The meeting discussed the progress of repairs and fund-raising to pay for them. More use is to be made of M.S.C. schemes and grant availability to improve the hall as much as possible.

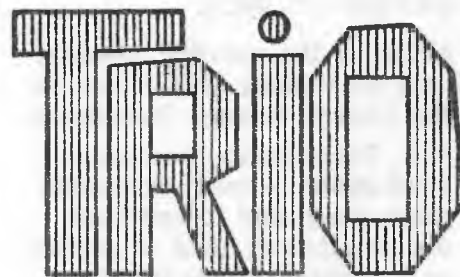

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the monthly meeting held on Monday 10th. June, at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

N.B. These notes are only a brief outline - much discussion takes place and to know all the details you need to attend as a member of the public.

Matters arising from Minutes.

It was decided to take no action regarding complaints that covering the cobbles on Church Hill would spoil another 'old bit' of Port Isaac. Mr. Kinnings of New Road was advised to contact Social Services about difficulty with his wheel chair on the new pavement in New Road. Cllr. Dawe praised Mr. Sweet's work on the seats.

Donation, War Memorial.

£25, same as last year, to be given towards the grass cutting at St. Peter's War Memorial.

Donation to Trio.

£65 granted this year towards the costs of the newsletter.

Bus Shelter, St. Endellion.

The site is acceptable to County Highways, and no planning or building regulations are needed according to N.C.D.C.

Bus Shelter, Port Isaac.

Mr. Sweet to be asked to repair the vandalised ceiling and to repaint the walls and repair the gutter.

Gate at Playing Fields.

People using the field are taking the gate off its hinges instead of getting a key from the clerk.

Tennis Court.

This is still going ahead in spite of concern at the costs of £9-£10,000. A raffle is to be held in the summer to raise £1000. There will be big prizes.

Fish merchants in the cellars at Port Isaac are to be included on the Information Map.

Light in Trewetha Lane.

Cllr. Dawe said that he finds the light sufficient whenever he has to use the steps at night. 'You don't wear high heels', somebody commented! It was decided to whiten the edges of the steps for the time being.

Clerk's Correspondence.

A letter expressing appreciation of the £20 cheque to the county branch of the Fire Services Benevolent Fund. (See last issue of Trio.)

Mr. Barriball, Trelights Post Office, an enquiry whether the Parish Council will consider re-positioning their notice board when he redevelops the site.

Planning.

There were no applications to consider, but a complaint was received at the Parish Council's decision to make 'no observations' regarding Mr. Brown's plan to open a fish shop on the Platt. The remark should have been made to the P. Council before their decision, said the Chairman, the application was posted on the notice boards.

Public Discussion.

Cllr. Dawe raised various points about hedge cutting, Mrs. Cann requested 'Accident Area take care' signs approaching Plain Street, Mr. Provis said more people than usual were driving the wrong way down the Fore Street one-way-system. He also referred to the dangerous corner at Trewetha and said that Mr. Phelps had told him that he was willing to donate a 40 yd. strip of land to make a footway. At this point, however, the clerk interrupted to say that she couldn't act on matters raised under 'Clerk's Correspondence' or 'Any Other Business' and that the items should have been put on the agenda, in advance. The 'Public Discussion' was for the public and not supposed to be an 'Any Other Business'.

Mr. Penna said that he was pleased to hear some councillors express dislike of new orange

street lights. Much of the lighting in Port Isaac is sub-standard and will have to be renewed gradually. He suggested that a Parish Council committee might be formed to investigate any other possibilities, to see what is being done elsewhere, e.g. Fowey, and to prepare a plan to be used when any future improvements are to be made.

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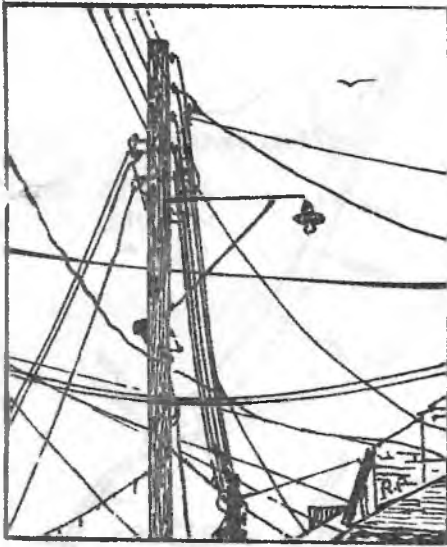
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COMPETITION

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OUR FOOTPATHS - a 'page-filler' by Robin Penna.

There is such a good network of public footpaths in our Parish that I am always surprised that more people don't use them. To walk along the valleys and over the hilltops is so pleasant and such a good way to 'get away from it all' as you hardly ever even see a road, and when you do it is hard to understand why everyone crowds onto these noisy strips of tarmac! Either side lie fields of grass, waving in the breeze, and skylarks sing up above and all is peace.

Admittedly some of the paths are rather hard to find, but this is part of the adventure. Armed with a good map and a sense of exploration it isn't really hard - I managed it! Since the paths are relatively unused, however, nobody bothers very much keeping the stiles in good condition but, within this Parish, they are at least nearly all 'negotiable'. Never remove wire, etc. from stiles, it is probably there to keep stock in not to keep you out! Try and get through with as little disturbance as possible. All our paths are 'rights of way' across private farmland.

