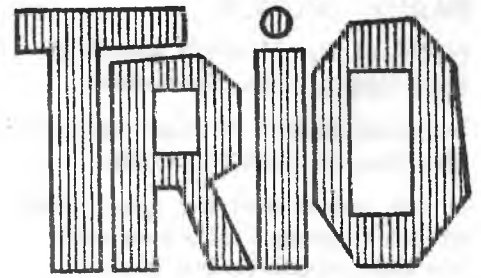
VILLAGE HALL

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the Monthly Meeting,
Port Isaac, 12th. November.

In the absence of Mr. Cunningham,
Mrs. Barron took the chair.

It was noted that the goal posts
at the Playing Fields had still
not been repaired but that the
seats and chains had been re-
moved from the swings.

Playing Field Equipment. Forms,
containing many questions, to
be filled in for a grant, were
perused. Maximum grant avail-
able is £250. Application will
have to be made by the Playing
Field Joint-User Committee.
A contractor has been found at
Padstow who could supply the
equipment, and catalogues will
be examined by those involved.

Seats. The seat opposite Hicks'
butchers is being replaced by
one from the cliff footpath, and
Mr. Julian is to quote for
making a new one to replace it.
Mr. Provis pointed out that
the broken one by the phone
box in Church Hill had been re-
moved by the District Council.
The Clerk is to investigate
whether another seat may be
put in the position.

The Leat, Port Isaac. South
West Water Authority not
able to assist with keeping the
Leat clear of rubbish as it
is not classified as a 'Main
River', but the problem has
been solved as the recent large
amounts of rain have cleared
the stream out.

Yellow Lines, P.I. Surgery.
Constable LeBailly, who was
present, said that a report had
been sent in to the County
Traffic sub-committee stating
that 'no waiting' restrictions
were considered necessary at
this corner by the police.
First asked for 2 years ago,

the yellow lines could be there
by Christmas 1985, it seems.

Mr. Norris said that Mr. Steer
should be pleased as his wall is
always getting knocked down.
Mr. Provis said that it is no
good sticking yellow lines down
without providing somewhere
else for people to park.

Trewithick Corner, Trelights.
The application for works to
improve visibility at this
corner is on the list of items
for consideration at the next
meeting at County Hall.

Trewetha Corner. The work
to be done before the end of
the current Financial Year.
Mr. Welton explained that this
will slightly alter the bends and
increase visibility. There was a
bad accident there recently -
a car had run into the rear of
a petrol tanker.

War Emergency Committee.
Mr. Bolton to obtain 'Book of
Arrangements' from Capt. Bas-
kerville, but felt sure the
members of the community
listed in the book would act
effectively if necessary, but
are not interested in stupid
'exercises'.

Mr. Provis and the Clerk, Mrs.
Willmott reported on the recent
County Council 'Rights of Way'
meeting at Wadebridge.

Public Discussion.

Questions were asked about the
waymarking of certain footpaths.
There is to be a meeting of the
Footpath Committee before the
next meeting of the Council if
possible, to decide where to put
waymarks. It was pointed out
that the landowners' permission
would have to be obtained first.
Mr. Symons suggested that the
Council should obtain 25-50
signs. He felt, however, that
paths should be maintained only
if walked regularly, and that a
few paths should be classified as
'Recreational Footpaths'.
Mr. Welton reported that he had
received complaints about the
path at the Millpool, Port Isaac
Valley. It is in a terrible state,
'absolutely shocking', because
pigs are being kept there. The
Clerk is to contact Mr. Watson
and see if something can be done.
Miss Hambly said that at the
best of times this path was very
bad, particularly the slope down
to the stile. It is a lovely walk
but made unsuitable for the you-
or elderly people.
Mr. Symons said that this should
be one of the 'Recreational Paths'.
It was felt that it was worth
doing something about the whole
path. It could perhaps be a
project for a Manpower Services
Scheme next year.

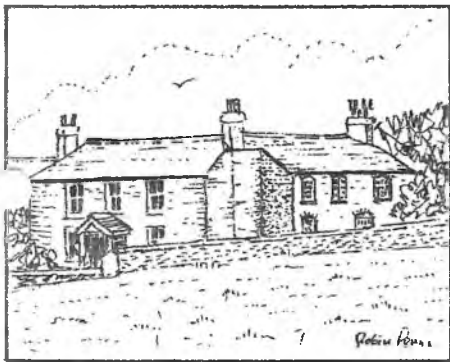

MEDIEVAL CHRISTMAS PLAY
The staff, friends, and residents of the Peredur Farm and Craft Centre, St. Clether, are to present a Medieval Christmas Play in the Church of St. Endellion, Sunday 16th. December at 7pm. Called "The Oberufer Shepherds' Play" it is one of a cycle of three mystery plays discovered by Dr. Rudolf Steiner, an Austrian professor, in the 19th. Century.
