

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meetings held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, Monday 12th. December and Monday 9th. January.

December Meeting (abridged):

Mr Stokes said since several contractors are involved it is impossible to tell which ones gave rise the Cliff Footpath complaints.

N.C.D.C.don't want the car park used for crab pots as they will be resurfacing it during the winter.

Cllr. Symons said N.C.D.C. would clean Port Gaverne toilets for about £150, they might also be able to open them in the mornings.

Finance

Reimbursements from County Highways for footpath work, have improved finances. Estimated expenditure (cliff footpath wall, playing field gateposts, Port Gaverne toilets, and St. Endellion churchyard) mean a 4.5p parish rate will be requested (lp brings income of £1302).

School Governors Report

Mrs. Cann, new Chairman of the Board of Governors explained the system by which governors are elected: one is appointed by the Parish Council, two are elected by parent ballot, two are co-opted by the previous governors, two are appointed by County Council from a list of recommendations, two teachers (including headmaster). They need not have children at school and presently are expected to serve a term of four years.

Notice Boards

The glass has been re-fitted at the car park. Some of the other boards need new pin-boards. Mr. Stokes offered to look at the boards and advise on a more suitable material.

Descriptive Sign at B.3314

A request from Port Isaac and District Tourism Association for 'Historic Fishing Village' to be added to the 'Port Isaac' signs was felt to be a good idea. Mr. Phelps said it would be better to have just one sign, including this wording, instead of the present jumble.

Fouling by Dogs

Mr. Stokes reported complaints and had been shown 17 messes in Middle Street. Dogs are not supposed to roam the streets so the police should be told. Dog owners show no sympathy. Notices are to be put up. Councillors feel that owners should collect the messes in plastic bags and take them home. Cllr. Symons will ask if N.C.D.C. has wardens.

Preservation of Old Telephone Boxes English Heritage is to submit, to the D of E, 1000 applications for listing 'K6 Kiosks', from 4000 received so far. They have been contacted and all other interested parties, e.g. P.I.D.T.A., should support the idea. Mr. Norris said perhaps the Council should reconsider the 'Phonewatch' scheme.

Mrs. Cann congratulated Mr. Stokes and his team on the Christmas lights in the village this year.

Clerk's Correspondence

Cllr. Symons said County Highways is to look at the general situation.

No further action is proposed at the B. 3314 Trelights road junction.

Mr. Phelps said the pothole between the garages is a 'bottomless pit' and could be a fault in the ground.

It is proposed to divert footpath no. 7 along the side of the B.3267 to skirt the building development 'Bodannon Bungalow'.

Difficulties were reported from an allegation by the landowner that there is no footpath (no. 3) at Brooklands Farm, Port Gaverne.

Mrs. Cann investigated the Public Information Act ruling, following a complaint that Mr. Phelps spoke independently at a Trelights site meeting where he was a representative of the Parish Council. Any member of the public may attend a site meeting and have their say so Mr. Phelps was also entitled to speak as an individual.

Planning Applications

K.C.Richards - Bodannon Bungalow - extension. The plans did not indicate the existing building and clarification is to be sought.

E.Donnithorne - outline plans - split-level bungalow and private garage, in Port Isaac valley just behind the village. A 'Section 52' agreement would prevent further development for a number of years. Also possible tree-planting, and use of some of the land for e.g. car parking. The Council decided to inspect the site before commenting

Public Discussion

Mrs. Haygreen from Trelights, referring to an item in Trio, said people burning rubbish on open land had the landowner's permission.


The problem with dog-fouling was 'disgusting'. St. Endellion Lane was a mass of flies in warm weather.

Margaret Couch said the Springside light, promised for last September, had still not been installed. She would raise the matter each month until it was done. Cllr. Symons said N.C.D.C. had the work in hand.



January Meeting:

Mr. Stokes, after reporting on the condition of the notice boards, is to look at those at the car park and at the Liberal Club.

Mr. Dawe asked why the new development at Trelights had no proper roads or pavements.

Finance

A balance of £593.63 less expenditure of £166.29 leaves a total, including funds on deposit, of £870.99. in the Council's account.

Telephone Boxes

Mr. Bolton said the new boxes look all right and in any case are preferable to plastic window frames in the Conservation Area. The matter of inspecting the boxes (Phonewatch) will have to wait six months before it can be discussed again.

Age Concern Truro - Mobile Centres A scheme to provide a mobile centre at sites throughout the County, with a mini bus to bring elderly people to it, was not thought necessary for our village. The Community Bus scheme had attracted little support. Nevertheless Age Concern to be asked for details and to be sent a list of the facilities that we do have.

Clerk's Correspondence:

A letter from a resident in Silvershell Road objecting to the proposed house on the side of the valley as a visual detriment to Port Isaac -'the gem of North Cornwall's coast'. brought cries of 'hear, hear' from several members of the Council.

County Highways cannot authorise the descriptive sign at 'Port Isaac Turn' but will tidy up the present jumble of signs. The problem with the 'cobbles' at the Platt will also be dealt with. Mrs. Richards said

again that the black paint obliterating the old yellow lines is very slippery. Mrs. Cann replied that the only solution would be to resurface all the roads, which is needed.

No further work is scheduled for the Trelights turning at Plain Street. Mr. Dawe expressed disappointment that no advantage had been taken of his offer of land to improve visibility. The earliest date any requests for further work would be Spring 1990.

Photographs of Myrtle Grove Cottage, 'before' and 'after' if possible, are to obtained in connection with the award scheme.

A letter from Mr. Hoskin aroused considerable discussion concerning the deterioration of the cliff path due to use by builders' lorries. It seems that the road can be used by anybody, but Mr. Hill at County Hall is to be asked the actual legal position in view of the fact that Mrs. Doney, Footpath Officer, has received several complaints concerning the public footpath that runs along there. Mr. Stokes said that people are entitled to at least a footpath width strip of tarmac. Queries were also raised about the size of the dwellings being erected as the Council had not seen any plans since outline stage when bungalows were requested. The Clerk was asked to enquire about this.

Public Discussion

Miss Couch said 'We are still waiting in the gloom. When is there any likelihood of our getting the light at 'Springside'? She was asked to get in touch with Cllr. Symons (who was not present).

Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 13th. February at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.
