MARRIAGE REGULATIONS

After consultation with the Registrar recently I feel it right to make it clear that residence in the Civil Parish of St. Endellion (which includes Port Isaac) Joes not confer the right to be married in the Parish Church of St. Endellion. Those who reside in the Ecclesiastical Parish of St. Endellion or who are on the Church Electoral Roll are entitled to this privilege. Those who do not fulfil these requirements have to obtain a Special Licence from the Archbishop, and in future residence in Port Isaac as part of the Civil Parish of St. Endellion cannot be regarded as sufficient grounds for recommending the granting of such a licence.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the monthly meeting held on Monday 12th. August, at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

Use of Shop

Cllr. Dawe reported that change of use planning permission was not required for commercial premises which continued to be retail business, except for certain types of business such as selling meals.

Finance

With £25.77 in the bank and £690 on deposit, £600 to be precepted to meet current expenses. £150 to be paid for footpath work 'on account' and the balance of £110 to be paid later. Mr. Sweet was complimented for his work painting all the seats, but the numbers should have been on the backs. All maintenance work is now up to date.

Public Toilets, Port Gaverne

The users of the various cellars did not want to relinguish them, so, after two meetings between the Parish Council, National Trust, and a representative from North Cornwall District Council, it was decided that one of the car spaces in Rashleigh Cellar could be used. Mr. McNichol to be asked to draw up plans and Mr. Scott to be asked for a rough price, to be submitted to N.C.D.C. by the end of August in the hope that some money may be available for this item. Planning permission will be necessary, and the plans will also have to be passed by the National Trust. Questions were asked, 'Who will pay for the electricity?' and 'Who will clean them and maintain them?'

Port Isaac School Governors The governors are appointed for a 4-year period and consist of the head master, teachers, parents, and members of the



public. The representative of the Parish Council is not a delegate of the Council and can continue to be a governor even if ceasing to be a parish councillor. Mr. Symons said that he didn't feel that more 'teacher' members were needed, but still recommended Mrs Cann for the position for her experience on 'governing bodies', proposed by Mrs. Barron, seconded by Mr. Symons, and carried unanimously.

Seat - The Main - Port Gaverne Mrs. Grace Cotton (formerly Procter) would like to donate a seat to be placed somewhere at Port Gaverne. The site suggested by the councillors is at the bottom of the track on the Main near the top of Teague's Pit. [Should it be 'Teague's Pit' or 'Tag's Pit'? Ed.]

Light-Hartland Road

The pole behind the houses does not belong to S.W.E.B. and lines would be necessary to supply current and be expensive. Costs would be borne by the Parish Council as it would only be a 'footpath' situation. It was felt that tenants were at liberty to put their own lights on their houses. Mr. Sweet to be sked to whiten the steps down to Trewetha Lane.

Coastal Path

From the car park around to 'Overcliff' there is a splendid new fence but no gate in the gap at 'Castle Rock View' [This has now been wired up. Ed.] and the old wire fence has been broken down. and rubble dumped over it when the tarmaccing was done. A site meeting of the parish council to be held after this meeting to inspect the problem.

Car Port, Rose Hill

The Clerk said that there was a scheme to help elderly people by improving their gardens on a 'once and for all' basis.

PORT ISAAC SINGERS IN BRITTANY

The Port Isaac Singers have gone 'foreign' for the first time! We went to the Lorient festival in Brittany as part of the Cornish delegation of musicians, dancers, sportsmen, and artists. At Lorient for the last 15 years, the Celtic nations of Brittany, Cornwall, Wales, Scotland, Ireland, Galicia (in Spain), and the Isle of Man, have met together annually to celebrate their common heritage. It is now an enormous undertaking with some 4,000 taking part. We went with very little idea of what was expected of us but it proved an incredible and highly enjoyable experience, if very tiring - some 11 concerts plus lots of impromptu sessions in the 10 days. Our venues ranged (in one day) from the Open Air Gardens at 12.30am. to a massive tent at 2.30, and to the beautiful Cathedral of St. Louis at 9.30 that same evening! Apart from the music, the social mixing together, particularly at meal times, with all sorts and nationalities, proved especially enjoyable. Often communication was difficult, particularly with the Spanish who spoke no English, but by shouting, waving of arms, and drawing pictures on the table cloth, and, of course, through music, we communicated very well indeed - or at least got the message over. The highlight for all of us was the grand procession on the last day. It had been rained off in the morning, which could have been disastrous as people had come from all over Brittany



even further afield in France to take part, all in the most magnificent costumes, with their Pipes and Bombards-a type of oboe. Also spectators, thousands of them, pay to view the march so it is a big source of revenue to the Festival. However by 6pm. it all began in earnest. 2,000 dancers, pipers, musicians, drummers, and the Port Isaac Singers singing all the way! Our new yellow dresses with a Cornish tartan sash made an impressive splash of colour. We did Cornwall proud! The same evening we gave a concert with Brenda Wootton and others of the Cornish delegation to a large enthusiastic audience. Although the festival ended that day we gave another concert in a lovely little 11th. Century church in a village twinned with Stithians, followed by a Mayoral reception and buffet supper. Although two hours late (not our fault) the village square was thronged with people waiting to greet us when we arrived.