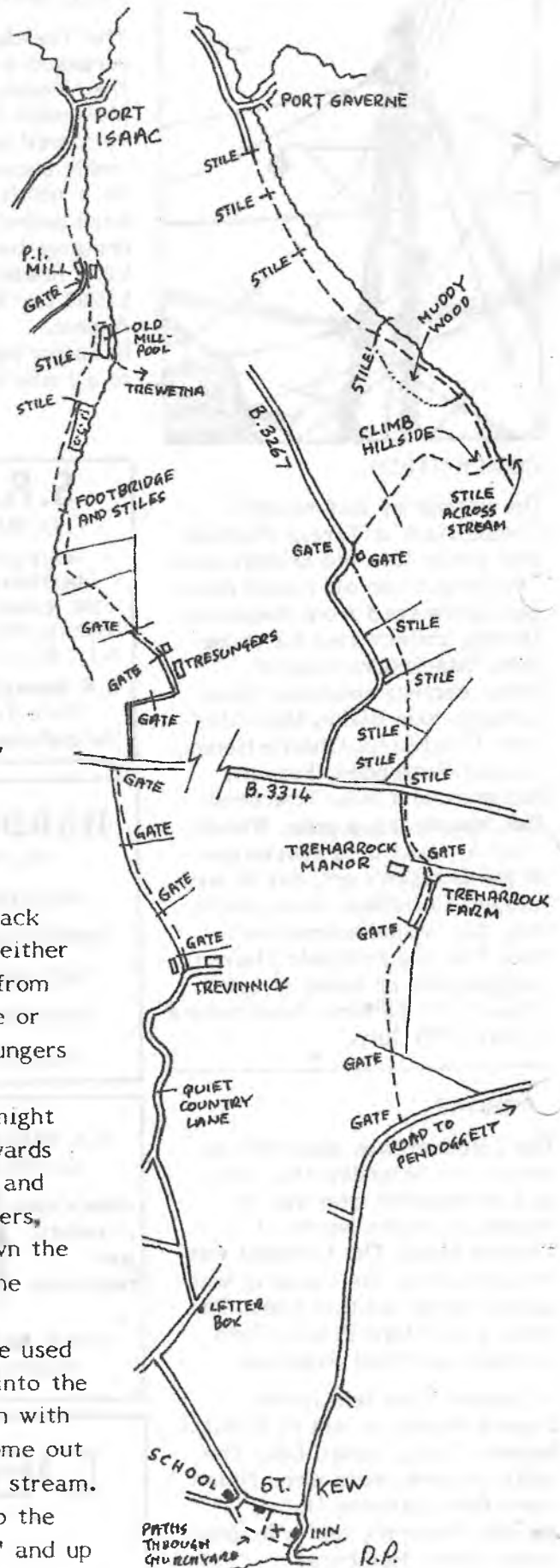
Now, I shall try and describe a local walk to St. Kew and back which is about 1½ hours in each direction, taken reasonably slowly - which I think is the best way to do it, and gives you an opportunity to have some lunch at Harry's pub. In dry weather ordinary clothes and shoes are quite enough, but I recommend wellies if there has been much rain.

You can either go via Port Gaverne Valley and come back via Trevinnick and Port Isaac Valley, or vice versa. In either case do remember to turn round and look at the view from time to time - Treharroch Manor nestled in the hillside or the panorama from the top of the world between Tresungers and Trevinnick, to give just two examples.

Port Isaac Valley is quite straightforward though you might have some difficulty finding the footbridge leading towards Tresungers - it is down to your left among some trees and preceded by a muddy spot! Coming down from Tresungers, there is a splendid sign put up by the farmer, then down the muddy lane, down across the first field and along by the stream to the footbridge.

Port Gaverne Valley is a bit more tricky unless you are used to it, particularly after you have managed the 'stile!' into the muddy wood where the path gets lost. Keep straight on with the stream just to your left and eventually you will come out at the place where the path to Pendoggett crosses the stream. Climb up the hillside to your right, meander slightly to the edge of the field, over the top, down through the 'gap' and up to the B.3267 at Coldstanton Corner.

The stiles at Poltreworgey are difficult to find and take the form of 'steps' over the walls, particularly those in the fields near the B.3314 road. N.B. take care crossing this road! The path through Treharroch is relatively easy to follow.

Sir, Unfortunately, when Nature came to distribute the rheumatic diseases, women received a poor deal. During the local ARC week, we shall be raising funds for vital arthritic research, which is trying to find the cause and cure of the diseases which are afflicting both men and women. He studied music and drama with Bernard Dickenson and his recent operatic debut, while still at college, was with the Handel Opera Society at Sadlers Wells. RECIPES

Meat Loaf

Mix together 3/4 lb. beef mince
and 1/4 lb. pork mince (not
sausage meat). Soak a thick
slice of white bread in water for
5 minutes. Squeeze the bread
dry and mix with the meat. Add
a finely chopped onion, 1 beaten
egg, salt and pepper, and some
parsley and thyme. Mix thorough-
ly. Grease a loaf tin very well,
place the meat mixture in it,
and bake in a medium oven for
about one hour. Serve with
potatoes, a green vegetable,
and a sauce made with onions,
tomatoes, and a small green
pepper.

Cape Bananas

Fry firm, unripe, peeled bananas
to a light brown in butter.
Remove from pan but keep hot.
Add a little more butter to the
juices in the pan, plus 4 tblsp.
light brown or Demerara sugar,
the contents of a small jar of
cranberry sauce, and a little
wine of any sort. When bubbling,
simmer the bananas in the syrup
for about 10 minutes. Serve hot
with whipped or clotted cream.
