods readily available here, we hammer another nail into the coffin of what was once a living village. Do we really save so much that we think we can afford to risk so much?

We are sad to hear of the death, apparently from rat poison, of the Fletchers' dog 'Judy'. Warning - don't let your pet roam loose.


Apology

Parish Council

The Monthly Meeting held in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac on Monday 11th. October was attended by only five Parish ouncillors though a number of the public were present.

The chair was taken by the Vice-Chairman Mr. Cann as Mr. Cunningham was on leave.

Before the meeting started. Mr. Bolton reported that he had had a phone call complaining of no Notice of Meeting at Trelights. Mrs. Powell, the clerk, explained that the key was with Mr. Julian and she had not been able to get it to unlock the board.

ppy Day Wreath

It was decided to subscribe £10 for a wreath to be put on the war memorial on Remembrance Day.

Cllr. Dawe remarked that it was sad that a donation was not made for the Bell Tower -t St. Endellion and asked or this to go on the agenda of the next meeting.

Refuse on Platt

No further news was available on this topic. It was also noted that the road-sweeper had finished for the year and that no reply had been "reived to the Council's ... cter suggesting that he might be employed for a longer period. (See last month's 'Trio')

Overcliff Path Wall

Work is to start on this project next week and a 'Portakabin' will be put at the entrance to the path for the use of the labourers and masons. The work is expected to take 48 weeks to do.

Vandalism

al posts in the playing 11eld have been deliberately broken off at ground level, and two of the swings have been put out of action. The police are involved in finding the person responsible.

Meanwhile the broken upright is considered dangerous and will be repaired as quickly as possible.


Village Hall


