#### LIFEBOAT

On March 25th, the annual Art Exhibition at Port Gaverne Hotel was opened by BBC Spotlight News presenter Jill Dando. A number of pictures were sold on the packed opening night; the total raised, which looks like being a record, will be announced in the next issue.

The lifeboat was launched on the afternoon of Sunday 3rd. April when two people were reported cut off by the tide at Merlin's Cave, Tintagel. They managed to swim to safety just before the lifeboat reached the spot.

Later the same day, crewed by Andy Walton, John Coshall, and Bob Young, the lifeboat was launched to help holiday maker Miss Alex Lawrence who had fallen some 20 feet down the cliff near Polzeath. The crew took her to Daymer Bay where she was examined by Dr. James Lunny (Port Isaac Lifeboat Station Medical Officer) who took her for treatment for multiple cuts and abrasions. Before leaving the scene, the crew was approached by an anxious parent whose three sons were out in a dinghy and overdue. They were found safe and well, and the parent notified. On Tuesday 5th. April the lifeboat stood by at Port Quin while two persons were rescued from the rocks.
