It will cost nothing to put these things right - no extra rates, no extra taxes, just a little more care and a little more thought.

The Village Hall

Last Monday's Committee Meeting in the Hall:

Details of the Financial Report will be given at the Public Meeting and A.G.M. at the Hall on April 13th.

All but one of the sets of Band of Hope China have been claimed, but there are some plates and saucers left, plus some cups with hairline cracks. These will be sold in sets at £5 or plates at £2 and saucers at £1.50.

The Hall is suffering a lot of wear and tear, eg. the kitchen is getting badly damaged. The problem is to find someone who can do the repairs for us.

The Parish Council have assured us that work on the path at the front of the Hall will be done by the Community Enterprise Group as soon as possible.

Mrs. Pack, District Youth

was present and said that as
things stand, work to redecorate the Hall could start
in May or June and should
take eight weeks or more to
complete. Meanwhile the Hall
has to find a <u>safe</u> tower
scaffold, ladders, brushes,
etc., and any offers will be
welcomed. A machine to sand
the floor will have to be
hired for 2 - 3 days.

New Regulations in an Act of Parliament (1982) concerning Entertainments Licences were discussed. These are very stringent and would almost certainly mean no more Discos if applied to our Hall. Help and guidance is to be sought from North Cornwall District Council, and Cornwall Rural Community Council at Truro.

The Committee is in favour of appointing a caretaker for the Hall if a suitable person can be found.

Parish Council

The Monthly Meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. February, was rell attended by members of the public. Also present were Police Chief Inspector Halliday and our Community Constable David LeBailly. Insp. Halliday addressed the meeting and outlined plans for the hoped-for 'Surgery' which could be held perhaps twice a week. 'People will be able to come and talk about problems, we shall be here to talk to everybody' he said, 'but of course in an emergency dial 999.

Resignation of Clerk. The Quncil had received Mrs. well's resignation and several applicants had answered the advertisements for the post. Interviews will be held before the next Monthly Meeting. The question of the Clerk's salary is also to be discussed in committee.

Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday 12th. April at the Church Hall beginning at 7.30pm. Various government officers and other persons in office are to be invited to attend.

After a meeting with County

hways and the Police, the
Parish Council is to accept
the recommendation that
parking restrictions on the
sea side of the Street from
the Platt as far as the
bottom of Back Hill are to
be enforced all the year.

Car Park. Rose Hill. A scheme for 20 25 cars was outlined by Cllr. Dawe. This caused much discussion and it was decided to arrange a site meeting with the Highways Dept. and to report the matter to a later meeting.

Repair of Pumps. The pumps at Back Hill and Middle Street, Port Isaac, are to be 'energised' and Trelights is to have a new one which will be supplied by funds provided by Mrs. Holden and friends 'In memory of Mrs. Hicks'. The water may not be fit for drinking and the pumps will be for emergency use only and will be made inoperable at other times.

Trees for Trelights. At the meeting in January a selection of Silver Birch, Red Maple, White Variegated Leaf Maple, Copper Beech, Floribunda Apple Blossom, and Whitebeam was made. The Parish Council agreed to the list and the cost of approx. £60 for supplying and planting. There was one vote against on grounds of the trees being too big for site.

Street Lights. Trewetha. The County Council would require at least 6 lights costing £3,000 but felt no need to instal them as there was no accident record for Trewetha.

Erosion of Wall Port Gaverne.

Footpath Clearance. Tenders to be requested as usual by the end of April.



EDITORIAL

Most of us agree that closing the old school was a sad day for the village, but a new trend - to send children out of Port Isaac for their primary education - could presage sadder days for our new school. If the numbers drop drastically, it could become a two-teacher school - a dreadful pity for it is scholastically as good as any in the area.

For the tots transported elsewhere this enforced separation from their local environment is destined to mean loneliness during the long holidays since they will inevitably make friends who live at a distance.

The reasons for the trend aren't clear. Some say 'lack of facilities for rising-fives, others 'lack of sports facilities', still others 'too much religion'.

