A report compiled from notes taken during the monthly meeting held at the Methodist Chapel, Trelights, on Monday 12th. October.

Tree Grants

A meeting on Wednesday 14th. October to discuss possible sites.

Toilets, Port Gaverne

National Trust has advised that loose chippings on path can be swept away now that the concrete has set.

Telephone Kiosk, Fore Street

British Telecom to investigate the possibility of an extra kiosk at Port Isaac Post Office.

Footpath, Port Gaverne Valley

Path from third stile to sleeper bridge reported to be in terrible condition -'mud, water, cattle, etc.' Something will have to be done before next year.

Seat - Trewetha Lane / Rose Hill

Mr. Godfrey to be asked what rent he would accept for the seat on his land.

Fence, Port Quin Coastal Path

The barbed wire on the fence, which is Mr. Sloman's responsibility according to the County Council, is not thought to be dangerous but councillors were asked to go and have a look and report back at the next meeting.

Minepit Corner

The sketch has been passed to the Community Agency who feel that some of the work might be beyond Manpower Services labour. However, an estimate of materials cost to be requested.

Beach Pollution

This will be fully discussed at the next meeting by Cllr. Symons, when some photographs will be available. M.P. Gerry Neale is concerned and making contact with the South West Water Authority about it. The National Trust have suggested that local volunteers could be asked to clean the beaches. Cllr. Symons said 'Ask any fisherman he will tell you that the sea is full of rubbish.' 75% had foreign wording on it.

Coastal Footpath, Port Isaac

According to the Cornwall County Council Coastal Footpath Officer, the contractors will have to be informed if any damage is being done to the path. So far, however, there is no damage to speak of. Mr. Dawe said 'I've taken a lot of stick from people over this but they'll get it back from me later on.' Mr. Bolton said all the work Jack Hoskins has put in to save our footpath has been wasted.

Gates at Playing Field

Permission was originally given for the fish lorry to use the car space on the understanding that it would call about four times a year, not every week. The gates have suffered possibly as a result. The cost of replacing them would be beyond the means of the Council and, after an estimate has been obtained, the fishermen are to be asked if they would contribute towards the cost.

Yellow Lines by the Surgery

Cornwall County Council to consider objections received but North Cornwall District Council have already decided not to go ahead as scheme much larger than Parish Council originally asked for.

Tree Preservation Order, Trelights

Only three trees (all chestnuts: in Trewithick Hill, between 'St. Ian' and 'Watergates', and opposite triangle at Post Office), plus the group past the chapel, are subject to a preservation order. The maple at the entrance to Furze Park is unhealthy and has been deleted from the list.

Tourism Association

Clir. Symons urged everybody involved with tourism to attend the open meeting on 21st. October. 'Tourism is a major factor in the economy of the parish and we have to raise our standards,' he said.

Uncontrolled Dogs

Two letters were read concerning the dogs roaming at will around the village and how you 'have to look down instead of looking at the scenery'. More signs are to be put up to inform owners.

Planning Applications


Erection of extension to provide indoor swimming pool, Treore Farm: no observations to be made.

Erection of flat roof extension to use as en-suite bathroom, Hathaway, Roscarrock Hill: Mr. Stokes reported that the work had already been started but that the flat roof can't be seen from the harbour or from the road - only from the field behind the house. It was also in line with an existing flat roof. No other observations were made.

Open Discussion

Mr. Bolton suggested that a coat of undercoat be applied to the seats before the winter, with the top coat in the spring. To be discussed next month.

Mrs. Brown asked where the trees in Trelights would be planted. Mrs. Cann, Chair, suggested that people interested could contact their parish council rep-



resentatives. A rough plan would be put on the board at the Post Office.

It was also mentioned that Trebetherick had an allocation of ten trees each year recently and that some of these were planted on private land where they were tended by the landowners.

