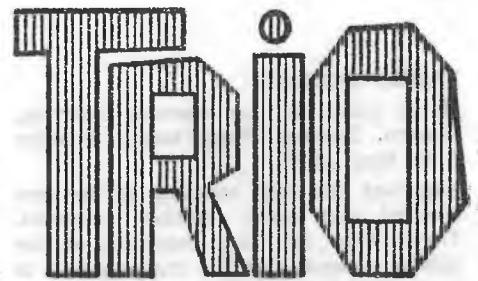
PARISH MAP

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes taken at the monthly meeting, Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 11th. May, 1987.

This was the first meeting of the new Council and every member attended. There were so many members of the public present that the meeting had to move into the main hall.

The Clerk, Mrs. Willmott, called for nominations for Chairman. Mrs. Cann was proposed by Mr. Bolton and seconded by Dr. Barron. She accepted the post and was elected nem. con.

She thanked the Council for showing their confidence and for the honour. She recognised the service given by Mr. Dawe over the years and welcomed the new District Councillor, Mr. Symons. She greeted old, and welcomed new members of the Parish Council.

Messrs. Dawe, Norris, and Symons were nominated as Vice Chairman, Mr. Dawe found no seconder, Mr. Norris declined, and Mr. Symons then accepted the post. Dr. Barron and Mr. Welton were proposed for Treasurer, Mr. Welton declined and Dr. Barron accepted.

Other posts were filled - Playing Fields Committee: Mrs. Trickett, and Messrs. Bolton and Dawe, Village Hall Representative: Mr. Welton, Emergency Committee: Mr. Bolton, Assoc. Local Councils: Messrs. Symons, Bolton, and Welton, Local Tourist Committee: Mrs. Trickett, P.I.D.T.A: Mr. Stokes, Trelights Village Green: Messrs. Barriball and Dawe, Mr. Stokes was appointed Voluntary Hospital Car Service Organiser. He appealed for more drivers.

St. Endellion Churchyard

The £350 payment was authorised as agreed at the March meeting.

Port Gaverne Toilets

A tender in the sum of £450 for cleaning the toilets, commencing 1st. May this year, was accepted from Homecare Services. The first half will be paid in the middle of the season and the second half at the end. The toilets are to be opened between 7.30 and 8.30am. and closed at 6.30 - 7.30pm. They will be cleaned once per day. Mr. Norris expressed concern that some cubicles were not screened from view when the door was open. N.C.D.C. will be asked to advise and also on a warning system for use by disabled people. Mr. Welton asked if full accounts could be produced at the next meeting.

Footpath Clearing

Tenders accepted: Mr. Watson, path - Church Hill to Mill - £40. J. Dawe (Mr. Dawe declared interest) - rest of paths and trimming round seats - £280. The question of the Port Gaverne Valley path ending at Pendoggett Farm is to be raised with N.C.D.C. again, but the last part of the path is St. Kew Parish.

Repairs to Pump, Middle Street

The condition of the pump is to be inspected and tenders sought for repairs.

Poltreworgy Hill

Mud on the road still causing danger, a letter to be sent to Mr. Hawken.

Fence at Garrick (Playing Fields)

Owners are responsible for fencing their own property - no further action.

School Bus, Trelights

The possibility of sending the school bus into Trelights is being considered by the County Education Authority.

Trees

A grant, in connection with National Tree Week, November/December, will be applied for.

Licence Transfer

Cliff Path

A letter from Mr. Hoskin was read out, detailing the dangers and problems that could arise if this beautiful path were to become an asphalted access road. More information will be sought by the Parish Council before taking any action.

Planning Applications

Extension at rear of dwelling, plot 9, Marshall's Way, Trelights: the Council made no observations.

Change of use, farm building to dwelling, Mr. May, Port Gaverne: the Council made no observations.

Extension at Old School Hotel for use as 'Interpretation Centre': very strong objections to flat roof in Conservation Area, also to changing outside appearance of the old building.

Erection of House in Middle Street, J. Brown (Lewis): no other observations except that visible walls should be solid stone, slate roof, correct windows, etc.

