

On the evening of 6th. August, the lifeboat was launched after two divers were reported to be in trouble off Penhallic Point. The 'casualties' turned out objects in the water.

On Monday 8th. August, just after noon, crew members Andy Walton, Richard Hambly, and John Collins were preparing to leave the harbour on exercise to assist at the Lifeboat Day at Padstow, when a canoeist capsized near the harbour entrance. The young holiday maker was brought safely ashore. The crew then departed for Padstow, and had reached the Camel estuary, when they were called back to assist two young children in a rubber dinghy, being blown out to sea at Port Gaverne. The lifeboat had reached Port Quin when they received a report that the children had been brought to safety by swimmers at the scene. Once again the crew proceeded towards Padstow and, in the Camel estuary, found a capsized catamaran with two people aboard. The crew satisfied themselves that the casulaties were not hurt, and assisted them to right the catamaran before continuing to Padstow. Having completed their visit; they returned to Port Isaac, arriving at 5.30pm. John Scott.

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public at the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac on Monday 8th. August.

<u>Please take note:</u> This is a record of matters discussed in open meeting by the parish council. It is not an editorial news report or commentary.

School Bus, Trelights

Mrs. Cann reported that if, after the first week of term, there were insufficient seats in the school taxi (cost per child £16 per term) Bodmin Education Office would make arrangements to provide a larger taxi or a minibus, if notified.

Minepit Corner

No estimate has yet been received from the contractor asked to tender but weeds etc. to be cleared as part of 'footpath clearance' work.

Port Gaverne Quay

Mr. Sweet started work but had to stop again due to the incoming tide.

Finance

With £3,200 already precepted of the total of approx. £4,800 available to the parish council in the financial year, expenditure on the toilets at Port Gaverne, repairing the playing field equipment, footpath clearance, painting seats, repairs to the quay at Port Gaverne, and the cost of two by-elections (possibly £1,000) the council is going to be very short of money for the rest of the year.

Water Pollution Problem

Members of the council were invited to a meeting with Dr. Lawrence of South West Water Authority. Lack of communication with the public at the time of the problem was the main criticism raised.

Parking, New Road

The Police, and the Highways Dept., are to receive notice that people park just within the restricted zone thinking that the 'Zone Ends' sign refers to the yellow lines beyond

it. Another small sign is to be asked for at this position.

Footpath Management

The County Surveyor is asking the council to make decisions on proposals outlined at a recent meeting in connection with the management and development of Public Rights of Way. These will be presented at the next meeting of the parish council.

Footpaths, Port Gaverne Valley

Mr. Bolton reported that he had received a strong complaint from Dr. Baird about the waterlogged condition of the path. A meeting about this, however, has already been requested by the County Surveyor and members of the council will attend. Efforts are to be made to discover exactly who the owners are of each piece of land the paths run over.

St. Endellion Churchyard

The St. Endellion P.C.C. were surprised to receive the complaint about the condition of the church-yard as they have been getting some very favourable comments. Due to a broken strimmer, however, some work could not be done for a time and this may have given rise to the complaint. An application is to be made to have curb stones removed from graves to facilitate grass cutting.

Trelights Barbecue

Permission was granted for the Village Green committee at Trelights to hold a barbecue on the green on Wednesday 17th. August.

Footpath Clearance

Mr. Stokes reported that all the paths he was responsible for inspecting had been cleared, including the one from Church Hill to the mill.

Donation to Trio

A letter of thanks was received from Mr. Thompson, Hon. Treasurer.

Wadebridge Swimming Pool

The council signed a petition (also circulated to members of the public) from W.A.S.P., urging for a covered pool at the sports centre.

Port Gaverne Toilets

Three young people are known to be responsible for blocking the toilet waste pipes but this cannot be proved. The toilets had to be closed and a sign put up 'vandalised'. The police are to be consulted.

