Dear Sir, There is great concern world-wide about the destruction of the earth and the implications for the future. Also of importance, and perhaps of more immediate concern for us, is the regard we should show for protecting the lovely village we live in. In areas like the Cotswolds, conservation is a source of great pride for residents. Here the fact that Port Isaac is a conservation area would appear to be to many an irritation or a total irrelevance. I was amazed to find an Estate Agent in Wadebridge advertising several cottages in the old part of the village, who never feels the need to mention in its advertising literature, that Port Isaac is a conservation area or that some of the buildings are listed for historical interest! There is also a great desire to obtain planning permission for buildings often totally out of character with the surroundings. Surely this is showing as little regard for the future as destroying the ozone layer or burning tropical rain forests for short term gain at the expense of the environment. Unfortunately, the authorities can't check on every development. The District planning committees often have too little local knowledge to show great concern about details. The type of conservation area order we have has no legal effect. So it really is up to us to ensure that the village remains the beautiful place we have inherited. Without constant vigilance, Port Isaac will become like many South Coast villages where small alterations gradually destroyed the original character. The future for Port Isaac, as well as the present, lies in Tourism. Thousands come, and will come, to admire what there is here. Let us care enough about our village to pass on to the next generation a

very special and unspoiled place.

PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken by a member of the public during the meeting held at the Chapel Rooms, Trelights, Monday 13th. March. There were many members of the public present.

Footpath Port Isaac Mill

A letter from a member of the public complained at the deterioration of the path and claimed that it was not now possible to walk through from Trewetha to Port Isaac. Mrs. Cann urged all parish councillors to go and have a look at the situation. A letter from the Dept. of the Environment said landowners must not carry out their operations without regard for public rights of way. Mr. Norris said he had discussed the problem with the owners who are considering a diversion to avoid the field where the pigs are kept. Mrs. Doney, County Footpath Officer, wants to try and find a solution without recourse to legal action and has arranged to meet the owners. Port Gaverne Toilets

N.C.D.C. has offered to clean the toilets at an estimated cost of £1,500 for the year. This offer was met with astonishment since a much lower offer has been made by a private contractor. Other parishes in the district receive £300 towards such costs and Cllr. Symons is to ask for this for St. Endellion.

St. Endellion Lane

The lane, especially alongside Glebe Field is in very bad condition but the Parish Council are still waiting for a reply to a letter sent to County Highways last September. Cllr. Symons explained that it would be a subject of planning approval for the end of the lane to be made up to 'adoption' standards when the Furze Park development starts.

Refuse Collection Mr. Phelps has received many complaints from small guest houses who feel it unfair they will not be allowed free domestic refuse bins and will pay full trade collection rates all year even during the months they are closed. Cllr. Symons said there is opposition throughout the country to the new arrangements but the orders are issued by central government and can't be changed. (A ribald suggestion was made that everybody should take their refuse and dump it in Downing Street.) If a problem arises from 'unlabelled' refuse not being collected, it will become a matter for the Department of the Environment.

Bottle Bank

The Parish Council is to investigate the possibility of a bottle bank in the main car park.

Light at Springside

Delay is due to the site being on private land. N.C.D.C. will install a light without charge but maintenance will be the responsibility

of the Parish Council. This was agreed to. An application will be made to the County Council for the maintenance costs.

Caravan in Car Park

Mr. Phelps said that the fishermen had been refused permission to keep pots in the car park during the winter due to intended resurfacing work which had not yet taken place. Meanwhile N.C.D.C. have allowed a filthy caravan to be left there all winter. Cllr. Symons said the resurfacing work has been postponed till next autumn because of finance and the possibility that car parks may be 'privatised'.

Planning and Conservation Area Mrs. Cann said Chief Planning and Development Officer, Mr. Philp, is still sympathetic towards Port Isaac but the government have lifted many restrictions. She reminded him that people in St. Endellion work hard to try and prevent unsuitable developments and have had some success in preventing the village looking like some places in other parts of Cornwall. A letter to M.P. Gerry Neale will invite him to walk around the village and then request him for re-application for an 'Article IV' order. Mr. Philp will speak at the Annual Parish Meeting on April 13th.

Coastquard Wall

The Parish Council have been invited to a site meeting with the Public Services Agency who want to replace the stone wall with concrete posts and wire. The wall is being damaged by unauthorised users of the path which is not a public right of way. There is no intention to replace the wall against the public wish.

Community Charge

Telephone queries about this can be made to Wadebridge 5151 (but by the time you read this you should have received a leaflet).

It seems the Parish Council will be asked for 'specific information' about persons who refuse to register on the electoral list.

Planning Application

Mr. Blake, Trelights change of use from workshop (carpenter's shop) to dwelling. No objections.

Public Discussion

A gentleman raised strong objections to the support given to Mrs. Hayne whose letter was read out last month. He detailed problems caused by the family since arriving in Trelights. The 11 year old boy had six times ridden a motorcyle on the road without helmet, licence, or insurance, until stopped by the police. The dogs were not kept under proper control and he pointed out that under the 1930 Control of Dogs Act a dog must not be allowed on the highway without a collar. Mrs. Cann said he had been allowed to reply publicly to the letter but that it is a domestic matter.

Parish Council resolution. Mark Provis on phoning the Constituency Offices in Launceston found them surpised he is not to be allowed a free dustbin for domestic waste and suggested that he should write to M.P. Gerry Neale about it. Everybody affected should write individual letters as this will carry a lot of weight, said Mrs. Cann. Dennis Knight said places like Port Isaac may be a nightmare for the contractors but should people now pay bin charges when already paying high business rates? He had managed to negotiate his own yearly rate for his holiday cottage. Will the men take the trouble to sort through great piles of rubbish at sites like that at the bottom of Fore Street, Tuesday mornings, to see which had got labels on? he asked. Mr. Knight also expressed concern that people were tipping rubbish

that people were tipping rubbish over and wearing away the cliff below his house but nobody seemed to want to take the responsibility.

Clir. Symons promised to chase the

matter up.

Finally he pointed out that the road from China Downs to Port Gaverne was getting seriously eroded.

Mrs. Pethick asked if the Parish Council could look into the possibility of signs advising long vehicles to take the route from St. Endellion into Trelights. 50ft. lorries have difficulty with narrow corners, damage the roadsides and drive over Pillar Box Green.
Mr. Rotherham asked if 'please drive slowly through the village' signs could be re-applied for Mrs. Brown said she didn't know what was meant by 'retirement village'

was meant by 'retirement village' but she hoped the young people would always stay and help the older ones. Next Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 10th. April at 7.30pm. in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac. The Annual Parish Meeting will take place three days later, Thursday 13th, 7.30pm. at the Church Hall.


