EDITORIAL

'Tis only an old postal path' we are often told when we ask the way, and it is true. Nearly all our paths are ancient ways, once used by mediaeval monks walking from their homesteads to the

local religious centre, or by miners, or by farm workers, or in ct by anyone needing to cross land to get from one place to another. To preserve these valuable paths, they were 'defined' by the 'National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act' of 1949 and following Acts of Parliament. In our Parish, there are 40 of these paths, all listed and numbered, and all Public Rights of Way across private land. You are entitled to walk the whole of the network, for which maps are available, and the County Council as the 'Highway Authority' have powers to take action against anyone who causes the paths to be blocked by crops, barriers, or any other kind of obstruction. You have this right to walk the paths but never forget your responsibilities. You are crossing land that is mostly agricultural and you should behave accordingly: keep dogs on a lead to ensure that they don't chase livestock, never stray off the course of the path, and guard against causing any damage to animals, crops, or machinery. Many of the farm gates are difficult to open, but they must be closed again after you, in case livestock escapes, or worse still, gets out on to a road. The paths, which are maintained by the Parish Council, are

pleasantest and often most convenient way of getting around our district so make good use of them. Happy walking.



THE LATE SIR JOHN BETJEMAN

With sadness and grief we heard of the Poet Laureate's death at his home in Trebetherick in May, yet we should rejoice that he died in his beloved Cornwall and was buried at St. Enodoc. Sir John had been a welcome and regular worshipper at St. Endellion and had in fact been at the Sung Eucharist on the two Sundays prior to his death. On May 22nd. the day of his funeral, a Requiem Mass was said for him at St. Endellion by Father Hugh Fryer at which members of Sir John's family and close friends were present, including his lifelong friend and counsellor Fr. Harry Williams of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield. The moving service was accompanied by two of Sir John's favourite hymns - 'Rock of Ages' and 'Love's Redeeming Work is Done'. After this service, Fr. Hugh attended the funeral service at St. Enodoc to represent the many good friends which Sir John had at St. Endellion.

Mrs. Mary Rayment of Trelights presented a lucid and concise case for the retention of 'Port Isaac' in our telephone numbers at the start of the Public Meeting held in the village on Tuesday 19th. June. She was well applauded by a large number of people who had come to support this cause. Mr. Parsons, General Manager for British Telecom, Plymouth, had attended for an entirely different reason - he was there to explain why the name could not be retained, not to listen to our point of view. As a result the meeting became very heated and two hours were spent to no avail. When it was explained that it saved a lot of time in an emergency when callers said they were ringing from 'Tintagel' or 'Trebetherick' instead of 'Bodmin', Mr. Parsons said that rescue teams would 'have to bend their minds to something different'. Not satisfied with the result of this meeting, Mrs. Rayment is now going to take the case further up the ladder and may also involve MP Gerry Neale.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the Monthly Meeting at Port Isaac, Monday 11th. June, 1984.

Tennis Court. Mrs. Cann told us about the progress being made but said that no grants would be forthcoming until the Parish Council started the ball rolling. Cllr. Dawe proposed a grant of £1000, with perhaps £500 more next year. This was seconded by Mr. Welton and accepted by the Council unopposed.

Bus Shelter. Figures were given indicating how many passengers use the buses - about 20 per journey on average. Planning permission for a bus stop in Trewetha Lane would probably require a pull-in and use up much room. Cllr. Dawe proposed that a bus shelter be built, seconded by Mr. Norris and the item to be discussed further at the next meeting.

Footpaths. Arrangements were made for the inspection of the paths after they had been cut later this month [June]. Direction signs have arrived and a committee meeting with interested members of the public will be held to decide on their location.

Coast Footpath Wall. The situation is 'back to square one' due to changes at County Hall. Post and rail fencing to be erected with danger signs in the meantime 'if necessary'. Mr. Bolton pointed out the need for wire netting as well.

Association of Local Councils.
Mr. Symons, P. Council representative, reported on the Conference at Plymouth in April where many resolutions were considered including the need for a Right of Appeal for Parish Councils against Planning
