

EDITORIAL

Although Trelights village is only $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Port Isaac via Church Hill $(3\frac{1}{2}$ miles via the B.3314), it might as well be in another region altogether as it is quite different in character. Whereas Port Isaac came into being for the fishing and other opportunities afforded by the relative safety of the harbour, Trelights has always been a mainly agricultural community. In her booklet 'Down Memory Lane and Farther' Mrs. Rita Cowling describes how a Manor was established on the road linking St. Endellion and Roscarrock, and how the first houses were built around it. Later came Smithy, Cobbler, Tailor, and even a Tavern called the 'Tiddly Wink' which is supposed to have been where 'Hillside' cottage is today. They say that 'by Tre, Pol, and Pen, ye shall know Cornishmen' but in Trelights it seems safe to say that the names 'Blake' 'Bunt' and 'Cowling' are the indication of local ancestry, indeed the interweaving of local families is one thing Trelights does have in common with Port Isaac. A member of the Blake family, Mr. Peter Blake, planted the fine row of sycamore trees behind the chapel (established after John Wesley's early visits). Mr. Blake feels that not enough trees are being planted nowadays and urges all landowners to take steps to remedy this deficiency. We were disappointed to find that we had not been notified that Mrs. 'Cissie' Rowland of Rowbrook bungalow had celebrated her 95th. birthday last March. Disabled by a shin bone operation as a small child, she is seemingly undeterred by her handicap, and, bright and merry as a button, spends much of her time painting pictures and plate designs. She still has a book awarded to her for 'careful work' in 1904! We look forward to reporting her birthday next year. Since Trelights has been connected to the main drainage system there has been an opportunity for development, and North Cornwall District Council has already built a small development called 'The Barton'. Such development is more or less in keeping with the general environment of Trelights but let us hope that it is not the beginning of building on a larger scale which could easily swamp the pleasant nature of the village. For the present we present with our compliments this little sketch map for you.



We conducted our own 'survey' of the village, noting down the name of each cottage and house. The green called 'Letter Box' is where the postman from Wadebridge used to come to collect any letters before there was a post office.

PARISH COUNCIL

Some of the business effected at the Annual Monthly Meeting at Port Isaac, Tuesday 15th. February.

As Mrs. Willmott was unable to attend the beginning of the meeting, Mrs. Barron was appointed acting clerk for the election of officers 1984 - 85:

Mr. Cunningham, Chair. unopp. Mrs. Barron, Vice Chair. 4 votes, against Mr. Norris, 2 votes.

Dr. Barron, Treasurer. unopp. Mrs. Cann, School Governors Representative. unopp.

Playing Field Committee – Mrs. Richards, Mrs. Cann, and Mr. Bolton. unopp.

Mr. Welton, Tourism. unopp.

Mr. Bolton, Emergency. unopp. Mr. Welton, V. Hall [elected 12.3.84].

Mr. Symons, Assoc. Town and Country P. Councils

Homer Park Forestry Grant. Conifers will give colour in winter and also only trees to survive according to Forestry Commission. [Voice from public 'will ruin our valley – rotten old pines!]

Tennis Court. Mrs. Cann spoke of possible need for planning if new gateway needed. She also explained that a grant had to be received from the Parish Council before other grants forthcoming. These could be as much as £7,500 towards the £9,000 cost of the court.

Grant for Trio Newsletter. Mr. Cunningham presented a statement of the costs of producing Trio, saying that he thought it an excellent thing, greatly welcome, and read by everybody. Mr. Bolton proposed an annual grant of L60, Mr. Norris seconded this and the motion was passed unopposed.

Footpaths.

Tenders received for clearance work: Mark Dawe £250 for all paths except Church Hill to Port Isaac Mill for which a tender of £30 was received from Mr. Watson.

Mr. Welton proposed acceptance. Mr. Provis proposed that Mark Dawe be offered £20 more to clear around all seats again at the end of July; seconded by Mr. Norris and carried. Margaret's Lane. Cllr. Dawe reported that surface repairs to be started 17.5.84 followed by work at Port Isaac Platt, Hartland Rd., and Tintagel Terr. [At the time of writing Margaret's Lane has been resurfaced - see cartoon >]

Street Lights. Many failures were reported and the Clerk said that it was very difficult to get them put right. [Members of the public should report any lights out to North Cornwall District Council at Camelford.]

Bus Shelter. A cantilever type shelter approved by Highways Dept. would cost £803 but strict limitations on where it could be erected. Item to be discussed at the next meeting.

British Telecom Meeting. A Public Meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Tuesday 19th. June at 7.30pm. Mr. Parsons will attend and an invitation is to be sent to M.P. Gerry Neale.

Coastal Footpath Wall. A quotation for £86 per metre considered too high and other quotes not forthcoming. A Countryside Commission Grant will probably be available for this work. Temporary 'danger' signs to be put up meanwhile. £37 - £40 would be more reasonable. Cllr. Dawe proposed advertising for tenders in local papers, seconded by Mr. Provis. Mr. Norris pointed out that the fencing on the path was in a bad state.

Planning.

Plans submitted informally by owners of 'Castle Rock View' for Parish Council's comments: to replace crumbling brick house with four chalet-type buildings. Cllr. Dawe - many houses in the village are crumbly! Mr. Provis reminded the Council about the former Rose Hill and Margaret's lane applications and asked how could they even think about it, would be seen by thousands of people on coast path. Finally decided to be 'detrimental to the environment' and 'overdevelopment in a coastal area'.

No Cycling, Temple Bar.

Mr. Bolton forwarded a request for a sign to prevent the hazard to pedestrians of children on bicycles. Cllr. Dawe thought it a ridiculous request as it is impossible to cycle there.

No Access Sign, Trelights. Highways Dept. to be consulted on possibility of removing misleading sign by Dustows'.

Public Discussion.

Mr. Penna thanked the Parish Council for the grant to Trio.

Mrs. Strout reminded us that the National Trust only owned Port Gaverne Beach down as far as the high tide line.

Mrs. Brown of Trelights asked why the stile at the beginning of the footpath next to Trelights Farm was hidden by undergrowth. Cllr. Dawe said the public were free to use the adjacent gates but would nevertheless clear the stile himself.

The next monthly meeting will be held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac on Monday 11th. June at 7.30pm.


'BALED OUT'?