Taking one point at a time: the law decrees that there has to be 1.8 square metres of space per child in the class room. There is currently only room for two rising-fives... the question is 'which two?'. There are attendant problems which demand more of the teachers' time and attention than is good for the other children in the classroom. For some time there has been an excellent Playgroup run by Mrs. Joy Irwin in close co-operation with the school, so the eeds of this age group are catered for within the village.

The school has a large grass play-area as well as a hard netball/rounders court. Weather permitting, both are well used. In the hall there is ample modern equipment for gymnastics and the pupils have as much P.E. time as in other schools. Having the playing-field across the main road is not entirely satisfactory - even if it is nearer than it used to be - but the children are always carefully supervised. There are inter-school sports events with St. Teath, etc. Nevertheless, the object of education is academic rather than athletic, and no child in Port Isaac is more than minutes away from open spaces and a beach.

In this country's schools. religious instruction is the only subject compulsory by law up to the age of 16yrs. There must be a religious assembly every day. In common with all state schools. rurs follows the directions of the 1944 Education Act as far as religious worship and instruction are concerned. This is of a purely undenominational character and children may be withdrawn from religious worship/instruction at a parent's request, or for denominational instruction, provided this does not interfere with their regular educational programme.

Our children are taught by example, to consider others; to be tolerant of differences; to respect their elders; to be kind and courteous; to be aware of and care for the environment they inhabit. They are, therefore, actively encouraged in the basic principles of civilised humanity & community living.

LIFE-BOAT



PARISH COUNCIL

The Monthly Meeting - a noisy and protracted one - held 13/6/83, 7.30pm. - 10.15pm., Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Mr. Symons suggested that the meetings could take place in less cramped conditions. Cllr. Dawe reported that the wall at Little Hill, Port Isaac, would be repaired.

A Precept from the rates of £500 was agreed.

Transport to St. Minver. A committee has been formed: Mrs. G. Franklin, Mr. J. A. Kershaw, and Mr. W. J. Spry, to try and organise. Proposed to write to County and District Councils giving Parish Council's support to scheme.

Coastal Path Wall. Loose coping stones to be re-fixed. Query whether wall should have gone further. Mr. Symons: Why no plan? it is ratepayers' money. [£900 so far, Ed.] Site meeting to be held.

Trelights Coronation Park. Will now be owned by Parish Council. Difficulties in handing over to Trelights' Committee - insurance, etc. Mr. Cowling invited to speak, 'What is difficulty? Committee but not enough traffic. will pay costs.' Leaflet on Trust Deeds handed over. Item to be on next Agenda.

Trelights - Endellion Lane. Mr. Symons: Was metalled, now cultivated and obstructed. County Highways Dept. to be asked to inspect the road.

Overhead Power Lines, Playing Field, Port Isaac. SWEB: two poles 8m. high or one pole 13m. high [?]. In hedge or on drive? Mrs. Barron to try and clarify situation.

Dogs Fouling Playing Field. Mr. Provis: Two cases of children getting dirty, also one bitten. 'No Dogs' sign to be more effectively worded. Council would like any dogs in field to be reported to them.

Cllr. Dawe referred to same problem at Car Park.

Path at Side of Co-op. Mrs. Cann proposed that the P.C. ask for it to be tidied up.

Steps Mayfield/Silvershell. Mr. Provis reported top step broken. A letter to be sent to N.C.D.C.

Seats on Port Isaac Platt. Being repaired by Mr. Julian, and will be replaced soon.

Zebra Crossing - P.I. School. Mr. Provis: Why no crossing? Mrs. Richards: We asked before Mr. Welton: Let's inspect previous correspondence at the next meeting.

Footpath Trimming. Councillors to inspect paths when cut: Mr. Bolton - P.G. Valley, Dr. Barron - P.I.Mill to Tresungers and to Trewetha, Mr. Symons - Trevathan Farm, Mr. Provis - Roscarrock Hill, Pinehaven Valley, and stiles to Port Quin, Mr. Norris -Coastguard Hill.




