Editorial

It is earnestly hoped that by the time you read this editorial the strike by water workers will have become a thing of the past. At the time of writing, however, it is very much 'on' so we thought that we would print this editorial in place of the one planned for this month as it has a topical theme.

W re so used to turning on taps and getting an endless supply of clear, fresh water that it is hard to remember that only about fifty years ago all the water had to be fetched in large cans from the nearest pump, well, or spring. Rain water was collected in butts or the slate tanks that you can still see here and there, and used for washing but not drinking. Even after mains water was introduced some houses still had two taps-'mains' and 'tank' water. The water from the mains used, as indeed sometimes still does, to stain things brown and so the pumps stayed in use until about thirty years ago. One of the mysteries was that in dry weather a pump would seem to run dry then be 'revived' with just one bucket of water poured in at the top. What actually happened was that the leather washer would get dry and not create the necessary suction and the water moistened it so that it worked again.

Nowadays we use very much more water than we did then and many people shower once or twice every day and we use as matic washing machines, dish washers, lawn sprinklers, and so on, without a thought. Large reservoirs have had to be built, Pumping stations, purification plants, and a comprehensive network of mains are being constructed to replace the old local water board systems inherited by the South West Water Authority. All this has, of course, been reflected in water rates which have reached a level that some find unacceptable but which represent the cost of what about fifty years ago would have seemed like a luxury.


