Having seen the three plays now in production, I can really recommend that you go and have a thoroughly entertaining time! The players seem to be better than ever - Lady Faux-Parr trying to chair a parent-teacher meeting with Mrs. Ambidex hurling abuse from the back of the Hall. Glam Mrs. Block, the chic Monsieur Plume-Tante, strict maths teacher Miss Trigg, haughty Hon. Mrs. Landskip, pregnantly defiant Mrs. Proliff, and sporty Miss Hurdlefast, give a performance that is worthy of an 'Ealing' comedy.

In 'Strawberry Jam' which followed, a complete change of mood was experienced and the three ladies play extremely convincingly, as is necessary in a 'black' comedy like this. A newcomer to the P.I.P.'s takes the part of Dr. Varley, and true to life he is.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the monthly meeting held on Monday 13th. May, at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

As this was the Annual Meeting, the Clerk, Mrs. Willmott called for the election of officers. No change in positions held already ensued.

A 30 Road. Letters to be sent urging a start to the Okehamp-ton by-pass, and supporting the case for a dual-carriageway through Cornwall.

Church Hill. The cobbled 'drain' near 'Hillcrest' could be filled.

Finance. A precept of £1000 to be raised and money from deposit to be used to cover current expenses - Playground Equipment, Notice Boards, etc.

The Annual Audit of Accounts to take place Thurs. 20th. June.

Bus Shelter, St. Endellion.

The volunteer group have a £120 grant from the Jubilee Fund. The Parish Council will consider further aid after planning consent is obtained.

Port Isaac Village Hall.

Mr. Welton reported that plastering work is to be done. If any grants available, then the committee will try for improvements to the kitchen and changing room. Cllr. Dawe said the Parish Council should back Mr. Welton and the Hall committee. Dr. Barron said perhaps the council meetings could be held in the Hall to help their finances.

Tennis Court. £3000 is available from Sports Committee. It is being considered that a Community Scheme might build the court cheaper, but local labour might not have necessary expertise, and higher maintenance costs might ensue.

Port Gaverne. The Delabole Fire Brigade (11 men and an officer) had hosed down an enormous amount of rock from the dangerous cliff, using water from the dammed leat. A £20 donation to the Benevolent Fund was agreed.

Mrs. Strout could not permit the use of the Beach Cafe toilet by the public for this year. Plans involving National Trust property are still being considered. A local plumber has quoted £1,800 to do the work.

Footpaths. The M.S.C. scheme from Trewetha to the Millpool has started. Tenders for trimming (Church Hill - Mill, £35, J. Watson, and all other paths, £260, J. Dawe) were accepted. Cllr. Dawe declared an interest and left the room while the tenders were discussed.

A tender for trimming grass under seats (J. Dawe, £25) was also accepted. An idea to spray weedkiller under the seats was not put into effect in case of danger to children.

Light in Trewetha Lane. After some discussion, this item is to be discussed at the next meeting after councillors have had a look at the situation. Mrs. Cann pointed out that the steps that needed a light were used by all residents in the estate. At the same time the lighting throughout the village will be looked at. 'The present system is useless', said Mrs. Cann.

Notice Board, the Platt. This has just been renovated so an offer by Homer Park Hotel to pay for a new one incorporating a direction sign to Homer Park, was not taken up.

Planning:

The following applications were discussed but returned to the Planning Office with no observations from the Parish Council:

Mr.P.A.Sloman - convert disused stable to holiday accommodation, Roscarrock.

Miss.J.Preston - garage at Glenthorne, Tintagel Terrace.

Mr.R.Baker - kitchen/bedroom extension, Tintagel Terrace.

Mrs.E.M.Forrest - dwelling next to The Barn, Trewetha.

Mr.D.Smith - dwelling at Silver Spray, Port Gaverne.

Port Isaac Beach. Mr. Symons asked if the N.C.D.C. could be asked to clean it more regularly as it is in a shocking condition.

Public Discussion.

Mrs. Olive Strout asked what had happened to the notice that was supposed to be at Port Gaverne telling people where the existing toilets are. She also suggested a 'Welcome to Port Isaac' sign. This idea will be discussed at the next meeting.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

St. Peter's Church Hall was the scene of a well attended and lively public meeting this year. The guest speakers were: Mr. Magee (Housing), Harvey Lander (County Councillor), Bill Dawe (District Councillor), Mr. Crafft (National Trust), Sgt. Davis, and Constable LeBailly (Police).

The Parish Council Chairman, John Cunningham, thanked the members of the Council for their work and praised Mrs. Willmott's efforts as Clerk. Messrs. Penna, Day, and Julian, were thanked for the new map at the car park.

The voluntary Hospital Car service has 12 noble drivers but could do with two more. Trio 'still doing wonderful job'. Mr. Julian, retired because of illness - but in great heart - will no longer be able to do work for the Council.

There are to be 'no parking' signs at the surgery corner. After much 'bellyaching' a fence is going up on the coast path - at no cost to the Parish. A Footpath Committee now formed will 'waymark' some paths. The Port Isaac to Trewetha, and Port Gaverne to Pendoggett (with St. Kew Parish) paths to be designated 'Recreational Paths', with some work by 'Community' schemes. The Village Hall was granted £250 towards improvements, and a scheme for the disabled will provide an easier access. £1000 plus £300 from the mothers has provided a Wendy House and slide at the Playing Fields playground. After last year's success, Port Isaac shopkeepers will make an even better effort decorating

Fore Street at Christmas. Vandalism this year has been turning road signs around only.