Everywhere we went we encountered friendliness and a marvellously enthusiastic reception. The song everyone wanted to hear again and again was 'Amazing Grace'! It will never be sung by us again without bringing back lovely memories of Lorient. Janet Townsend.

necessary to be about 900ft. above sea level to see it (square root of 900 = 30 + 10 = 40) and nowhere in the parish is so high. But Lundy is 400ft. high, and at that height the horizon is about 26.67 miles away. 26.67 + 13.30 = 39.97 (40) so that the island is just visible in clear conditions. It can appear higher when there is moisture in the atmosphere which acts like a mirror reflecting more of the island over the horizon - at least I think so!

Dear Sir, May I, in Trio, say I am amazed at the statement, concerning the St. Endellion bus shelter, that a Church porch should be used as an alternative for the schoolchildren. The Church should not come into this. The porch is kept locked because there have been thefts on these premises in the past. Who is going to supervise these children? To make such a remark is just an easy way out of having a bus shelter at St. Endellion which is just as important as the tennis courts in Port Isaac. I think these will end up like the skateboard rinks which councils spent money on in the past. How many are going to use them? I asked for a bus shelter 12 years ago and we still have not got it. Trelights could also do with a bus shelter for the service bus to Wadebridge and it would also serve a useful purpose for those who go to the Library van. I think also a couple of swings and a slide for the children wouldn't be asking too much, after all, Port Isaac seems to have a good share of money spent on it. Perhaps the County Council will find some money for St. Endellion and Trelights, I hope so.

Dear Sir, May I, through the Trio, convey my very grateful thanks to the members of the Methodist Tuesday Evening Fellowship for their very generous gift of £25 for the children of the Gambia, where I visited on a Mission last January. I have sent the money to an old African priest who, with his bedridden wife, looks after as many orphans as they can manage at any one time in their, materially, very poor home in Banjul. There is no state provision for these children and they rely entirely on such Christian kindness.

People in the village who supported St. Peter's Church Hunger Lunches in Lent, may also like to know that this week I have received a very movingly grateful letter for the £75 we sent out earlier.

As the long-awaited rains have

at last arrived, they used the money to hire a tractor to plough up the land around the school at Banjulinding and to purchase seed and fertilizer to grow maize and rice. This will help to feed the numbers of small children under 8 who attend the school and who would otherwise get no mid-day meal. Any surplus will be sold to raise funds for the out-reach work at the little school up-river at Basse in which we are particularly interested. We also thank those who have so generously supported the Gambia stall at the Mini-Markets through the summer. Seeds have also been purchased with some of this money and further funds will be sent out in the Autumn to sponsor more children to attend school and thereby gualify to receive something to eat each day. (No State education is available for children under 9.) It costs approx. 25p. a week to send a child to school - far beyond the capacity of a normal Gambian family.

Thank you so much for all your help. If any person (or group of people) would be interested in sponsoring a little boy or girl for some education and a bowl of rice a day, please get in touch with me through the Trio! Yours gratefully,

It was thought that this would mean that the uniqueness and beauty of Port Isaac would be protected by the Planning regulations and prevent it from suffering the fate of so many coastal villages. This has proved futile. In practice it appears that as long as you don't apply for planning permission in the Conservation area you can do whatever you like, to the detriment of the environment and no one really cares. Port Isaac is becoming less and less attractive. This doesn't matter too much to the secondhome owners here who can easily sell, once their investment starts to fall off - but it does matter to those of us who live here.

Less visitors mean fewer summer jobs and less money in the village could lead ultimately to the closing of shops and more people being forced to move away.

It is up to us to protect and conserve what we have here. The planners won't be interested unless we show them that we care what happens to our village. A Conservation area <u>must</u> mean what it says.

RECIPE

Paté de Liégois

11b. chicken livers, 1/2 lb. unsalted butter, 2tsps. dry mustard, 1/2tsp. ground cloves, 1 tsp. grated nutmeg (fresh grated is by far the best), 1 medium onion finely grated, 1/21b. smoked bacon bits.

Put chicken livers, blood and all, into a saucepan. Cover with cold water, add 1/2tsp. salt, and simmer, not boil, for 20 min. Drain and dry with paper towels, put it through a fine mincer and then put it through again. Meanwhile grill the bacon bits and, when cooked, put through the mincer, twice, after the liver. The onion can be put through as well. Blend the rest of the ingredients, add liver, and mix well. Butter one or two earthenware dishes and put the paté into them. Cover and put in the fridge - it will keep for a very long time. When you need it, put a little hot water into a bowl and stand the dish of pate in it for a second or two. loosen the sides with a knife, and turn out onto a dish. Forget your lettuce leaves and tomatoes order watercress the day before you want it and place it round the pate with thinly sliced onion rings. Give each person a wedge of lemon to squeeze. Serve with toast and butter.
