



The Parish Council, the Police, and the Highways Department, are constantly having to extend the 'no waiting' areas in our narrow streets to try and avoid congestion. This in turn forces people to find other parking places and new problems arise. The car is going to be with us for many more years and a solution to the problem must be found. The visitor to the old part of Port Isaac inevitably uses his car to get down the steep hills, he also wants to have it handy when he gets there, and doesn't always want to retrace his steps to the car park at the top. Stand on the Platt in the summer when the beach is full or the tide is in and you will see many cars in front of the Harbour Cafe looking for somewhere to stop so they can get out, shop, or have something to eat. Usually in sheer frustration they simply drive away up Church Hill as fast as they can to get away from it all. Too many people are being forced out of the village this way. We can't afford to lose them. Provision must be made for the visitors on whom so many people depend.

Last July a contributor to Trio suggested a 'park and ride' scheme. This would be the simplest way to deal with the problem and the cheapest to initiate. The Parish Council could perhaps arrange the purchase of land, preferably adjacent to or near the Playing Fields to make the best use of it, and tender for a person or persons to operate a vehicle to take people down to the village, and possibly Port Gaverne as well. A car park in the valley behind Port Isaac would be an even better solution but much more costly. The Rose Hill problem might be overcome by a one-way system with a new road from an entrance by the telephone exchange maybe. In any case the money should have been spent years ago, and even now the expense of any scheme, spread over the years, would be more than worth it in the advantages such investment would bring.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

St. Peter's Hall was filled by an interested crowd of electors for the Meeting on 10th. April. Mr. Cunningham (Chairman of the Parish Council) mentioned good attendance by public at monthly meetings. Trio better than notice boards or shop windows for advertising. More volunteers wanted for Hospital Car Service. Footpath signs to arrive soon. Work on steps and wall at Port Gaverne. Nasty bit at end of cliff path wall to be dealt with.

Mr. Greenaway (Chairman of the District Council) spoke about House Improvement Schemes. District Rate still lowest in the County. Danger of Private Contractor Refuse Collection. Different opinions of Planning Committee to what is good. Cllr. Dawe told us the cost of re-surfacing the car park was £5,300. There are problems with Sea Protection Wall but possibility grant. Trelights roads will be resurfaced when drainage work completed.

Mr. Wherry (County Highways) Said most people like the blocks in Port Isaac which are easier

to repair and are long wearing. The rest of the work will start in May and will include Mayfield, plus small doses in little back streets. Plans are drawn up for fractional widening at Trewetha. Chief Insp. Hallett (Police) said crime in area down 5% compared with 1982. Mostly theft from cars by thieves from other parts of country. Apart from children stealing just before Christmas, very little crime in P.I. area. During the ensuing Public Discussion, Mrs. Brown of Trelights said she had a jolly good mind to squat in an empty council house at Trelights, go on the dole, and get all the benefits of some others! Answering a question, Mr. Wherry promised that work would be done in Margaret's Lane in next six months. The District Council will remove up to five large items of domestic refuse free of charge. Mr. Symons mentioned the lack of a right-of-appeal for the Parish Council when planning decisions go against their wishes. Mr. Provis disagreed with a suggestion to clean the beaches in winter 'waste of ratepayers' money - tide will bring it all back again'.

PARISH COUNCIL

Some of the items discussed at the monthly meeting at Port Isaac on 16th. April.

Election of Officers postponed until May meeting.

Annual Audit The Accounts may be inspected at 11 New Road, from 11th. July.

Parish War Memorial £25 for upkeep during 1984-85.

Yellow Lines Experimental Zone without lines has been successful and to be extended up Trewetha Lane 270 metres and into Hartland Road. 'No waiting restrictions still needed outside surgery.

Homer Park to receive Forestry Grant for planting pine, cypress, conifers, chestnuts, and japaese larch trees in their fields.

Village Hall balance sheet from Committee received.

Coastal Footpath Wall much concern about gap at end and Mr. Horwood (County Council) says it is dangerous and seeing what he can do about it.

Playing Field Notice Board existing board destroyed and a new one with new wording to be put in its place.

Golden Lion Roof of adjacent linney missing for some years and now an 'absolute eyesore'. Brewery want balcony but no plans so far. Fear that this will be out of keeping due to building regulation requirements. District Council to be asked what is happening or can it be put back as it was.

Planning

Mr. Lendon. Self-Catering Cottage, Trewetha (next to Archer Farm). Observations: No drainage, bad access, and Cornwall Structure Plan against this kind of development.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Strout suggested a 'Welcome to Port Isaac' sign. She also asked the Council to consider a grant towards the cost of producing the Trio Newsletter. Mr. Penna spoke about the need for a car park for visitors and residents of Port Isaac village.

The next meeting will be held in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 14th. May, at 7.30pm.