Public Discussion

Mr. A'Court said all the trees planted at 'The Barton' have died. He was also worried about the dangerous opening from Marshall's Way onto the road. Mrs. Pethick mentioned the high speed of traffic on the road.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The meeting was held at St. Peter's Church Hall on Thursday 23rd. April. John Cunningham welcomed a large assembly of people and introduced the guest speakers. He then touched on many of the topics discussed by the Parish Council during the year: Hospital Car Service, Community Bus, Village Hall, Port Gaverne Toilets, P.I.D.T.A., Poltreworgey Hill, Cartway Cove, Spider Crab Loading, Cliff Path, Street Lights, Conservation Document, Tree Planting, Christmas Lights, and the Butter and Cheese Distribution.

County Cllr. Harvey Lander spoke about increasing needs of the ratepayers who were getting good value for money in the face of detailed financial restraints from central government. He pointed out that all parties fighting this year's election will have policies on local government finance. A County Council limited special review of rights of way will be held this year so that all parishes can be brought up to date as soon as funds are available.

Forward Planning Officer, Mr. Pendleton gave a lot of detail with reference to the Conservation Scheme and the possibility of an Article IV Order. If it is necessary to implement such an order all planning rights would be withdrawn and planning consent needed for all development. The District Council are hoping that residents of Port Isaac Conservation Area will voluntarily follow the code of practice. If many examples of bad development occur then they will have to re-consider the Order.

Councillor Facks-Martin underlined the need for conservation measures and decried some of the glaring examples of bad design. A lot of fuss was made about the car port on Rose Hill but not enough about things elsewhere. He also spoke about the generous District Council financial support for the Port Gaverne toilets.

Councillor Dawe spoke about the Christmas Lights at Trelights, the Bus Shelter, B.3314 Road Improvements, the need for a 30m.p.h. limit in Trelights, the possibility of Council Houses and/or Rural Workshops on new land, Undermining of Port Gaverne Hill, New

Coastal Footpath (danger spots), and the Community Bus. He also added that he thought that the Article IV Order should be imposed immediately.

Sgt. David LeBailly reported on crime in the Parish and said that thefts from boats, and of marine equipment, was on the increase. Antiques 'knockers' going to houses were to be guarded against. He added that credit cards should not be kept with cheque books to reduce the risk of

He added that credit cards and cheque books should not be kept together in case of theft. The Wadebridge Police Sub-Station will be open all the year round, Mon - Fri, 9 - 5, and will be manned by Mr. Peter Skeats.

During 'questions from the floor' Mrs. Brown expressed disgust at the speed of cars driving through Trelights. Mr. Hoskin spoke about the lack of conservation and hoped for a better District Councillor after the elections. Mrs. Cann asked about the possibility of money to provide transport for the school children when they go swimming. There was applause at this. Cllr. Harvey Lander said the matter should be put before the Education Committee. Mr. Tayar suggested 'sleeping policemen' on the cliff path, if it became a vehicle road, to restrict speeding. He also complained about rubbish piled up on the Platt. Mr. Rotherham asked why the school buses can't go into Trelights, and asked for this to be looked into by the Parish Council. In reply to a question by Mr. Symons about the 'Tourism Restraint Area' Mr. Facks-Martin said that the idea is to attract visitors who appreciate the locality as it is and would not like to see caravan parks, etc. Mr. Orchard asked what would happen to the seats on the Cliff Path if it became a road. Mr. Fisher asked the police to take more action against cars causing obstructions in Fore Street.

LETTER

Dear Sir, Most of our residents are aware of the objections to the suggested desecration of our Cliff Path. It would amount to the loss of the only place in the Port where old people, children, and visitors can enjoy freedom from traffic, noise, and have the ability to sit and view the entire coastline. Our descendants will never forgive us if we forfeit this lovely spot, nor will the thousands of visitors who come annually. There were many objections at the time when the other houses were built - and all but one remain empty for about eleven months of the year. I wonder if the intention might be to fence off the cliff path in order to avoid the hazard created by traffic, which will obviously include yobs on motor cycles. Incidentally, the proposed buildings are inside the conservation area, and there will also be the possibility of planning applications for the land between them and the Old Vicarage. Finally, who will pay for any alterations to the existing path and right of way? You and I - the ratepayers - to satisfy three suggested householders.

I have appealed by letter to The Heritage Coast Officer, County Cllr. Harvey Lander, Chairman N.C.D.C., Chairman Environmental Services Committee, Chairman of St. Endellion P.C., District Planning Officer, and the Western Morning News and Cornish Guardian.

I sincerely hope that those of us who love our Port will also attempt to take some action before it is too late.
