Chairman Mike Wenden thanked the proprietors of the venues of the three monthly meetings held -Port Gaverne Hotel, The Old School Hotel, and The Huntsman's Inn (Homer Park). The organisation can not be involved with advertising on a large scale, except in co-operation with the Publicity Councils and the Tourism Association of North Cornwall. Eric Stokes is compiling a publicity leaflet on behalf of the Association but this cannot be completed until every advertiser has paid. It is thought that it could be too costly to set up an Information Bureau but ideas are invited. The Park and Ride Scheme has not made much progress, a site, and a willing contractor are still needed. The capital outlay and licensing costs would be tremendous but the idea is not to be dropped. P.I.D.T.A. has protested to N.C.D.C. about the rise in parking fees. A new Parish Council notice board is to by installed at the car park with part of the cost being met by P.I.D.T.A. No replies have been received from the Fishing fraternity or Harbour Commissioners.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes taken at the monthly meeting, Church Room, Port Isaac, Monday 13th, April.

The whole Council was present.

Matters arising from the Minutes

Dr. Barron asked what the point was of last month's item concerning a listed building in disrepair. Clir. Dawe replied that he had been asked to bring the matter up.

Finance

Balance on deposit: £310.69, current a/c: £174.96. Less outgoings this month of £102.02 leaves £72.94. It was decided to precept £500 as it was now the new tinancial year and funds would be available from the 3p rate.

Toilets at Port Gaverne

With a final payment of £2,415 to be paid to the contractors when the money for this is received from N.C.D.C., the building will have cost £6,715, only £340 more than the original estimate. On top of this a payment of £405.16 (plus VAT which is reclaimable) is required by the National Trust who have provided the doors to their own specifications. As this price is for materials only, the Council is to ask for details. The N.C.D.C. has recommended extra lighting and automatic door closers. Mr. Symons asked whether this wouldn't mean the lights and extractor fans which work when the doors are closed, would be on all the time. Apparently N.C.D.C. had overlooked this point. The exterior signs are to be supplied by The National Trust to conform with the style of the existing ones. Cleaning materials, disinfectant, toilet rolls, etc. will be supplied, at cost, by N.C.D.C. Mr. Norris pointed out that with the Yale lock, the door would be locked if somebody slammed it shut. A padlock will have to be litted to secure the door in the open position. Arrangements are to be made for the door to be unlocked at 7.00am. and closed at 6.30 -7.00pm. Advertisements for a cleaner are to be displayed in the Parish.

Annual Parish Meeting

Final arrangements were discussed. Mrs. Richards expressed the hope that the lighting will be alright this year.

Tennis Court

Mrs. Cann reported that nobody had come forward to act as secretary. A £1.000 interest free loan had been received from a person in the village. The Youth Club who had originated the idea and who were expected to be one of the main users, had packed up. So, if the scheme doesn't get off the ground, all money in the bank account, plus any interest, will be paid back.

Footpath Trimming Tenders

Mr. Boiton proposed that the tenders be advertised for as usual. Seconded by Mrs. Barron and carried.

Broken Wall, Steps, Mayfield Road

Clir. Dawe reported that nothing had been done about the damage caused by a lorry using the right of way between Mayfield Road and Silvershell View about two years ago. N.C.D.C is to be asked to investigate.

Improvements to B.3314 Road

The work on the section of the road between Plain Street and St. Endellion is awaiting acquisition of land and funding and will probably take place in the year 1987/88.

Community Bus

The campaign for a bus has been revived following meetings with Oliver Baines of Cornwall Rural Community Council. A committee has been formed - Chair: Elsie Ferguson, Treasurer: Jackie Giles, Secretary: Jill McDonnell. David Giles of the Central Garage has agreed to garaging and maintenance. Mr. Provis reported that there is lots of enthusiasm for the scheme, 'These buses are good, I have been in them as lifeboat crew' he said. E1,200 will be needed for initial costs, insurance, etc. The cost of the vehicle coming from various outside sources. As there may be some re-allocation of existing buses in May, Port Isaac could have one by September/October. The matter is to be put on the Council's agenda for June when the information will be available.

Trunk Road Maintenance

A letter from County Highways warned that in luture owners or occupiers of land adjoining the A30, A38, and A39 will be responsible for trimming the hedges to maintain visibility. After a directive from the Department of Transport, the Highways Dept. will only be allowed to trim the verges.

Path, Council Houses, Hartland Road

Following a complaint about the path between the houses and the Co-op, the Environment Department is to be asked to do something about it.

Coin-operated Telescope

A suggestion that one of these could be installed in the car park is to be passed on to N.C.D.C. who own the park.

Coastal Footpath St. Illickswell Gug

The Council are not in favour of a proposed diversion order from the County Council to take the path along a new route. 'It would be a great pity to lose the old path' suid Chairman Mr. Cunningham. Mr. Symons asked whether it would be possible to retain both paths. Clir. Dawe said he would represent the Council's view at a meeting of the N.C.D.C. Environmental Committee where the matter was to be discussed.

Rubble on Cliff Footpath

Mr. Bolton said that while they were dealing with the St. Illickswell path, could something be done about the building rubble which had been dumped there, the Heritage Coast Officer had been informed about it but, so lar, nothing had happened.

Heritage Coast Work

The Heritage Coast Officer is to come to Port Gaverne to deal with the rock overhanging the footpath which leads onto The Main. As soon as permission is received from landowners, trees will be planted along the road to the sewage works behind Port Isaac.

Car Park Notice Board

The Port Isaac and District Tourist Association (P.I.D.T.A.) has agreed to pay their share of the cost of the new notice board. Mr. Welton proposed that this should go ahead, seconded by Clir. Dawe and carried. No trade or political advertisements are to be displayed. The board will be locked and keys held by P.I.D.T.A., Mrs. Willmott (Clerk to the Council), and Mr. Penna, 18 New Road.