* * *

Mr. Magee told us about the running of his department and the allocation system for council houses. There are 19 applications in the Parish: 3 single, 6 pensioner, 9 2-bed, and 1 3-bed. Maintenance in North Cornwall costs £28,000 per week, covered entirely by income from rents. Only two of our houses have been sold, average price £10,600. No plans to build any more here next year, the St. Illicks site to be sold with planning permission for one dwelling.

* * *

Harvey Lander outlined some County Council services. The budget for 84/85, £137,160,000, being 1% over the government 'target' would mean 'loss-of-grant' penalties. At the same time, this is £15,000,000 below the figure set by Whitehall as the minimum necessary to provide essential services! He asked for Parish Council support in the fight for the A30 dual-carriageway in Cornwall. After eight years, supported by Councillor Dawe, at last work was in progress at Trewetha.

* * *

Councillor Dawe said that many of our street lights 'are no better than candles' and need upgrading. Trelights people would like a road sweeper in the village occasionally. He hoped for improvements to the B3314 between the church and Plain Street, also at Trewithick farm. The young people offering to build the bus shelter have been promised a Jubilee Trust grant. Large vans must not use Church

litter bin to be provided. Provision of public toilets had been discussed with the Parish Council and the National Trust Committee are to be consulted.

Sergeant Davis apologised for Inspector Hallett who couldn't attend, and said that they would like to see community relationships go from strength to strength.

* * *

In the following Public Discussion, Mrs. Brown of Trelights spoke up very strongly about the new council houses there. A private developer would be made to pull such monstrosities down, she said, they are out of scale and as for red brick! Mr. Magee replied that Mrs. Brown was entitled to her opinion but that they didn't agree with her. Mr. Orchard asked about the seat by the phone box, Church Hill. Mr. Cunningham replied that it isn't going to happen. Mr. Orchard then asked for improvements to the road with tarmac'd passing places and Harvey Lander said the ideas would be considered. Mr. Fisher asked about 'no parking' in Fore St. Constable LeBailly promised to alert all the staff at Wadebridge to the problem, and Sgt. Davis told us that the County Police would issue fixed-penalty tickets in rural areas this year as well as on primary roads. Mrs. Brown asked if the council would provide lay-bys as farm vehicles passing could cause damage. Mr. Magee suggested tenants could make space in the gardens, and Constable LeBailly pointed out that nobody has a

right to park on the road. Mr. Symons said that he hoped the planners would be careful about developing the St. Illicks site. Mrs. Thomas [The Dolphin] thanked the Council for their quick action in seeing that the new coast-path fence was lowered. 'We love Port Isaac because it is beautiful,' she said, 'and we musn't let things like this happen.'

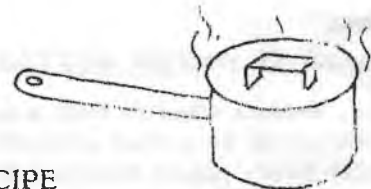
ROLLER [COAST]ER PATH

How many of you have walked the new path along the cliffs from Pine Awn to Port Quin? It is some path! To start with there are 100 steps leading up in one straight flight which, in their pristine state, look like an escalator - which would be a help as the climb is strenuous. While I was counting the steps, taking them five at a time with rests in between, I found it was a fairly non-tiring way to tackle the ascent!

You can't lose your way round the cliffs because a wooden stock-proof fence has had to be erected along the path on the landward side. On the seaward side, there is nothing except fresh air and wonderful views out to sea. From Scarnor, down 78 steps, and along Reedy Cliff, the views are quite new and some of them are breathtaking. Where the path comes down nearer to sea-level, it curves backwards and forwards among the granite outcrops, rising and falling, reminiscent of a roller-coaster in a fun fair!

The one-and-a-half-hour's walk, is well worthwhile though, and the sight of Port Quin haven as you come around Kellan Head, with Pentire in the distance, is absolutely unforgettable.

RECIPE

Hamburgers Suchow (for 2)

10 oz. minced steak
1 large onion, chopped
1 slice bread, soaked in milk
1 egg
Chopped or dried parsley
Salt and pepper

Blend and form into small hamburgers, but round rather than flat. Fry them in a medium sized saucepan until lightly browned. Remove and put in a warm place.

Sauce:

1 tin celery or mushroom soup
1 tablespoon paprika pepper
1 teaspoon thyme or basil

Heat the soup in the pan which was used to fry the hamburgers. Add the pepper and thyme then simmer for 10 min. Add the hamburgers, put the lid on, and cook for a further 5 min.

Serve with parsley potatoes, peas and sweetcorn.

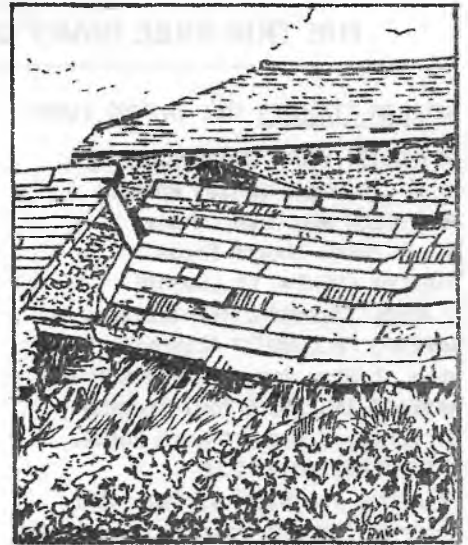
Parish Council to be asked for £300 towards new toilets, sinks, hot water tank, and replastering. Balance to be met by Hall.
