

A report was given of the meeting on 18th. February with the Bishop of St. Germans.

Finance

With the need to make payments towards the building of the toilets at Port Gaverne in advance of money to come from N.C.D.C., the Council's funds have been severely reduced, and the final £200 of the precept is to be asked for. Good news is, however, that the N.C.D.C will grant an extra £400 for electricity and water for the toilets. The total cost of around £5000 is light compared with sums like £25,000 elsewhere.

Annual Parish Meeting

If numbers warranted it (and they usually did) more than one Class Leader would be appointed. These meetings have continued for well over 100 years, although in more recent times they became known as Prayer and Praise meetings.

The Tuesday Evening Fellowship came into being approximately 16 years ago, and is now not confined to those of the Methodist faith. In an endeavour to give our Christian faith a practical expression, the T.E.F. also raises funds to assist various charities, the most recent being the Famine Relief Appeal, the sum of £816 being sent to 'Save the Children' organisation. It is now felt desirable to personalise our giving, and we are hoping to arrange help for a particular area of need, details of which we will publicise if or when complete. Meanwhile may we please say 'thank you' to all who have so generously helped us in our charitable appeals.


