Mr. Welton urged that waymarkof the paths be undertaken before next year as many walkers unable to follow paths. The Clerk reminded the Council that the Footpath Commitee existed for such matters. 
Trelights would not be done with loose chippings, but the Council said that it is national policy to use chippings for economy reasons and they would certainly be used this year.

Sir, I wrote to our M.P. asking for his support in view of the proposed restrictions on dog owners, licences etc., and enclosing a press cutting giving details.

Never in my wildest dreams did I imagine that a man representing a large dog owning community would attempt to evade an honest answer in this way: "Thank you for your letter and press cutting. I shall continue to keep an open mind on the subject until more reactions have been voiced to the Government's draft proposals. The whole purpose at the moment is to obtain the widest consultation. Nevertheless despite their value to lonely and elderly people dogs are causing considerable annoyance and distress to people, where the dog owners fail to exercise proper control. We

shall have to try to reach some balance between these conflicting interests when we draft the regulations. - Gerry Neale."

Surely it must be obvious to the meanest intelligence, and presumably therefore to Mr. Neale, that the problem to be solved is that of control of unattended and untrained animals. (We are well aware of this in the Port Isaac district) and not the persecution of all dog owners. Cats, (bless them, they are also great friends) are allowed, licence free, to be as much of a nuisance as they wish. Responsible breeders and dog lovers, many of whom live and work in this part of the Duchy are not the people responsible for causing "annoyance and distress" in Cornwall.



RECIPE

Smothered Steaks (for 4 people).

- 4 slices Top Rump or lean Chuck 5-6oz. each.
- 1 large Onion. 1 medium Gree Pepper (de-seeded and sliceo,.

¹/₂lb. Tomatoes (skinned and sliced) or small tin Italian Tomatoes.

- Beef Stock. 2 cloves Garlic (or more pressed or crushed).
- Pinch of Thyme. Basil (or Oregano). Tsp. Demerara Sugar.
- Seasoned Flour = flour, salt, pepper. A little Oil + Butter.

Coat steaks with seasoned flour. Heat oil+butter and seal steaks on both sides quickly. Place in dish. Fry onion for a few minutes, add sliced green pepper, stir another few minutes. Add tomatoes, stock, herbs, and seasonings. Simmer for about 5-8 mins. Pour over steaks and place covered dish in oven 350° - 375° for about an hour. move lid and leave in oven foranother 10 mins. If dry, add a bit of stock or a drop of any old wine or sherry. Sprinkle with parsley. Serve with steamed or mashed potatoes and a green vegetable of your choice.



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


LAST BAND NIGHT


