PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the monthly meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 8th. June.

Apologies were received from Clir. Henry Symons, and Mr. Eric Stokes.

Dr. Barron asked for the matter of Tree Grants to be put on next month's agenda.

Finance

After expenses have been paid, there is a balance of £534 in the current a/c and £1,323.34 on deposit. It was decided to donate £75 to Trio again this year. The War Memorial donation would also stay at E65 as last year. A E5 subscription to Port Isaac & District Tourism Asssociation was paid.

Footpath Clearing

Parish Councillors were appointed to check the work on selected paths.

Minepit Corner, Back Hill

The work to improve the appearance of the corner and the old pump will be done by a Manpower Services scheme, and they are to be asked to make suggestions and provide a costing.

Coastal Footpath Wall

The capping stones, put on top of the wall to prevent children walking along it, are being deliberately removed by vandals. Tenders are to be sought to renew the capping with a better grade of cement, possibly using a triangular profile which would obviate the need for the stones.

Coastal Footpath

A letter from Mr. Hoskins to M.P. Gerry Neale, asking for him to act in protection of the cliff path which is to be used as an access road, was read out. A reply from Mr. Neale to the effect that he has asked the Council to ensure that all relevant points are taken into account was also read out.

The Clerk reported that the Parish Council's enquiry about claiming ownership of the path was being considered by the legal department at County Hall.

Cliff Frasion

Refuse tipping, from the cliff footpath near Cliff Cottage is the cause of undermining and a threat to the stability of the cliff. After a meeting at the site between Clir. Henry Symons, Mr. Harold Brown, and Mr. Pyman from the North Cornwall District Council, it was decided to refer the matter to Cornwall County Highways and to the Environ-mental Department so that any work necessary could be included in next year's financial budget.

Footpath to St. Blickswell Gug

The Parish Council agreed to proposals to officially divert the old footpath across the cliff tops beyond Port Gaverne. The former route across fields will be transferred to the path behind 'Grammer's Chair', around the point to Weishman's Quarry, and down to the floor of the valley at St. Illickswell Gug. Steps will be provided on the steep place leading up to the old path.

Donkey Derby

Permission was given for this event to be held at the Playing Fields in August.

Plaque 'Narrowest Street . . . '

A suggestion from Mr. Wesley Blake that a small plaque denoting Temple Bar as the narrowest alley in the world could be put up was met with total opposition. It would set a precedent for other plates to be put up, and the alley was mentioned in all guides anyway.

Flower Festival

Unfortunately the Council did not get enough notice of this event so that it was impossible for anyone to prepare an exhibit for the Methodist Church.

30 m.p.h. Speed Limit - Trelights

Despite local reports that people drive through the village at 'terrible Speeds', the authorities think it unlikely that the necessary 'criteria' for a speed limit exist. Chairman Mrs. Cann said that individuals must write letters to County Councillor Harvey Lander, North Cornwall District Council, and M.P. Gerry Neale. Meanwhile it was suggested that 'Please drive slowly through the village' notices could be put on the village nameplates. Mr. Dawe proposed that another attempt be made to get the speed limit. This was seconded by Mr. Barriball and carried.

Yellow Lines by the Surgery

The matter of a no-waiting restriction at the juntion of Tintagel Terrace and Hartland Road has been under discussion since 1983. Objections have been raised to the latest proposals which are thought to be too extensive. It is also felt that it would make it difficult for patients visiting the surgery. If a reply is received from the authorities in time, the matter will be discussed at next month's meeting.

Suggestions from the Community

Mrs. Eileen Trickett presented some suggestions from members of the community: Refuse sacks for Elderly People (They should ask N.C.D.C. for these) Bottle Bank (This was thought likely tocause too many problems); One-Way System Through the Village (Round-trip distance about 5 miles - too far); Seats for Old Age Pensioners (No suitable sites); 'Port Isaac Welcomes Careful Drivers' Sign (Already a 30m.p.h. limit); Flowers Supplied by N.C.D.C. (They would never pay for this, and there are already private hanging baskets, etc., tended by their owners and so less susceptible to vandalism). Trips to Port Quin and Padstow were thought to be a matter for boat-owners rather than the Parish Council. The Highways Dept. are to be asked to consider advance '61t. width' signs to prevent difficulties at the foot of Church Hill.

School Meeting

Mrs. Cann reported that Port Isaac was one of only two places where sufficient parents had turned up at the school Annual Meeting to provide the minimum 20% attendance required for approval of the curriculum. She will provide a report at the next meeting but added that she thought that Mr. Bruce gave very good reports in Trio.

Verge Trimming

The County Council are trimming for visibility only, not for amenity, as there is only enough money for this. Favourable comments were made about the appearance of Trewetha verges which had been trimmed by the Phelps family.

Rose Hill

Damage to the surface caused by heavy vehicles to be reported to the County Highways Dept.

Seat - Trewetha Lane/Rose Hill

Proof of ownership to be asked for before considering a request for rent,

Port Gaverne - Conservation Area?

A request from Mr. Stokes to put this item on next month's agenda on behalf of Port Isaac & District Tourism Assoc.

Gypsies

In reply to the annual enquiry from N.C.D.C., it was reported that no gypsies have camped in the parish.

Pleaseding Applications

Nr. A. Wild - Porch/Conservatory, SI Fore Street. The Council were in favour provided Conservation Area recommendations were followed.

Mr. C. J. Gregory, Trecreege - Change of use existing barn and outbuildings to residential accommodation and garages. Also vehicular access. The Council felt it better to renovate the buildings this way than to allow them to fall into disrepair. Mr. Gregory intends to keep 20 acres for himself and allow 30 acres to be used for gardens and recreation.

Mr. & Mrs. H. Symons - Extension to 'Myrtle Grove', St. Endellion. This is now to be a listed building so the idea is approved of providing listed building requirements are followed.

13 Building Plots, Trelights Village this proposal was not supported by the Council as it was felt to be 'overdevelopment'. It was also felt that existing drainage problems would be increased.

The Parish Council asked the public to leave as a tender for replacing the seat by the phone box at Mayfield was to be discussed.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, at 7.30pm. on Monday 10th. August.





LETTERS

Dear Sir, I wrote to Trio in May concerning the intended use of our cliff path as the access road to the new houses to be built there. I have also written to many officals, and people in authority. Now, in response to your item last month I should like to give readers an idea of the sort of response I have received. The Chairman of North Cornwall District Council says the points regarding access to the site were carefully considered by the Planning and Development Committee, and from research of the car park deeds 'it would appear that the access road is still in the ownership of the original estate with rights of passage having been granted to subsequent purchasers of land served by the road'. As for possible conflict between vehicles and pedestrians, and general detriment to the area caused by motor vehicles, 'the Planning Committee did not consider these objections of sufficient weight to warrant refusal of the application'.

I leave it to readers to judge for themselves. It would 'appear' that the road is still in the ownership ... do they know who it belongs to or don't they? I hope 'general detriment' includes the possible destruction of the path's surface by large building lorries, cement lorries, etc. As for conflict between pedestrians and vehicles ... need I say more? No doubt the village will wait until the bulldozers actually






