

PORT ISAAC CONSERVATION AREA

Earlier this year, I reported in Trio that the District Council had decided to prepare design guidelines for Port Isaac, setting out how best to carry out building and repair work in the Conservation Area, irrespective of whether planning permission is required. This initiative followed on from the Secretary of State's refusal to allow planning control over small-scale works which can easily damage the character of the village.

A report has now been prepared putting forward design guidelines and identifying other possible improvements in the village. The next step will be to prepare a leaflet for all property owners in the Conservation Area setting out the design guidelines in a concise and attractive way. However, before taking the matter any further, the District Council wishes to consult local people. Therefore a public meeting has been arranged for 7.30pm. on Friday 14th. November in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

This initiative to protect the character of Port Isaac will only work if it has the support and cooperation of local people. I hope as many people as possible will be interested enough to come along to the public meeting on 14th. November.



PARISH COUNCIL

Notes taken at the monthly meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 13th. October at Trelights.

Cllr. Dawe reported the death of Mrs. Pengelly and the Council stood for one minute's silence.

The Planning Department had expressed annoyance over the request to delay plans for 91 Fore Street. The matter of the 1972 enforcement was not under consideration now.

Bus Shelter, St. Endellion

Cllr. Dawe asked for £465 towards the cost of materials as suggested September 1985. This will be considered at the next meeting when all relevant documents are to be produced. More Children are now using the bus said Cllr. Dawe.

Christmas Lights, Trelights

£40 to start a scheme for decorative lights in the village was donated by the Parish Council to Mr. Barriball who is to form a committee for this purpose. There is also to be a Christmas tree on the 'triangle' [known as 'letterbox'].

Christmas Lights, Port Isaac

It is hoped to extend the lights up Roscarrock Hill and Church Hill this year and a donation of £75 towards this was proposed and accepted 'nem con'.

Proposed Toilets, Port Gaverne

The District Council have reservations about the standard of these, although plans have been passed, and Mr. Pyeman is to visit the site on 23rd. October to check. 'Why now', Mr. Bolton asked, 'when it has all gone

through?' If the scheme is accepted, the District Council is to pay £5000 for the work.

Fencing, Playing Fields

The matter of a fence to stop balls from going into the garden of the adjacent property is to be discussed by the 'Joint-user Committee' of members from the Parish Council and the Education Authority.

Conservation Guidelines

A Public Meeting is to be held jointly with the Parish Council on Friday 14th. November [see advertisement in this issue]. The District Council will try to notify non-resident owners of property in the old village.

Marshall Way, Trelights

The above name was accepted for the road in the new estate on Tolraggott Field.

Port Isaac Mill Pond

A Manpower Services Commission scheme is being used by our Heritage Coast Officer to improve the paths around the old mill pond, to clear some of the trees out, and refill it. The danger to children, who could fall in if no fence was erected, was raised by Mr. Symons.

Need for Vigilance

Cornwall Rural Community Council again stressed the need for Parish Councillors to attend meetings of District Planning Committees, etc. to keep themselves informed of what is going on at other levels of local government.

St. Kew Community Bus

Cllr. Dawe said that Mr. Bruce and himself were the only persons present from St Endellion at the meeting at St. Kew Highway. If we are to get a bus for ourselves, a lot more interest must be shown. There may be another allocation of six buses next year and a proper committee should be formed now. The ground work has already been done and Mrs. Sweett of Trethoway Hotel has the file.

Rubble from 'St. Illicks'

The masonry from the demolished building [once known as 'The Wrennery, because women of the W.R.N.S. - 'Wrens' - were stationed there during the war] has been tipped over the cliff and a complaint is to be made to the District Council.

Planning

Mr. Ken Richards, Dwelling on land adjacent to 'Coldstanton'. No observations.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Haygreen asked for the misleading sign 'Furze Park only' to be removed, and for a sign 'St. Endellion Lane' to be put up. 'I don't live in 'Furze Park', she said, 'and I have even had people asking me "How far to the Park?".'

Mr. Penna asked whether a record of street light failures could be kept again in order to try and improve the present conditions where many lights are out for weeks on end.

Peter Blake thanked Cllr. Dawe for remembering his father by the name 'Marshall Way'.

LETTER

We make every effort to include all items received each month but sometimes long letters have to be left out. We can include one this month, though, because there is too much news for six sides, and there is enough in the kitty to pay for one extra side.

Dear Sir, I receive Trio fairly regularly from my friend Mrs. May at Port Gaverne and so renew memories of my life in Port Isaac.

Mrs. May has told me in her letter this week of the planned holiday tour up to Perth by Prout's coach, which she is going on. Now I'm wondering what the late Mr. Mark Prout would have made of that if anybody had told him in '47 that such a trip had been planned? When he came to my parents - the late Mr. and Mrs. T. Burrow who lived at Beulah, now Halcyon, Flats on The Terrace - to ask their advice. After a busy first season having used the coach for fetching visitors to and from Port Isaac Road station (no petrol for cars then) and arranging coach tours of Cornwall each week in their one and only coach, did my parents think he'd be wise to buy a second coach, and would there be enough trade to warrant that

expense? My mother's answer was 'Yes, go ahead and get another one' which they did, and didn't regret as Port Isaac became a very popular place after the hardships of the war.

Each Sunday we used to troop down with a house party of our guests to the Wesley Chapel in the Valley for the services there.

It's good to know that 'village life' is once more alive and busy, as we found the coming of TV to the village, after the Queen's Coronation - then 3 or 4 sets only - did close down so much - the W. I. - Mother's Union - but not forgetting that the football team kept going. I think there must have been between 15 to 20 of us in Muriel and Jack Short's home, watching the Queen 'that day' on their small black and white set. I lived next door at Garrick and left my youngest son - in his Moses basket on the bed - to run in and see some of the celebrations for a while. Then my late husband would change places with me.

Many thanks for your interesting newsletter. Keep up the good work and help to bring back happy memories to those of us who have left the village but often wish they were back.


