A report compiled from notes taken during the monthly meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 9th. November.

Toilets at Port Gaverne

Conservation Meeting

Clir. Symons reported on a meeting where representatives from various organisations spoke about the need to conserve the countryside, improve footpaths, and increase awareness of the unique archaeology and wild life in Cornwall. He also reported that the Heritage Coast area is to be enlarged. Finance

It was decided to precept for £1,000 of the £1,800 left, to meet expenditure. No details have been received from the National Trust, requested in April, regarding the cost of materials for the doors at Port Gaverne toilets so this payment is to be held over.

Tree Grants

Sites have been chose for the planting of trees alongside certain roads (for which a licence from the Highway Authority will be needed), in the playing fields and at Trelights.

Seat - Trewetha Lane / Rose Hill

It was suggested that Mr. Godfrey might accept a nominal rent of L1 per annum for the use of his land.

Gates at Playing Fields

It was announced that it would cost in the region of £400 to replace these but further quotations are to be sought for some kind of gate that cannot be removed. The fishermen may not be asked to help with the payment as they might then consider they had a permanent right to use the parking space.

Seats to be painted

At least a cout of undercoat is to be applied to many seats to protect them during the winter. It was thought that they are too wet at present for painting with gloss paint.

Telephone Kiosk, Fore Street

British Telecom have offered to install two of the modern kiosks at Little Hill

but would want to remove the existing one in Church Hill at the same time. It was therefore decided to leave the matter for the present and to inform B.T. that the Council would prefer to keep the old type of kiosk in the Port Isaac Conservation Area.

Steps on Cliff Path

Mr. Bolton expressed dismay at the new granite steps which would make it impossible for people in wheelchairs to use the path. A concrete ramp to one side of the path is to be considered.

Christmas Lights

A vote of seven in favour decided that Port Isaac would receive £75 and Trelights £40 towards the cost of their lights. Both schemes are to be extended this year. Mr. Dawe congratulated Mr. Stokes and the people of the village on last year's effort.

Trees - Trelights Farmhouse

In a letter, the Farmhouse Committee said that the old conifers need to be felled before they become dangerous. The Council agreed to this but asked that they be replaced.

Gate on Cliff Path

Mrs. Cann had complained that a gate in the fence of the Port Isaac coast path had been padlocked but it was explained that the land above the cliffs was private and that the landowner was responsible for the public's safety.

Planning Applications

Mr. A. R. Newton, Tregole, Trelights: Change of use of Agricultural Dwelling. As the occupants now have only 3 acres of land, the Council agreed the application.

New House on site of garage/store, Middle Street, Port Isaac. The plans indicate that the height of the eaves will be approximately the same as 'The Pump' so, apart from a reminder about the Conservation Area, the Council made no observations.

Car Park Charges

The question of charges for the car park at Port Isaac was raised during the 'public discussion'. It was felt that these are too high and a suggestion is to be made to the District Council that meters are installed which will give an hourly as well as a daily rate. Members of the public were urged to write individually to the authorities as well.

P.I.D.T.A.

Clir. Symons, as Parish Council representative to the Port Isaac & District Tourism Association, gave a report on an 'exceptionally good meeting' at the Church Rooms in October.

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, at 7.30pm. on Monday 14th. December.


a. It is most unlikely that British Telecom would install an 'in-keeping' Victorian telephone booth, certainly nothing else would do.



However, imagine my dismay when on the morning of the 14th. September, to my amazement, the trees had been cut off at about six feet from ground level. All that was left were bare trunks some nine inches in diameter. I was thus deprived of the usefulness of their presence.

Enquiry disclosed that a visitor residing in part of the above-mentioned bungalow had been responsible for the actual cutting which could not, of course, have been done without the knowledge of the other residents therein.

This seems to be a very personal case of vandalism of a serious degree, as, unlike some acts of vandalism, this cannot be rectified within the lifetime of the owner.

My protest to the person concerned resulted in considerable insults and abuse, without one word of apology.