Mr. Lobb asked why there is so much fuss being made because 'three local boys' are building bungalows on the cliff at Port Isaac when there was no fuss made years ago when the existing houses were built. Mr. Bolton replied that there had been a fuss.

Mr. A'Court asked the Parish Council to do something about the road from Trelights Post Office up to the new estate which was 'a dangerous mess'. He felt that direct 'public relations' between the Council and the developers could be tried. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

Mrs. Brown made a plea in support of a school bus for Trelights. There had been an incident involving a child in one of the lanes and she felt that the children should not have to walk along them.

PORT ISAAC AND DISTRICT TOURISM ASSOCIATION

There was an encouraging attendance at the 'Where Do We Go From Here?!' meeting in spite of the bad weather. Chairman Mike Wenden told us that the Advertising Leaflet is being printed and will soon be available for distribution. He also spoke about the work of the local publicity councils, and attempts to get free car-parking.

Christopher Wikeley, West Country Tourist Board, gave a valuable talk on the need to raise accommodation standards and of the scheme to inspect selfcatering properties to award 'Crowns' denoting the standard of quality. He felt that this scheme will be more thorough than those of the AA and RAC which are really only intended for their members. Cleanliness, comfort, and certain facilities would be insisted on plus fire and public liability insurance. He also spoke of the possibility of getting help for the Port Isaac district. He was amazed to learn that the maximum budget P.I.D.T.A. could hope for, based on a £50 subscription from each business, would only be £2,800 - too little for any really effective promotion, but it might be worth considering the possibility of some form of mailing. Mrs. Betty Palmer from Wadebridge presented figures for North Cornwall Coastal car parks showing the downward trend in the number of vehicles using them.

The Heritage Coast Interpretation Centre at the Old School Hotel will open for Easter next year if all goes to plan. This will also be available for local information if volunteers can be found to run the service.

Mr. Corrigan said that the National Jet-Ski Race at Port Gaverne had done a lot to boost business and that perhaps we should try and attract more organisations of this kind.

There was an opportunity after the meeting for proprietors of all types of business to talk to one another and much discussion took place over coffee and biscuits.

P.I.D.T.A. is trying to build up information about local facilities. A questionnaire asking for accommodation details has been drawn up and we will try and get round to everybody with it. It would, however, be a great help if hotel, guest house, and B & B owners would volunteer details of their accommodation. There will be no charge for this. It is also hoped to do the same for self-catering properties but it is often difficult to discover who the owners or agents are. The lists compiled will be very useful in answering enquiries from would-be visitors to Port Isaac.

ALL ABOUT TRIO

This newsletter was established in April 1982 to provide a free means of communication that could be used, without religious, political, or other discrimination by everybody in Port Isaac, Port Gaverne, Trelights, and the outlying farms and hamlets in the parish. There have been at least eleven issues every year and we have now reached no. 621 It is not a newspaper and there are no reporters snooping around for news, instead, we rely on you to supply nearly every item published. There are no fees for including your news items, reports, announcements, 'thank you' messages, letters, etc. but to cover the cost of paper, ink, and printing, we make charges for the advertisements. The current rate is £1.40 per single column 'unit' per month (there are 11 'units' in each column) and 5p. per word for 'classified' advertisements. Fred Thompson is in charge of advertisement bookings (telephone 880292). We have to insist that all payments are made in advance as we have no 'staff' to do invoicing or the chasing up of payments. Hitherto the newsletter has kindly been distributed free of any charge by our three newsagents, but we at Trio have now decided to make a nominal charge of 10p per copy, starting with next January's issue. This will, however, give you the chance to order the newsletter in advance and make sure that you get a copy. The postal subscription will be increased at the same time to £3.30 per year. These charges are to help with the steadily rising costs of production without leaning more heavily on our advertisers. We would like to point out that, whereas The Blackthorn Press gets paid for the actual printing of the newsletter, the time-consuming work of typewriting, compilation and page make-up is not charged for.