Planning Applications:

Change of use - two commercial premises to residential flats, Hoppett

House, New Road: This will not involve any external alterations so no observations were made. It was pointed out that the short season in Port Isaac does not attract businesses to the village.

Erection of two bungalows - Trelights: This item received a lot of discussion as it was felt that the village is becoming over-developed also that the access road to Furze Park which would be used by these bungalows was not up to County Council standards and it the council made observations against the application.

Change of use and erection of extension to form 3 self-contained flats - The Folly, Roscarrock Hill: There was opposition to a flat roof on the stairway extension and to the provision of parking for six cars in front of the building.

Erection of one bungalow - Trelights: As outline permission had been granted previously and the appearance met with approval, no observations were recorded.

Public Discussion

Mr. Penna asked the parish council not to forget that Port Isaac still needed more car parking. At this time of year many people arriving here cannot park anywhere and have to drive away again.

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 12th. September, at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

TELEVISION LINE SHUT-DOWN

Whilst staying in Port Isaac, I read in Trio that the TV relay was to be closed down and I thought the following might be of interest.

It began in August 1959 with a jammed camera, in the Pixie Shop, owned at that time by Mrs. Lansdowne. My then husband volunteered to try and free it, and did. Asked what he did by trade, he replied 'Radio and TV engineer'. Apparently reception was poor down in the village, and he was asked if he could do anything to help. On returning home, he contacted Belling-Lee Aerials, and his TV suppliers, and arranged a demonstration for October which took place in the Sunday School room in the Wesley Chapel. This proved successful. In November. we were back in Port Isaac, and work began. Two local men, (Richard Derbyshire was one sorry I can't recall the other's name) were employed, and began to dig a channel above Church Hill to take the cable which was then taken from house to house. February/March 1960 saw the erection of the aerial. which took place in driving rain and gale force winds. I returned home in April and my husband, who became known as 'Telly-Don' (and who is still alive and well), stayed on, lodging with the late Alice Masters in Dolphin Street. When the relay was completed, everyone was delighted with the reception and, eventually, the system was sold to Powells of Wadebridge. The cost of buying a television on hire-purchase at that time was 3/6 [172p] per week! Having been in on the start, it was pure chance I was in 'Port' for the shut down. Pearl D'Alvarez.

Music Festival Celebrates

30th. Anniversary

The Music Festival celebrated its 30th. Anniversary with a marvellous series of concerts, culminating in the world premiere of a new work by John Tavener, 'The Ikon of St. Seraphim' specially commissioned for the Festival and conducted by internationally known conductor Richard Hickox.

From humble beginnings in 1958 with a handful of music lovers inspired by Roger Gaunt, the Festival has grown steadily in stature and strength, attracting singers and musicians of the highest quality, yet still maintaining its original vision of music offered to the glory of God in a place hallowed by centuries of prayer.

After a pre-concert discussion of the new work 'The Ikon of St. Seraphim' between the composer and conductor, a presentation was made to Roger Gaunt, the founder of the Festival, and who had been closely associated with it for its first fifteen years, by Robert Gilchrist, also a founder member.

The 'Ikon', a work of profound spiritual significance was received with great enthusiasm by the packed audience, as was Beethoven's Ninth Symphony which followed. This 30th. Anniversary Concert was repeated before a very large audience in Truro Cathedral the following evening.

Tintagel. Each evening the church

August provided a triumphant conclusion to another highly successful
Festival. Works included Mozart's
'Haffner' Symphony, the Mendelssohn
Violin Concerto, with soloist Simon
Fischer, and Finzi's moving choral
composition on Wordsworth's famous

poem 'Intimations of Immortality'. Each evening's performance was followed by the late evening service of Compline and the Festival ended as it had begun in a service of worship attended by performers, audience, and parishioners. Celebrant at the sung Eucharist was the Rector, assisted by Revd. Evelyn Dunford and Revd. Canon Ken Rogers, Rector of Bodmin, who was the preacher. Organist was Richard Hickox.




