Picture, if you can, Port Isaac harbour devoid of any fishermen. The village, a pretty little holiday resort full of gift shops and restaurants and cafes, bustling with visitors; acres of parked cars winking in the sunlight; but no life in the harbour. No coming and going of fishing boats, no activity at the crab pools, no words of boat and sea at the fish cellars. For over six hundred years men have gone to sea from this place. Commerce in pilchards. slate, coals, herring, and earthenware, has taken place; the very existence of the village is due to this trade. Men involved in heavy work, in whatever industry, have little time or energy for the 'nicer' things in life, and inevitably places of work tend to get untidy. Port Isaac Platt is one of these work places and we so often hear the grumble that 'it is looking so untidy'. As far as the men who work here are concerned, it doesn't really matter very much. Nowadays, though, we have the tourists and they bring a large proportion of the wealth into Port Isaac, and it is for them that we want the place to look nice. Perhaps those who it affects could make some kind of arrangement to look after the appearance of these difficult areas. Port Gaverne beach is also a case in point where fish loading is taking place at present to try and avoid bringing big lorries into Fore Street during the summer season ('Heavens! They'll be loading slate next!'). With ome kind of organisation perhaps, a man could be employed, paid

for by subscriptions from business people in the village, who could keep the Platt and beaches clean as they do in other countries.

CARNIVAL AT PORT ISAAC


A chilly breeze blew across the Playing Field on Carnival Night, which meant a roaring trade for beefburgers and hot-dogs.



PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the Monthly Meeting at Port Isaac, Monday 13th. of August.

Noxious Gas. Mr. Symons still not satisfied with official explanations. Mr. Provis said, 'They know what it is that's why there's no investigation.'

Finance. The cost of street lights at Trelights and Hartland Road of £168, plus footpath clearance and monthly expenses require precept of £500. The footpath costs will be largely repaid by the County Council.

Footpaths. The designated paths have been cleared by J.M.Dawe who is to be paid. Signposts are being erected in a dozen places where paths leave metalled roads.

<u>mill Leat in Village.</u> Mrs. Cann proposed a letter to N.C.D.C. Environmental Health Dept., asking for the leat to be kept clear of rubbish. This was seconded by Cllr. Bill Dawe. The problem has arisen since the removal of the old flush gate.

<u>Playing Field - Damage to Seat.</u> The police are going to interview somebody about penknife vandalisation to the seat.

Safety at Tag's Pit. A report from Mr. Bolton in his absence that the chain needs re-fixing on its posts. Mr. Julian to be asked to do the work.

us Shelter. Letters from four electors were read out. All were in opposition to the bus shelter and none were in support. Mrs. Cann proposed that there should be no bus shelter, Mr. Symons seconded this with the amendment that it should be considered by the next elected council perhaps. The vote was 8 against, 2 in favour of a bus shelter. Item dropped.

<u>Traffic Regulations.</u> Further restrictions not wanted by the Council, but still need for 'Keep Clear' area in front of Doctors' Surgery.

<u>Tennis Court.</u> No 'Change of Use' planning permission needed but application for foundation only will cost £24, not £47. Letter giving Parish Council's approval of the scheme to be sent to Planning Dept. to save time. Proposed by Mr. Symons and carried. Cllr. Dawe not in favour of spending 'thousands of pounds'.

No Entry Signs. The Clerk said that it is now illegal to paint wording on roads eg. 'No Entry'.


Licence Transfers. St. Andrews Hotel - Mr. and Mrs. Hallett. Lawns Hotel - Mr. and Mrs. Ridge.

Mr. Cunningham, Chairman, asked them to make notes and leave them with the Clerk, meanwhile Mr. Julian is to be asked to check the safety of the equipment or if necessary get someone else to do it.

LIFEBOAT


There have been three call-outs since the last report:

Crew members: Nicky Moore, Harry Pavitt, and Barry Slater. This was Nicky Moore's first trip since joining the crew. 2. On Friday 10th. August 7 persons reported trapped by the tide at Hole Beach, Trebarwith. It turned out to be a false alarm with good intent as they wanted to stay until late in the evening when the tide went out.

3. On Wednesday 15th. August the Lifeboat was launched to a girl who had gone over the cliff at Lundy Hole to rescue her dog. The Lifeboat was recalled after 10 minutes as the girl and her dog had scrambled to the top of the cliff again.
