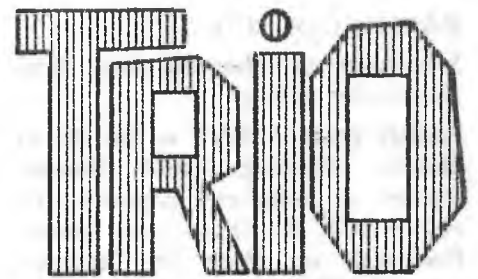

Public Discussion: Mr. P. Lobb asked for the seat on 'Letter Box Green', Trelights, to be put back in its original position.

Notes taken at the monthly meeting at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 12th. January.

A very cold night and no members of the public present. Mrs. Barron chaired a meeting of six councillors only.

Mr. Symons said he had a statement to make arising from an item in the minutes but as it concerned Cllr. Dawe, who was absent, he asked for it to go on next month's agenda.

Finance

With £1279.70 on deposit but only £106 left in the current account, it was decided to precept for the £800 remaining available to the Council.

Horse Riding on Footpaths

County Highways to be asked for advice on dealing with a problem of horses being ridden on the Cliff Path, Port Isaac, and along Port Isaac Valley from Church Hill.

Seat at Trelights

The seat in question was formerly opposite Park Villa Lodge but was removed to Letter Box Green when heavy vehicles gaining access to a building site in the village were

making the original site dangerous. A letter from Mrs. Pethick was read out asking that the seat be not returned to its earlier position, supported by 33 signatures from village people. It was decided unanimously not to move the seat.

As a seat is also desired in Coronation Park, the next one available may be placed there.

Conservation Area, Port Isaac

Matters relating to a possibility of TV aerials on rooftops in the village when the new booster is in operation, planting of trees along the Water Authority's access road, and future street lighting to be passed on to the N.C.D.C. meeting, January 16th.

Port Gaverne Toilets

As payments will need to be made to the contractors, Home-care Services of Port Isaac, on a 'pro forma' basis, these are to be made as necessary with the authorisation of the Council.

Overhanging Rock, Port Gaverne

Means are to be sought to remove part of the cliff which is threatening to fall onto the path at the footbridge. Charlie David, Heritage Coast Officer is to examine it, but it was suggested that it should be left until the frost was over as it could well fall by itself. Meanwhile the area is to be fenced off. Any rubble from the rock will be used to fill a large hole in the path.

Diary of Events

Mr. Cowen, Tourism Development Officer, N.C.D.C., wants information about any events to take place April - October for a 1987 'Diary of Events'. He needs the information by the middle of February.

Car Park Notice Board

A letter was received from Port Isaac & District Tourism Association requesting a new notice board next to the map board at Port Isaac Pay & Display car park. This will be discussed at the February meeting.

Elections

Councillors were given leaflets entitled 'How to Stand for Election in 1987'.

Water on Road, Port Gaverne

County Highways have been discussing the problem with The National Trust since last year

to try and avoid icing of the road, which has now happened.

Planning

Mrs. M. Picken: erection of bungalow behind Trehaverock Cottage, St. Endellion. The Council made no observations.

M.J. & G.L. Wenden & Co: change of use from two lock-up shops to cafe/restaurant, 6 New Road, Port Isaac. The Council felt that yet another restaurant in the village was unnecessary. The N.C.D.C. car park was often full already and as it is in a 'no waiting' area, any new restaurant should provide private car parking.

We did not raise the slightest objection against the cottages themselves. The uproar and ensuing publicity caught us completely off guard. Having been confronted with rumours about ourselves which we were unable to tackle we are now glad to make use of Trio to give an account of our family.

There are six of us, Alexandra, myself, three boys, and a girl. We live in a village 15 miles south east of Munich. I am general manager in a printing and paper-making company. I am vice president of the Miesbach and Tewkesbury Twinning Association and also a member of the Rotary Club.
